

## CHES1001 Chinese Languages, Past and Present: Sound and Script

#### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course to a range of topics related to the cultural history and linguistic analysis of Chinese languages. The course prepares beginners of Chinese language with a sense of the historical development of sound and scripts of Chinese, and basic knowledge about syntax, and phonetics to facilitate language learning. Topics covered in the class include: 1) historical background of the Chinese languages; 2) Dialects, Topolects, Minority Languages, and the National language; 3) historical development of Chinese characters and writing system; 4) basic Chinese syntax and phonetics. This is not a language skills course: you will not be tested on your ability to use Mandarin. **No prior knowledge of Chinese is assumed or required.** 

#### LEARNING OUTCOMES

- 1) Demonstrate a basic familiarity with classical and modern Chinese languages, and Chinese linguistics;
- 2) Understand the cultural and historical development of the Chinese languages;
- 3) Develop reading, writing, and presentation skills in a professional manner.

### **COURSE ASSESSMENT**

- 1) Participation (15%) Students are required to come to class prepared, having completed the required readings and watched the films. Students are expected to critically engage with the course content and contribute to class discussion. Unexcused absences will result in loss of points, and students with more than 2 unexcused absences will receive no points for participation. Extreme lateness will be counted as absence. UReply (or Zoom Polling) will be used during the class for participation.
- 2) **Group Presentation (15%)** Each student will be assigned to a group to present a critical reading of assigned materials and external sources for **15-20 minutes** with the aid of PowerPoint or other visual materials. Students will be asked to sign up for a group in **Week 2**. Instructions and grading rubric will be posted on the **Blackboard**.
- 3) Review Essay (20%) Students are required to submit a review essay of assigned weekly reading in Week 5. The review essay should be 500-700 words (12pt, Times New Roman,

double-spaced), submitted to the Blackboard by 11:59pm, Oct 5 together with a PDF file of the signed Veriguide receipt. No late submission will be accepted. Instructions and grading rubric will be posted on the Blackboard.

- 4) **Midterm Exam (25%)** Midterm Exam will be held in class in **Week 7**. There will be multiple choices, key term definition, short answer, and short essay questions. Instruction and study guide will be posted on **Blackboard** in **Week 5**.
- 5) Final Exam (25%) Final exam will be held during the examination week. The time and classroom will be announced during the first week of October. The exam is not cumulative, but you still need to know the basics to help you understand the questions. There will be key term definition, short answer, and short essay questions. Instruction and study guide will be posted on Blackboard in Week 12.
