



## Introduction

The Department of Linguistics and Modern Languages of The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) is committed to the scientific study of language as an integral part of mind. We emphasize interdisciplinary research and training that draws on knowledge and methods from a wide range of related disciplines such as philosophy, psychology, cognitive neuroscience, engineering, and education, with the goal of nurturing scholarship and advancing knowledge of language, its structure, use and acquisition.

The Master of Arts (MA) Programme in Chinese Linguistics and Language Acquisition provides an intensive training in contemporary analysis of Chinese language structure, the acquisition of Chinese as a first or second language, and the application of linguistic theory to the teaching of the Chinese language. It is intended for current or prospective Chinese language teachers and students of Chinese who are interested in a scientific understanding of the cognitive processes underlying language learning and teaching.



## Objectives

The programme aims to:

- enable students to acquire a rich understanding of the systematic design of Mandarin Chinese, through providing them with principled accounts of Chinese language phenomena, in comparison to other languages and Chinese dialects;
- equip students with methodological tools for the analysis of Chinese language structure, and for the empirical study of learners of Chinese, as well as the dynamics of the teaching and learning process; and
- enhance students' understanding of the complexities of second/foreign language learning and second dialect learning in the context of multi-lingual and multi-dialectal communities.

## Programme Mode

The programme is offered in full-time mode which covers a normal period of one academic year. Students are required to complete a total of 27 units, including 15 units of required courses and 12 units of elective courses.

## Entry Requirements

Applicants should have graduated from a recognized university and obtained a Bachelor's degree, normally with honours not lower than Second Class, and have fulfilled the English Language Proficiency Requirement.

Applicants should submit their applications via the website of the Graduate School of CUHK. The application period is from September to end of February of the following year. All required supporting documents should reach the Division of Linguistics two weeks after the submission of the online application.
