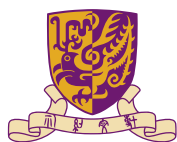

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## INTRODUCTION

Since its establishment in September 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (hereafter, the Institute or HKIAPS) has been promoting and coordinating interdisciplinary studies on Hong Kong and neighbouring Asian societies within the Asia-Pacific region. The Institute aims to serve as a bridge between overseas scholars in Asia-Pacific studies and teaching and research staff at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (hereafter, the Chinese University or CUHK).

The Institute supports two major types of research activities: individual projects funded

by or affiliated with the Institute and long-term interdisciplinary research programmes that constitute the backbone of the activities of the Institute. The latter activities are described at length in the following pages, while the former will be mentioned in particular sections of individual programme reports.

## MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The Institute has come a long way since its inception two decades ago. Today the Institute has become a reputable knowledge hub of social science research in Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region. Findings of our ongoing research on social, political and economic development of Hong Kong, Mainland China and the region are disseminated extensively across the intellectual community. We collaborate closely with policy-makers in the public and private sectors to provide scientific and evidence-based input to inform policy analyses and decisions. To promote scholarly exchange, the Institute organizes academic and public events regularly.

Last year has been another eventful year for the Institute. During the reporting period, 96 conferences, symposia, seminars public lectures and workshops were organized, addressing issues such as emerging regionalism, finance, legal culture and transplant, comparative study of families in Hong Kong, Beijing and Shanghai, globalization, gender equality and family changes, civil society practices, urban and regional governance in China, as well as sustainable urbanism.



The Institute has strengthened its international page through cooperation with the European Union (HK and Macao Office) on a Conference on Corporate Social Responsibility held on 11 April 2012. Other co-organising parties include European Union Business Information Programme, European Chamber of Commerce in Hong Kong and Oxfam Hong Kong. The Conference featured speakers from the HKSAR Government, European Union diplomats and business leaders who presented international and local instruments of economic, social and cultural rights, best practices in corporate responsibility, with experiences sharing on the subject. It attracted nearly 100 participants of

diplomats and business leaders in Hong Kong. In addition, a 5-member delegation from Fudan University headed by Vice President Prof. Lin Shangli visited the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) on 17 and 18 May 2012. The aim of the visit was to discuss the collaborative development of Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute (the Institute) jointly



established by CUHK and Fudan University in 2001. In the meeting, both parties reported previous research projects in the Institute and reviewed the collaboration progress. Discussions were held on prospects of expanding collaboration via HKIAPS in joint projects, academic activities and joint publications.

Starting 2010, HKIAPS has extending its services to the provision of training courses related to social, political and economic infrastructure and development in Hong Kong to senior officials and management personnel from mainland China. The Institute designed thematic training modules to address the specific needs and interests of the trainees, drawing upon the expertise from faculty members of the University as well as from external experts. Through these training programs, the Institute aims to establish a platform for promoting exchange between mainland China and Hong Kong, and serve as a focal point in supporting leadership training in mainland China and its development. In the past year, seven training courses were successfully held.

The Telephone Survey Research Laboratory, which conducts quality surveys to facilitate academic research of our university colleagues and opinion polls for the local community, has conducted 70 telephone surveys (47 completed)

during the reporting period. The survey results were released regularly to raise public awareness on social issues and to reflect public opinions. The Publication Unit, another core service function of the Institute, has one book in the *Asia-Pacific in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Book Series*, published 5 monographs and 5 occasional papers last year.

The contributions of the Research Centres and Programmes to the Institute's collective accomplishment in the past year are described in the ensuing individual reports. Here, I would like to express my sincere gratitude and appreciation to the Management Committee and all our colleagues in the Institute. Their passion, commitment, professionalism and excellent teamwork are most invaluable to the development of the Institute. I am particularly grateful for our four Associate Directors, Professors Stephen W. K. Chiu, Sung Yun-wing, Wong Chack-kie and Timothy K. Y. Wong.

For strategic planning, we have reviewed the research landscape within the Chinese University as well as in Hong Kong, Mainland China and the Asia-Pacific region since the establishment of the Institute twenty years ago. We have made a number of structural changes to consolidate our strategic position and directions in achieving its mission and objectives.

First, The Institute will further strengthen our platform for consolidating cross-disciplinary in social science research. With the re-affiliation of the Centre for Housing Innovations, the scope of our research has been further broadened. In addition, there are plans to elevate a number of research programmes to research centres with a view of strengthening their research capacity and output as well as setting up new research programmes on new initiatives.

Second, with the increasing demand for high quality telephone surveys and rapid advancement of technology, the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory has reviewed these new advances and expectations. It is now equipped with recording facilities in addition to an increase in phone stations for swift, efficient and accurate running of telephone polling. The Institute will continue to evaluate the role of

the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory with a view of exploring the capacity to incorporate modern information technology to conduct state-of-the-art opinion polls.

Third, the Institute, via its Research Centres and Programmes, will continue to host international conferences and facilitate collaborative research projects with renowned academia in Greater China and regional partners in other parts of Asia.

Finally, the Institute will consolidate ongoing research projects, initiate new ones to promoting multidisciplinary research on social, political and economic development of Hong Kong, Greater China, and Asia-Pacific region; to promote academic exchange; to disseminate research findings; and to assist in the preparation of Public Policy Research Grants in Social Science.

I wish to take this opportunity to recognize all our current and former colleagues for their contributions to our accomplishments in the past year. With our sustained and concerted efforts, I have every confidence that the Institute will build on our strength to make even greater strides in promoting evidence-based knowledge to serve the society.

### CHAN Kin-man (陳健民)

Apart from the appointment listed above, Professor Chan is also Associate Director of Center for Entrepreneurship of the CUHK, a visiting professor of Sociology, and Chair of Board of Directors, Institute for Civil Society in Sun Yat-sen (Zhongshan) University of Guangzhou. He serves in the editorial boards of *Journal of Civil Society*, *China Non-Profit Review* (Beijing) and *Third Sector Review* (Taiwan), and is academic advisor of China Charity and Donation Information Center under Ministry of Civil Affairs in China. He is the Chair of Adjudication Committee (2009, 2010) of the Philanthropy Awards of Jet Li One Foundation, and Strategic Advisor of Guangdong Harmonious Foundation. In Hong Kong, he was member of Community Research Committee of the ICAC, Part-time Member of Central Policy Unit, founding member of Hong Kong Democratic Development Network (DDN), member of Chief Executive Election Committee (Higher Education sub-sector), and is currently Director of Hong Kong Civil Education Foundation, and advisor of Hong Kong Social Enterprise Incubation Centre. He has published in *Journal of Civil Society*, *Communist and Post-Communist Studies*, *Sociological Research* (Beijing), and other academic journals. ### CHEUNG Mui-ching, FANNY (張妙清)

Professor Cheung was formerly the Dean of the Faculty of Social Science, and has established the Gender Research Centre at CUHK, of which she served as the Director until 2010. From 1996-99, she took leave from the University to become the Founding Chairperson of the Equal Opportunities Commission of the HKSAR Government. She has served in many public advisory bodies in Hong Kong, including the Shatin District Board, Regional Council, Broadcasting Authority, Independent

Police Complaints Council, Women's Commission, Hong Kong Advisory Council on AIDS, Barristers' Disciplinary Tribunal Panel, and Appeal Board Panel under the Urban Renewal Authority Ordinance. She was appointed as a Hong Kong Affairs Advisor to the Chinese Government before 1997, and has continued to serve as an invited delegate to the Chinese National Congress of Women since 1994. Besides advocating for the status of women, Prof. Cheung has dedicated herself to the promotion of mental health and is the current Chairperson of the New Life Psychiatric Rehabilitation of Hong Kong. Her international professional services include Past President of the Clinical and Community Psychology Division of the International Association of Applied Psychology of which she is currently a member of the Board of Directors, and the President of the International Test Commission. She is also the awardee of American Psychological Association Award for Distinguished Contributions to the International Advancement of Psychology 2012, in recognition of sustained and enduring contributions to international cooperation and to the advancement of knowledge of psychology.

Prof. Cheung's research covers cross-cultural personality assessment, clinical and community psychology, women's leadership, and gender equality, with over 170 international refereed journal articles, book chapters, edited books, and book reviews. Her recent books include *Women at the top: Powerful leaders tell us how to combine work and family* (Wiley-Blackwell, 2008) and *Mainstreaming gender in Hong Kong society* (Chinese University Press, 2009). She is one of the co-editors of the *IAAP handbook of applied psychology* (Wiley-Blackwell, 2011).

Professor Cheung's research focuses on sociology of deviance, youth problem, drug abuse, gambling, and evaluation research. She is also currently an appointed member of government advisory bodies of HKSAR including Commission on Youth, Home Affairs Bureau (2009-present), Treatment and Rehabilitation Subcommittee, Action Committee Against Narcotics, Narcotics Bureau (2009-present), and Advisory Committee on Admission of Quality Migrants and Professionals, Department of Immigration (2010-present).

Professor Chiu's research interests include development studies, industrial relations, social movements, and the comparative study of East Asian societies. He has published widely in international journals and has also written three co-authored books: *East Asia and the World Economy* (1995, Newbury Park: Sage), *City-States in the Global Economy: The Industrial Restructuring of Hong Kong and Singapore* (1997, Boulder: Westview), and *Hong Kong: Becoming a Chinese Global City* (1997, London: Routledge). Active in the Liberal Studies community in the secondary school sector, he has been the coordinator of the Support Programme on the Teaching and Learning of Liberal Studies, Sociology Department, CUHK since its inception in 1997 and is also the Chair of the CDC-HKEAA Committee on Liberal Studies (Senior Secondary). He also served as the Part-time Member of the Central Policy Unit, and was a member of the Strategic Development Commission of the HKSAR Government.

Her research papers were published in various international journals, including *American Journal of Sociology*, *Sociology of Health and Illness*, *The China Quarterly*, *Political Psychology*, *Social Science and Medicine*, *AIDS Care*, *Journal of Conflict Resolution*, *International Migration Review*, *Human Rights Quarterly*, *Sexually Transmitted Diseases*, *Journal of Interpersonal Violence*, *Culture, Health and Sexuality*, and *American Journal of Gastroenterology*.

**CHONG Tai-leung, Terence (莊太量)**

Professor Chong's main research areas include Econometrics and Finance. He has published over 200 Chinese and English articles covering a wide spectrum of topics in Econometrics, Finance, Mathematics, Psychology, Education, and the

Hong Kong Economy. He ranks top 37th worldwide in theoretical econometrics and top 5% authors worldwide according to the number of distinct works and number of journal pages per author. His papers appear in reputable international journals, including *Journal of Econometrics*, *Econometric Theory*, *Econometric Review*, *Econometrics Journal*, *Financial Management*, *Quantitative Finance*, *Financial Review*, *Pacific-Basin Finance Journal*, *Journal of Economic Psychology*, *Economics Letters* and *China Economic Review*. Some of his papers are lead articles or the most downloaded papers of the journals. He is currently the Associate Editor of *Singapore Economic Review* and *Economics Bulletin*, part-time member of the Central Policy Unit of the HKSAR Government, the Associate Dean of Students of New Asia College, and a member of the Board of Governors of Hong Lok Yuen International School.

**KITAMURA Takanori (北村隆則)**

Mr. Kitamura was former Ambassador of Japan in Greece (2006-10) and Consul-General of Japan in Hong Kong (2004-06). He joined the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan in 1972, where had served in different divisions including China and Mongolia Division, and had been posted abroad in Beijing, New York (United Nations), Manila, and Greece. His professional career also includes Managing Director of the International Cooperation Agency and Senior Research Fellow of the Japan Institute of International Affairs. Mr. Kitamura joined the Institute in August 2010 to devote himself to academic research and collaboration, and to contribute to knowledge transfer through teaching on regionalism and integration in East Asia.

Dr. Law was previously employed as Senior Economist of the HKSAR Government and HSBC respectively, and as the Chief Economist of the Hong Kong Policy Research Institute. Other than dedicating more than twenty years in policy research work and serving in the financial sector, he has also been active in social and political involvement. He was a Legislative Council Member between 1995

and 1998, and also served as a member of the Consumer Council, Legal Aid Services Council, and Travel Industry Council. Dr. Law has been a National Member of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference since 1994 and an elected District Council Member between 1994 and 2007.

He has published several policy-related books in recent years, including 《香港經濟轉型及新產業政策》(2008); 《香港金融業概況及發展政策》(2008) 及《大中華地區民航市場、政策與制度》(2010).

Professor Law is by training a health economist, and is conducting research studies on the disease burden analysis and economic evaluation for public health intervention strategies in Hong Kong. Before joining the Institute, he was a postdoctoral fellow of the Centre for Suicide Research and Prevention of The University of Hong Kong to evaluate the social cost of suicides and to examine the efficacy of restricting the access to means for preventing suicides in Hong Kong. Apart from suicide research, he has actively participated on social policy research in examining how changes in population health would affect the need of long-term care for elderly. Recently, he worked as a consultant for the Elderly Commission of the HKSAR Government to study the feasibility of some policy initiatives for frail elderly in Hong Kong. The conference is one of the major academic activities for celebrating the 20th Anniversary of the Institute, which aims to examine how countries in Asia-Pacific learn Western models of healthcare reform, financing models and strategies for meeting the difficulties ahead and compares the experiences of successes and challenges of different countries throughout the region.

**ZHENG Wan-tai, Victor** (鄭宏泰)

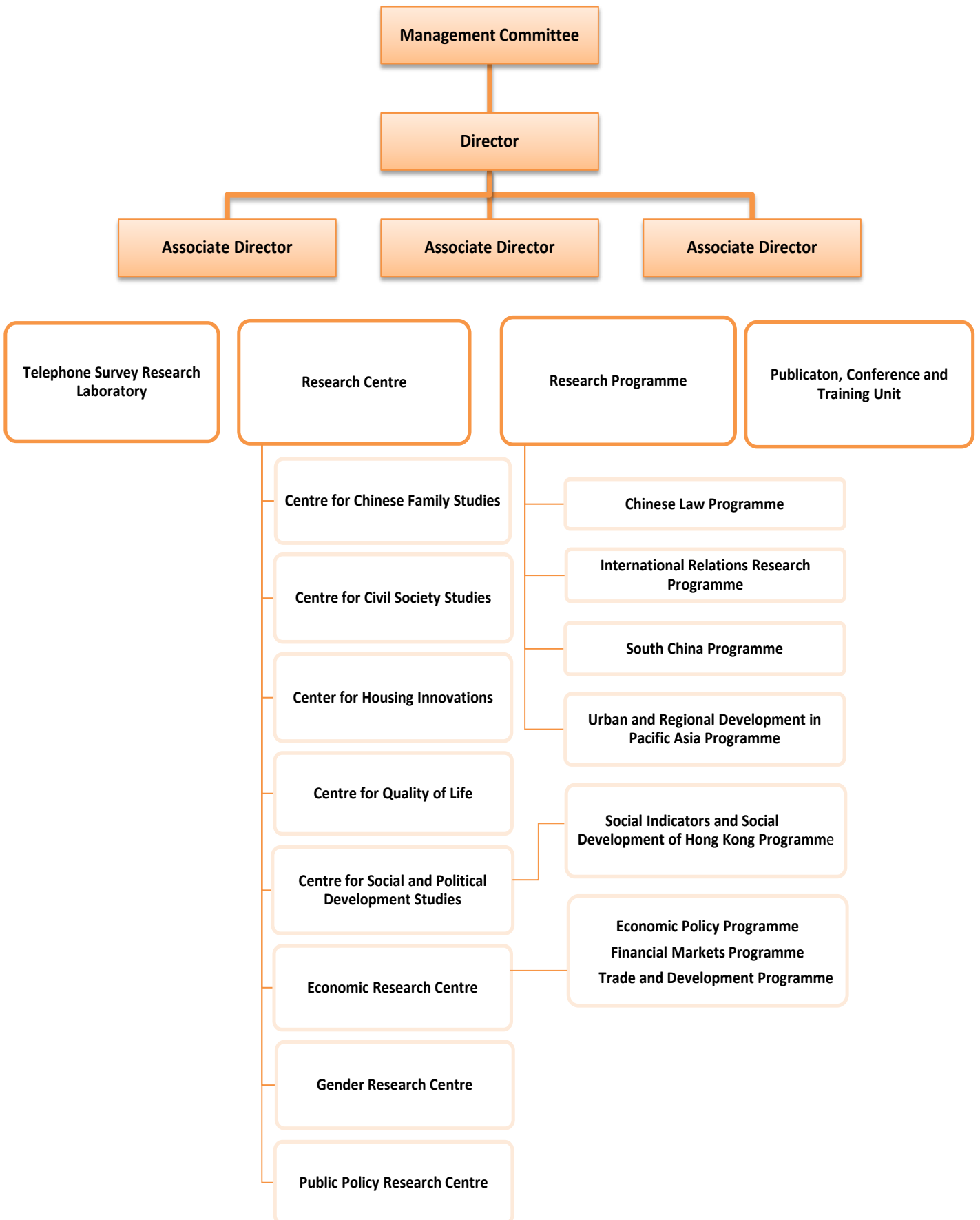

#### Objectives

The Centre is a cross-disciplinary research organization for family studies in Chinese societies. Our goal is to establish a platform for promoting empirical research and intellectual exchanges among family scholars. One of our missions is to disseminate research data to facilitate family research through resource sharing. Recently, the Centre has completed a comparative family survey with Peking University and Fudan University in three Chinese cities: Hong Kong, Beijing and Shanghai. These surveys document major aspects of family life and the course of family changes in the context of rapid social transformations in Chinese societies. A data archive will be established to disseminate the survey data to all interested family scholars and to inform the public and policy makers on pressing family issues.

### Background

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The Centre for Civil Society Studies was established in February 2008 under Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies at CUHK. This report will introduce our centre and the activities held from August 2011 to July 2012.

### Objectives

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The mission of the Centre is to enhance the development of civil society in Chinese societies through research and education. In particular, our Centre has four objectives:

1. To provide database support for conducting academic and consultancy research on civil society in Chinese societies, including mainland China, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Macau;
2. To promote public awareness and disseminate advanced knowledge of civil society through educational programs and other academic activities;
3. To facilitate cooperation across sectors by building a network of academic institutes, governments, business and NGOs in the region;
4. To enhance innovation in public policy making by promoting the importance of civil society in good governance.

### Advisors and Members

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Renowned scholars Prof. Deborah S. Prof. CHAN Kin-man of Sociology has served as director of the Centre while Prof. WONG Hung of Social Work, Prof. Anthony Spires of Sociology, Prof. TAO Lin of Sociology and Prof. WU Fengshi of Government and Public Administration have served as associate directors. These five members constituted the Executive Committee responsible for all the major decisions of the Centre. Internal members of the Centre include Prof. Paul S. N. LEE, Prof. QIU Linchuan of Journalism and Communications, Prof. LAM Kin Chi of Geography and Resources Management, Prof. MA Ngok, Prof. LI Lianjiang, Prof. NG Kai Hon and Mr. CHOY Chi Keung of Government and Public Administration, Prof. Eva Pils and Prof. Amy Barrow of Law School, Prof. LAM Ching Man, Prof. XU Ying, Mrs YAU Ng Lai Tuen of Social Work, Prof. KIM Jee Young and Dr. LEE King Wah of Sociology, Dr. WU Keping and Dr. WANG Danning of Anthropology, Prof. CHOW Po Chung of Government and Public Administration, Prof. TSE Kwan Choi Thomas of Educational Administration and Policy. The Centre has recruited eight staff, including an administrative team (WANG Yong, LAM Ping Cheong, CHI Hin Cheong and YANG Xue-hui), one research associate (Dr. Terence YUEN) and three research assistants (KWOK Wing Feng, Donna CHEUNG and ZHU Yin ), and is in the process of recruiting more supporting staff.

## Research - Database Construction

CCSS was established in early 2008 with a grant from the University's Focused Investment Scheme as one of the research units in the University to promote China studies. Since its inception, the Centre has been working on to build three civil society databases: 1) NGO Archives, 2) Collective Action Database, and 3) Civil Society Opinion Survey Datasets.

The first round of database construction – which includes 260 entries to the NGO Archives, around 1,400 entries to the 2009 Collective Action Database, and the polling results of the 2011 five-city Civil Society Opinion Survey Datasets – was concluded in March 2012. In accordance with the Centre's established policy, the datasets will be made available for use by researchers in related fields of study beginning October 2013 (i.e. 18 months after the completion of the database construction work). A number of research monographs and journal papers are currently under preparation by researchers and students affiliated with CCSS.

While the university's seed grant for supporting database construction had been exhausted, the Centre managed to extend the database construction work through leveraging external funding resources. By granting advance user rights to the dataset to institutional users, the Centre was able to generate additional resources for constructing two more years of data (2010 and 2011) for the Collective Action Database, and it is envisaged that the database construction work will be continued for 2012 and beyond. In the case of the NGO Archives, the Centre continues to gather information on additional grassroots NGOs in China while it conducted other ad-hoc research projects. Around 50 new entries were added to the NGO Archives in the past year.

## Education

### A. Southern China Visiting Fellows Program

The Centre has launched visiting fellow programs for selected groups of civil society stakeholders in Mainland China to attend workshops, seminars and conduct field study in Hong Kong since 2008. Specifically, the proposed visitor program has three objectives:

- i) to provide opportunities for stakeholders of civil society in China to learn the cutting edge development of civil society in promoting social innovation and good governance;
- ii) to help these stakeholders gain first-hand experience in NPO management;
- iii) to create a network of civil society stakeholders within and outside the

government in China.

From August 2011 to July 2012, a total of three strategic groups of participants are invited to join the program. As in the previous year, they include the senior staff of "civil society support organizations" such as volunteer training institute, officials in Civil Affairs departments and other related authorities, as well as scholars involved in teaching and research of civil society/social welfare. Besides, outstanding journalists and entrepreneurs are invited as they both play role in fostering civil society in China.

During 2011-12, the Centre hosted 29 visitors selected from a total of 119 applicants. Over the period of four years, the Centre has hosted 107 visitors; the length of each visit lasts from two to four weeks. Visiting fellows attended workshops, seminars, site visiting and short-term internship as well as conducted independent research.

The networks of civil society established by the Centre since 2010 have drawn more and more participants and extended the impact beyond the NGO sectors. These valuable experiences help visiting fellows forming regional fellowships and offer them alternative and continuous support through



these platforms. Besides, to deepen the connection of visiting fellows and promote civic engagement of the youth, the Centre launched a NGO internship program in Greater China with some of our visiting fellows in 2012 summer. The program provided internship opportunities to 21 CUHK undergraduates to learn about NGO work and development of civil society in Greater China.

### B. Social Innovation Workshop

With the objectives listed below, the Centre launched Social Innovation Workshop for NGO practitioners from Mainland China this year.

- i) To provide opportunities for NGO workers to learn the theories of civil society, social innovation and advocacy;
- ii) To equip NGO workers with the skills in advocacy, including social research method, media relationship, and creative action planning;



- iii) To assist NGO practitioners to develop their action plans through studying cases of social innovation and advocacy in China, Hong Kong and elsewhere;
- iv) To establish a network of NGO practitioners and cultivate promising young leaders as well as provide organizations with long-term support;
- v) To select some qualified project proposals and facilitate their implementation.

The centre received a total of 31 qualified participants for the two workshops, 16 participants in October and 15 participants in November. Workshop participants consist of senior NGO workers who are responsible for planning and implementing the projects in their organizations, and a variety of Chinese CBOs including groups working on HIV and AIDS, Harm Reduction, Public Health, Law and so on.

The seven-day workshop contained lectures on theory introduction, a three-day interactive training led by experienced trainers, field visits to local NGOs, experiences-sharing sessions, and participating in important social events at times.

After the workshops, CCSS provided consultative support to 13 project proposals received from the participants and helped the outstanding proposals to seek for financial support. In addition, CCSS has also helped establish and strengthen communication among participants after the program through network building, and provided a diverse long term support to selected NGOs



### Student Activities

#### A. ICARE NGO internship in Greater China

To promote all-around development of CUHK students through civic and social engagement, the Centre, with the help of student association, Youth Civil Society and the support of CUHK Global Internship Programme and Lee Hysan Foundation, has organized NGO internships, with the period of 6 to 8 weeks in June and July.

21 students were selected from about 200 applicants to intern in 6 well-established and innovative NGOs in Mainland China. The six NGOs are Shanxi Research Association for Women and Family (陝西婦女研究會), Guangdong Green

Farming Social Work Development Center (廣東綠耕社會工作發展中心), Handa Rehabilitation and Welfare Association (廣東省漢達康福協會), Senior Citizen Cooperative (樂齡合作社), Aohan Women's Development Association (敖漢婦女發展協會) and Guizhou Institution for Indigenous Culture Development (貴州鄉土文化社).



#### B. ICARE Lecture on Civility

In order to encourage social and civic engagement in society, our Centre, as one of the organisers, launched University Lecture on Civility in the past year.

University Lecture on Civility has launched a public lecture and 6 forums, inviting scholars, artists and public figures to share their views on civility and value system to our staff and students, as well as other interested parties in the public. This year, guest speakers were Mr. Lin Hwai-min, Prof. Sechin Yung-hsiang Chien, Mr. Leung Man-tao, Miss Liang Xiao-yan, Prof. Leo Lee Ou-fan, Prof. Pai Hsien-yung and Miss Ann Hui On-wa.

University Lecture on Civility became one of the great events in CUHK as each lecture has attracted more than 500 people. This year, a total of more than 4000 people including students, staffs, alumni and the general public joint University Lecture on Civility and Blossoms of Life Floral Festival.



#### Conference

The Centre has hosted a three-day conference, called 思考中國未來. A total number of 36 scholars and leaders from NGO and mass media (11 from Hong Kong, 4 from Taiwan and 21 from Mainland China) were invited to discuss topics based on academic paper published by selected participants.

## Seminars

The Centre has organized 38 seminars or Civil Society Salons, some of which were co-organized with the CUHK Universities Service Centre for China Studies. The seminars covered a wide range of topics from NGO practices to civil society theories and were able to arouse heated discussion among the audience who were usually students, scholars and NGO leaders.

## Applied Research Projects

With an aim to promote civil society development in China, the Centre over the years has built strong ties with many like-minded research institutes and philanthropic organizations both within and outside of China. In the past year, the Centre has participated in a number of collaborative research projects, partnering up with the Shenzhen One Foundation, the Global Greengrants Fund, and the China Philanthropy Research Institute at Beijing Normal University.

- i) **Evaluation of the Canonical Project Philanthropy Award:** CCSS was commissioned by the One Foundation to undertake an evaluation of the Canonical Project Philanthropy Award, a flagship project of the Jet Li One Foundation since its inception in 2008. After organizing the award programme for three consecutive years, the newly constituted Shenzhen One Foundation sought to assess the overall effectiveness of the award scheme in supporting philanthropy development in China. While examining the award scheme's many achievements as well as weaknesses, CCSS offered recommendations to the One Foundation on pathways to drive philanthropic developments in China.
- ii) **Independent Evaluation of Grantmaking:** The Global Greengrants Fund (GGF) started its grantmaking in China in 1998 in support of the development of a green movement in China. Having supported more than a hundred green groups for well over a decade, GGF asked CCSS to conduct an independent analysis of its grantmaking operations. Through its signature small-grant program, GGF focuses on nurturing environmental groups by means of building the social infrastructure, encouraging transparency and information sharing, and providing project support. The in-depth study looked back at the history of GGF's grantmaking in China, while the researchers also assessed GGF's key grantmaking strategies, as well as identified key areas for further development.
- iii) **China Philanthropy Research Institute:** Established in 2010, the China Philanthropy Research Institute at Beijing Normal University is the country's first university centre specializing in philanthropy education and research, as well

as in the promotion of knowledge exchange and the development of expert support services to charities and foundations. CCSS has been identified by the Institute as one of its strategic partners in developing teaching curriculums on various topics relating to nonprofit management and philanthropic giving. In the past year, the Centre also offered help to the Institute in identifying seasoned practitioners and trainers in Hong Kong and executive training programmes have been organized for foundation staffs, nonprofit practitioners, local officials and journalists in the Mainland.

## Funding

The centre received a total sum of HK\$2,965,903 in 2011-12 from I-CARE Programme of CUHK, Global Greengrants Fund, Lee Hysan Foundation, One Foundation, Rockefeller Brothers Fund, Tides Foundation, Victor and William Fung Foundation and 北京市信访矛盾分析研究中心 to support our educational and research programs. The Centre is building up collaboration with more grantmakers.

### Background and Objectives

Under the guidance and support of the Science and Technology Committee (STC) of the Ministry of Housing and Urban Rural Development (MOHURD), PRC, the Center for Housing Innovations (CHI) was established in 1998 at the 301 Conference Room of the Ministry in Beijing under the supports from the leadership of the Chinese University of Hong Kong. CHI's management and development is advised by the Ministry senior colleagues, and is operating on a self-financed basis. Long before her establishment in 1998, CHI has started her researches since 1993. CHI has assisted the nation in conducting various prominent research projects, for example, the SARS research, housing privatization studies, China green building code development, etc. CHI engaged not only in research, but also in connecting professionals to support the developments of mainland China, Hong Kong and Taiwan.

The Center's objective is to achieve high quality, affordable urban housing for high density development, and to improve the livability and efficiency of future urban housing in China through design and technology integration. Specific goals are to improve:

1. Livability in high density urban housing;
2. Health of the urban environment;
3. Energy efficiency and thermal comfort;
4. Building construction efficiency and quality;
5. Dissemination of information on housing for high density habitation.

## Centre for Quality of Life

Director: *Prof. NG Sai-leung*

### *Objectives*

The Centre aims at promoting scholarly research on issues of quality of life in the world in general and Hong Kong in particular through cross-disciplinary research, academic exchange activities, and cross-institutional collaboration. Besides, the Centre is committed to produce knowledge on quality of life that contributes to social service development, policy formulations and promotion of the quality of life of people in Hong Kong.

### *Committee*

Lee (Dean of Faculty of Social Science), Prof. Terence Chong Tai-leung (Economics), Prof. Sunny Kwong (Economics), Prof. Ma Ngok (Government and Public Administration), Prof. Ng Kai-hon (Government and Public Administration), Prof. Winnie Mak (Psychology), Prof. Ting Kwok-fai (Sociology) and Prof. Tsou Jin Yeu (Architecture).

### *Research Activities*

During the year, the Centre continued with the longitudinal study of the CUHK Hong Kong Quality of Life Index (QoL Index). Incorporating the effort and expertise of faculty members from different disciplines, the Faculty of Social Science has compiled the QoL Index since 2002. Starting from 2003, the Index is updated and released annually.

The QoL Index is developed to address the following objectives:

1. To measure and monitor the quality of life in Hong Kong in the 21st century;
2. To engage relevant parties in promoting the quality of life in Hong Kong;
3. To provide policy-makers and the community with useful statistics on the quality of life in Hong Kong; and
4. To advocate the quality of life in Hong Kong and draw public attention to the issue of quality of life.

The QoL Index is a composite index. It consists of 21 indicators that are grouped into three subgroups,

including Social, Economic and Environmental sub-indexes. Among the 21 indicators, six are compiled by the Centre, based on data collected by surveys conducted by the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies of the University. These indicators are stress index, general life satisfaction index, press freedom index, press criticism index, government performance index and index of current economic conditions. All other indices are obtained from the government and related institutions. The Centre has successfully obtained a Direct Grant of HK\$77,880 to support the QoL Index research in 2010/11.

A telephone survey was conducted in August 2011 to collect data on the four indicators of the Socio-Cultural Sub-index, viz. stress index, general life satisfaction index, press freedom index, and government performance index. In addition, the Centre conducted the following four quarterly surveys (September and December 2010, March and June 2011) to gauge public attitudes towards Hong Kong's economic conditions in 2010/11.

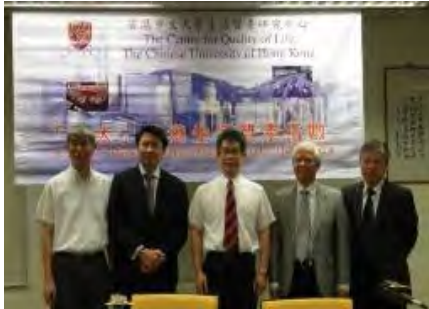
Based on these surveys, the Indices of Consumer Confidence, Consumer Sentiment and Employment Confidence are compiled every quarterly and the results are released on the Centre's website at <http://www.cuhk.edu.hk/ssc/qol/eng/index.php>. The Centre has been requested by organizations such as Bloomberg and Thomson Reuters to provide them with the latest survey results on a continuous basis.

### *Press Conference*

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A press conference was held on 23 July 2012 to disseminate the findings on the Hong Kong Quality of Life Index 2011 to the general public and scholarly community. The press conference attracted 31 media organizations to report the research findings.

The report on the findings of the Hong Kong Quality of Life Index 2011 were sent to more than 80 government bureaus/departments, major NGOs and tertiary institutions after the press conference.



### *Public Lecture*

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Prof. Ng Sai-leung was invited by the Education Bureau to deliver a public lecture on the topic of "Quality of Life in Hong Kong". The lecture was held on 17 April 2012 and more than 100 secondary school teacher attended the lecture.

## Centre for Social and Political Development Studies

### Objectives

The Centre aims to explore and summarize experiences and lessons from the practice of “one country, two systems”; to generate scientific and applied theories and to formulate relevant policies for the reference of stakeholders from different sectors of society; and to stimulate research on local social and political transformations. Its concrete objectives include:

- ◆ To analyze the structure and special nature of social class and political groups in Hong Kong;
- ◆ To promote high-quality research on local society, politics, and related policies;
- ◆ To unearth and develop think-tank talent through related research;
- ◆ To provide a platform for rational and evidence-based discussions on local social and political developments; and
- ◆ To disseminate our research findings to interested associations and individuals for reference.

The **Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong Programme**, with Ms WAN Po-san as the Director, is operated under the auspices of the Centre. The Programme focuses on measuring and studying social developments in Hong Kong. Its prime purpose is to build up a comprehensive system of social indicators, i.e., a set of longitudinal data on the subjective and objective dimensions of social conditions and social changes, for Hong Kong.

### Research Activities

The highlights of the main activities undertaken during the past year are given below:

#### 1. “A Comparative Study of the Social image of Taiwan and Hong Kong”

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica. A telephone opinion survey is conducted simultaneously in Hong Kong and Taiwan once or twice a year using a common questionnaire to gauge the perceptions, values, and subjective well-being of the people of both societies. The core questions of the questionnaire are kept unchanged as far as possible to facilitate the detection of social trends and changes, while questions on special topics are flexible enough to reflect changes in social conditions. The thirteenth survey, which focused on subjective well-being, socio-political trust, and social problems, was carried out in December 2011 to January 2012. The sixth conference on the social image of Taiwan and Hong Kong is scheduled to be held in 2013 in Hong Kong.

#### 2. “A Study of the Patterns of Psychotropic Drug Abuse among At-Risk Youth in Hong Kong: Perceptions Associated with Ketamine Use and Their Construction”

coordinated by Dr Lee King-wa, Prof. Law Chi-kin,  
and Dr Chan Ching-yee

This project is funded by a CUHK direct grant. It aims to address the following objectives: (1) What are the latest patterns of psychotropic drug abuse among at-risk youth in Hong Kong? (2) Is normalization of drug use taking place in Hong

Kong? (3) What are the perceptions of youth towards the use of ketamine in particular? The study involves in-depth interviews conducted with high-risk youths referred to the researchers by community partners and focus group interviews conducted with front-line social workers and police officers.

### 3. “A Study on Hong Kong Families”

coordinated by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stephen, Prof. Ting Kwok-fai, and Ms Wan Po-san

This project has been commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre for Chinese Family Studies and the Public Policy Research Centre. This project aims to provide a detailed analysis of the data collected by the Thematic Household Survey on Hong Kong Families that was completed by the Census and Statistics Department and the Central Policy Unit in 2009; to propose evidence-based policy suggestions on strengthening family relations and functions, and to draw public attention to and facilitate policy discussions on issues relating to local families. Apart from the three coordinators, Prof. Joyce L. C. Ma (CUHK), Dr Victor W. T. Zheng (CUHK), Prof. May Tam (Hong Kong Polytechnic University), Prof. Annie H. N. Chan (Lingnan University), Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Lingnan University), and Prof. Ng Chun-hung (University of Hong Kong) will also contribute to the edited volume of this project.

### 4. “A Study on Hong Kong’s Mainstream Core Values”

by Prof. Wong Chack-kie and Dr. Zheng Wan-tai, Victor

This project is being conducted jointly with the Hong Kong Ideas Centre. It aims to uncover the mainstream core values in Hong Kong and to determine if there have been any changes to these values after the handover. The project consists of two opinion surveys that will be conducted on an annual basis. Based on the survey data, press conferences will be held. Reports and journal articles are also expected to be written.

### 5. “An Intergenerational Study on Work Values and Continuous Learning”

by Prof. Winton Au and Ms Emily Ho

This project aims to understand intergenerational differences in work values, their impact on continuous learning, and the relationship between value congruence and the motivation to learn in Hong Kong. A territory-wide telephone opinion survey was conducted in September 2010.

### 6. “An Investigation into Perceptions of Social Justice across Social Groups”

by Prof. Winton Au and Prof. Tao Lin

This study has been commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region. The aim of the study is to identify issues that the community perceives as unjust and the reasons for this perception, by identifying the social groups that are experiencing injustice and striving to understand the issues that they are facing, as well as determining why they think there is injustice in these issues. The study will also endeavour to gauge the opinions of the general public about what the government and the society could do to rectify injustice in the long term. A media analysis, a territory-wide telephone opinion survey, and focus group interviews have been conducted.

### 7. “Chinese Family Business: Continuity and Sustainability”

by Dr. Zheng Wan-tai, Victor and Prof. Wong Siu-lun

This project aims to study three generations of Shanghai cotton-spinners in Hong Kong to better understand the issue of business continuity and sustainability. In order to achieve the research goal, a multidisciplinary approach to deciphering the relationships among entrepreneurship, succession, and transnationalization, with special attention paid to the issue of continuity and sustainability, will be employed. It is expected that the findings will stimulate discussions and facilitate understanding of the following aspects: (1) How the Shanghai cotton-spinners perceive business challenges and the measures they took to handle such challenges; (2) How they mobilize different institutional set-ups to ensure business dynamism, control, and sustainability; (3) The ways in which the intergenerational succession affects leadership, corporate governance, and integrated family/business developmental strategies in a global economic hub like Hong Kong.

### 8. “Chinese Family Business and the Stock Market: A Haiwankong Collaborative and Comparative Study”

by Dr. Zheng Wan-tai, Victor and Prof. Wong Siu-lun

This project aims to examine the development of family businesses and stock markets in three Greater China locations: Shanghai, Taiwan, and Hong Kong. Of particular interest are the effects of public listings on the transformation of family businesses and the growth of economies through opening markets to private enterprises. In this study, the larger topic of the rise of Chinese

capitalism will be considered. A further goal of the project is to explore the formation of a stock markets to further enhance competitiveness on the global economic stage. This project is funded by the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation.

#### 9. “Hong Kong Contemporary History Research Project”

by Prof. Simon X. H. Shen

The aim of this project is to comprehensively and objectively revisit the 1967 Riots in Hong Kong from both local and international perspectives. The plan is to incorporate different points of view by conducting various interviews with those who were involved in the Riots, and reviewing the decision-making agendas and policy considerations at the governmental level by drawing from historical archives. Two books will be written. One will adopt a local perspective and primarily focus on evaluating the importance of the Riots in shaping the socio-political development of Hong Kong. The other, which will analyze events from an international perspective, will centre on the involvement of different countries and the dynamics of the Riots. A conference, entitled “Academic Conference on the 1967 Incident”, was held on 26 May 2012 at the Chinese University.

#### 10. “Public Attitudes towards the 2012 Chief Executive Election”

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms Wan Po-san and Dr. Zheng Wan-tai, Victor

The 2007 decision of the Standing Committee of the National People’s Congress that the Chief Executive may be elected by universal suffrage in 2017 represents a critical stage of constitutional development. Although the electoral method has yet to be determined, this decision has elevated the importance of the 2012 election in the eyes of both politicians and the general public. The aim of this project is to identify the public’s policy expectations of the fourth Chief Executive, voting criteria, and support for potential candidates. Seven territory-wide telephone opinion surveys were conducted from April 2011 to March 2012. Based on the survey data, 16 newspaper articles and one book chapter were published. A paper examining the influence of public opinion on voting behaviour and election campaigns was presented at the conference on “Election Systems and Democratic Governance in Hong Kong and Macao” held by the Ming Chuan University on 18 June 2012 in Taipei. A book is expected to be published in 2013.

#### 11. “Public Perceptions of Income Inequality in Hong Kong 2011”

by Prof. Wong Chack-kie, Dr. Zheng Wan-tai,

Victor and Ms. Wan Po-san

The project was conducted in collaboration with the Hong Kong Professionals and Senior Executives Association. With the aim of understanding the views of Hong Kong people, their policy attitudes and willingness to take responsibility for reducing income inequality in Hong Kong, a telephone survey was conducted from September to October 2011, and a press conference was held in December 2011.

#### 12. “Study on the Feasibility of Tax Credits for the Working Poor in Hong Kong

by Prof. Wong Chack-kie and Prof. Law Chi-kin

This project was commissioned by Oxfam Hong Kong, with the purpose of testing the feasibility of setting up a tax credit system to alleviate the situation of the working poor in Hong Kong. The study critically reviewed the existing welfare system, summarized prominent tax credit models in various developed countries, constructed various tax credit models for Hong Kong, estimated their impact on work incentives and poverty reduction, and proposed sources of financing for the implementation of a tax credit system. A report entitled Feasibility Study of Low-Income Working Family Subsidy was submitted in May 2012.

#### 13. “The Seventh Phase of the Study on the Quality of Life in Macao 2011”

This project was commissioned by the Macao Foundation. The members of the Hong Kong team include Prof. Fanny M. Cheung (team leader), Prof. Wong Siu-lun (team leader), Ms Wan Po-san (coordinator), Dr Victor W. T. Zheng (coordinator), Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law, Prof. Mok Ka-ho, and Prof. Wong Chack-kie. A telephone opinion survey on the quality of life was conducted. Policy briefs on diversifying the development of industry, regional collaboration, democratic development and governance, civic associations and civil society, education, and social security were prepared. In-depth interviews and closed-door policy forums with socioeconomic and political leaders, government officials, and academics focusing on the above topics were held. The final report was submitted in June 2012. Members of the research team are in the process of writing chapters to be included in a book to be published in 2013.

#### 14. “Voting Behaviour in the 2011 District Council Election”

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms Wan Po-san and Dr. Zheng Wan-tai, Victor

The fourth District Council ordinary election was held on 6 November 2011. The candidates for the new District Council (Second) Functional Constituency (DCFC) election, to be implemented



in the 2012 Legislative Council election, will be limited to elected District Council members nominated by elected District Council members. The 2011 District Council election was thus regarded as a new battlefield for Legislative Council seats. Three territory-wide telephone opinion surveys were conducted before and after the election to study the pattern of voting and non-voting behaviour, the different orientations among the electorate in their choice of candidates, and the impact of the DCFC election method on voting behaviour. Nine newspaper articles were published and a book is expected to be published in 2013.

#### 15. "Voting Behaviour in the 2012 Legislative Council Election"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms Wan Po-san and Dr. Zheng Wan-tai, Victor

The fifth Legislative Council election of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region will be held on 9 September 2012. According to the 2007 decision of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress, the half-and-half ratio between members returned by functional constituencies and geographical constituencies shall remain unchanged for the 2012 Legislative Council elections. However, the new DCFC election method will be implemented to return five additional seats. DCFC candidates will be elected by all registered voters except those already entitled to vote in other functional constituencies. Based on the consideration of the specific political-institutional context within which the election will be held, four territory-wide telephone opinion surveys on political orientations and voting behaviour will be conducted before and after the election. In addition to a series of newspaper articles, a book examining the voting behaviour, electoral culture, and political attitudes of young people will be published.

### Objectives

Economic competition and cooperation between Hong Kong and other Asia-Pacific countries constitute this Centre's main interest and the thrust of our investigation. Major research topics include the Hong Kong economy and its transformation; government policies; the economic integration of Greater China; and trade, investment, and financial relations between Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region.

### Research Programmes

1. Economic Policy – Focusing on economic policy issues of Hong Kong, Greater China, and the Asia-Pacific region (headed by Dr. LAW Cheung-kwok).
2. Financial Markets – Focusing on financial markets in Greater China and the Asia-Pacific Region, especially studies of the status of Hong Kong as a world-class financial centre, and the internationalization of Renminbi (headed by Prof. CHONG Tai-leung, Terence).
3. Trade and Development – Focusing on issues of trade and development in the Asia-Pacific region (headed by Prof. YANG Tao, Dennis).

### Seminar and Conference Organization

The Gender Research Centre, which was founded as the Gender Research Programme in 1985, is the first research unit on gender and women's issues in Hong Kong. Our mission is to promote knowledge in gender research and women's status. Given the interdisciplinary nature of gender research, members include scholars from Social Science, Humanities, Education, Medicine, Business Administration, and other interdisciplinary fields. Teaching and research staff can join us as full members and students can join us as affiliate members.

### *Academic Exchange Agreement*

Academic exchange agreement between GRC and Women and Development Research Centre of the Nankai University, Tianjin, China (天津南開大學婦女與發展研究中心) was established in April 2012, with the aim to develop academic and cultural exchange in education and research related to gender studies.

The topic of the this year's workshop is "Women Leadership in Hong Kong: Current Situations and Future Challenges" (「香港女性領袖：現況與挑戰」). The workshop was held from 9am-1pm on 19 May 2012 at CUHK.



In our recent study on situations of women and girls in Hong Kong, we find that while women are having more opportunity to participate in various aspects of the society, it is still difficult for women to become leaders. They actively participate in societal and political spheres, but usually take up supportive roles only. To explore this area which has been understudied, the GRC has invited guests of different age, gender and profession, to discuss this issue. At this forum, speakers included Prof. Siu Oi-ling, Head of Department of Sociology and Social Policy, Lingnan University; The Hon. Emily Lau, Legislative Councilor; Ms. Jasmine Chan, senior manager at HSBC; Ms. Yeung Mei, Director of Women New-arrivals League; Mr. Lam Woon-kwong GBS, JP., Chairperson of Equal Opportunities Commission; and Miss Crystal Chow, former Secretary-General of the Hong Kong Federation of Students.

The Organizing Committee members included Prof. Lam Ching-man, Department of Social Work (chair of the organizing committee), Prof. Anthony Fung, School of Journalism and Communication and Prof. Susanne Choi. 93 participants attended the workshop, including academia, teachers, representatives from NGOs, students from secondary schools and

### Objectives

The Public Policy Research Centre (PPRC) was established in 2005. The Centre is an interdisciplinary research unit under the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies of The Chinese University of Hong Kong. Working closely with the Social Science Faculty of the University, and also other faculties, centres and institutes at The Chinese University, the PPRC strives to promote public policy research on Hong Kong, the Pearl River Delta and also the Asia-Pacific region in general.

To achieve this mission, the Centre strives to:

- ◆ Undertake basic and applied social science research on significant public policy issues;
- ◆ Provide a platform for supporting and stimulating faculty members to carry out public policy research;
- ◆ Offer a venue for faculty members interested in public policy research to exchange ideas and findings;
- ◆ Disseminate widely the findings to the general public and scholarly community and raise public awareness of policy issues;
- ◆ Act as a bridge between the University and the wider community in the understanding and deliberation of policy issues.

### Research Activities

#### 1. “The Impact of Socioeconomic Backgrounds on the Academic Achievement of Senior Secondary School Students: The Case of NSS Liberal Studies”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator), Prof. Kim Doo-hwan (co-investigator) and Prof. Tsang Wing-kwong (co-investigator)

This is a 36-month (2009-2012) project funded by the Public Policy Research Grant of the Research Grants Council, Hong Kong. It examines the extent to which socioeconomic backgrounds of senior secondary students have impacts on their academic achievement, using the Liberal Studies of the New Secondary School Curriculum as a critical case. The questionnaire fieldwork was completed in March 2012. Collecting data on academic performance (in-school and public examination results) of students is now in process. The project is expected to finish data analysis and report write-up by the end of 2012.

#### 2. “Patriotic Cultural Organizations in Postwar Hong Kong: Case Studies in Sports, Literature and Music”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator), and Prof. Lui Tai-lok (co-investigator)

This is a 12-month (2012-2013) project funded by the South China Programme of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, CUHK. The project is part of a larger project devoted to studying the history of left-wing organizations in Hong Kong collaborated by Professors Stephen Wing-kai Chiu, Tai-lok Lui of Sociology at the University of Hong Kong, and Sai-sing Yung of Chinese Studies at the National University of Singapore. The larger project consists of eight sub-projects covering left-wing activities in sports, films, drama, literature, trade unions, education, music and the 1967 riots. An inception seminar was organized by PPRC in May 2012 for researchers of the larger project to present and share their background understanding of the research questions.



### 3. “Social Control, Strain and Couple Dynamics Affecting Gender Disparities in Gambling: A Study of Married Couples in Hong Kong.”

by Prof. Nicole Wai-ting Cheung (principal investigator)

This is a 30-month (2011-2013) project funded by the General Research Fund of the Research Grants Council, Hong Kong. It compares the pattern and level of gambling among males and females of married couples in Hong Kong, and examines the contribution of various social mechanisms of social control, strain and marital interaction to gender differences in gambling within a couple context.

### 4. “A Study on Mainland Students’ Adjustment in Hong Kong”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator)

This project was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit (CPU), Hong Kong SAR Government. The study aims at investigating how well Mainland students adjust to lives in Hong Kong campus, how to better integrate them both on campus and in Hong Kong society, and how to retain them in Hong Kong after they graduate from universities.

### 5. “Consultancy on the Tracking Study for Kwun Tong Town Centre Project”

by Prof. Wong Hung (principal investigator)

This project is commissioned by the Hong Kong Urban Renewal Authority (URA). This on-going project provides expert evaluation of the social impacts of the urban renewal project in Kwun Tong Town Centre by the Hong Kong Urban Renewal Authority. The first phase report was completed in March 2010. The second phase follow-up questionnaire survey and final report were completed in January 2012.

URA has also commissioned a related research for the Kwun Tong project. The focus is on the impacts of the renewal project on the business operators inside the affected area. The first phase report was completed in June 2011. The second phase follow-up questionnaire survey is awaiting instruction from URA.

### 6. “Manpower Survey on Theatre Workers in Hong Kong”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator)

This project is commissioned by the Hong Kong Federation of Drama Societies, and funded by the Hong Kong Arts Development Council. Believed to be the first-ever systematic survey on life chances of theatre workers in Hong Kong, the project involves a questionnaire survey to

the full-time and freelance theatre workers, and focus group interviews to six categories of working positions. The fieldwork was completed in October 2011. The analysis of data was finished and results submitted to the funding bodies in December 2011. Accordingly, the Hong Kong Federation of Drama Societies wrote report on current manpower and life chances of theatre workers in Hong Kong. The final report was submitted by the Hong Kong Federation of Drama Societies to the Hong Kong Arts Development Council in July 2012.

### 7. 《家在香港》撰寫計劃

This project will primarily use the survey data from the Thematic Household Survey on families and employment conducted between December 2008 to January 2011 by the Census and Statistics Department, Hong Kong SAR Government. Apart from the 3 co-investigators, 6 others scholars from CUHK, the University of Hong Kong, Hong Kong Polytechnic University, and Lingnan University will also contribute to the edited volume of this project.

#### Description

The Chinese Law Programme, through a variety of long and short term academic activities, aspires to become an academically reputed research programme on Chinese law and society in the Asia Pacific region, serving as an intellectual platform for understanding and exchange of knowledge of Chinese law and society. Its research activities focus on the interface between the legal system in China and its wider social, economic and political contexts, with special interest in interdisciplinary approaches to law.

#### Conferences

##### Conference on “Legal Transplant: Technicalities, Language and Culture”

This conference was organized by Prof. Xingzhong Yu in collaboration with the Law and Society Focus Area, CUHK, the Clarke Program in East Asian Culture and Law, Cornell University and the Universities Service Center for China Studies, CUHK. It was held on 7-8 December 2011.

The conference brought together scholars from Hong Kong, Japan, Mainland China and the US who are engaged in research at legal transplant, and was featured by a workshop on a new monograph entitled *Collateral Knowledge: Legal Reasoning in the Global Financial Markets* (The University of Chicago Press, 2011) by Prof. Annelise Riles of the Cornell Law School.

This project aims to conduct an experiment to examine college students’ perception of mainland criminal trials in both mainland China and HK. The study selected two criminal trials published by <http://www.chinacourt.org/> as the experiment treatment. Around 100 recruited law and non-law college students from one mainland university (Zhejiang University) and CUHK were asked to read the trials and then answer opinion questionnaires afterwards. This small-scale study is an initial stage for a possible future GRF project on social opinions (and causal factors of such opinions) about legal reform in mainland China.

## International Relations Research Programme

### *Executive Summary*

This is the 5<sup>th</sup> year since our programme was established in 2008. Throughout the year of 2011-2012, the Programme has continued to organize a wide range of academic and outreach activities, among not only scholars in- and outside CUHK but also students, diplomats, and members of the general public. International conference and seminars were held in the year and research results had been published in different leading academic journals in the related field as well as book chapters in both English and Chinese.

With Prof. Simon SHEN, co-founder of IRRP, returning to CUHK in August 2012, we worked with HKIAPS in spring 2012 to persuade the University that IRRP needs to be elevated into a full-fledge research centre. A memo was submitted on June 4<sup>th</sup>, to the 7<sup>th</sup> (2012) Administrative and Planning Committee (AAPC) meeting held on June 26, 2012, which approved the proposal for establishing the International Affairs Research Centre (國際事務研究中心) under HKIAPS. As a result, IRRP is superseded by the new IAPC starting from August 2012. Preparatory work in budgeting, hiring, and space-allocation was carried out in May-July 2012 to ensure smooth transition.

### *Objectives*

The International Relations Research Programme was founded to put efforts in fostering researches, seminars and conferences in the field of International Relations, with the especial focus in China's Foreign Policy and Politics emerged in the Asia-Pacific Region.

Our objectives include:

- ◆ To conduct academic research in International Relations, in particular related to China, Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific Region;
- ◆ To facilitate intellectual exchange and collaborations among western, Chinese and Hong Kong scholars in the field of International Relations;
- ◆ To engage in community service, as well as governmental consultation that facilitates

decision-making, policy-setting, and thereby contributes to the public at large.

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As an internationally oriented programme, our programme focuses on global policy studies, including Sino-US Relations, China and Terrorism, Chinese Nationalism and Foreign Policies and Hong Kong's External Relations. To further academic expertise and diversity, our flagship research projects are carried forward with the guidance of internationally renowned scholars: Prof. Sujian Guo (Sino-US Relations), Prof. Dan Hansen (China and Terrorism), Prof. Shaun Breslin (Chinese Nationalism and Foreign Policy) and Prof. Ting Wai (Hong Kong's External Relations).

### *Research Activities*

Throughout the year of 2011-2012, the Programme has organized one conference and co-sponsored seminars and workshops fostering academic interactions among local and international scholars. And its members have submitted as one panel at the Sixth Annual Conference of the Asian Studies Association of Hong Kong and one paper at the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Forum of the HKIAPS.

#### **Conference on "Emerging Regionalism: Paradigm Shift of International Relations in East Asia?", 9 March 2012**

To review various and on-going activities related to the regional integration, and to look into agendas and plans for future endeavors. Regionalism is now one of the main features regulating international relations in East Asia. ASEAN, a group of 10 Southeast Asian countries, has demonstrated its importance by contributing to stability and prosperity since its establishment in 1967 and recently China, Korea and Japan have shown more interests in working together and have formed trilateral relationship of addressing various issues of common interests.

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## South China Programme

**Director:** Prof. LEE Siu-nam, Paul

### Objectives

The objective of the Programme is to foster and support academic research on China by providing grants. Through the dissemination of research findings, the Programme helps to provide useful references for the formulation of public policies.

Regionally, the grants now cover studies on Hong Kong, mainland China, and the area's interrelated development with Macao, Taiwan, and other parts of the world. Individual research, interdisciplinary collaboration, and research partnerships across and outside of the Asia-Pacific region are equally considered.

The Programme is not limited to funding projects of any particular disciplines or topics, innovative research with relevance to China is all welcome. The current research areas supported include:

1. development of the mainland China-Hong Kong nexus;
2. interrelations among state-building efforts, culture, and local society;
3. institutional evolution and transformation;
4. growth and disparities in regional development; and
5. external relations.

### Management Committee

Members of the Executive Committee include Professors CHAN Kin-man (Sociology), LI Lianjiang (Government and Public Administration), Eric Kit-wai MA (School of Journalism and Communication), SHEN Jianfa (Geography and Resource Management), and TSUI Kai-yuen (Economics).

In March 2011, a longitudinal programme was set up to develop a series of comprehensive and multi-dimensional dataset on the culture of Hong Kong over a span of 6 years from 2011 to 2017. This programme has 4 theme-correlated projects and will hold a series of biennial symposium to disseminate the research findings.

Same as last year, the Programme held two rounds of grant awards. Nine research projects were supported as detailed in the list of newly funded projects below. The number of ongoing projects has accumulated to 8, one project succeeded with government grant and seven other projects were completed in the reporting year.

### Newly Funded Projects:

Nine projects were supported between August 2011 and July 2012.

1. "Constructing the Chinese model of social work in the social work knowledge transfer process between Hong Kong and Shenzhen?"

Conducted by Prof. Leung Tse-fong Terry (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Instructor Tam Hau-lin Cherry (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-

investigator. HK\$180,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project aims to identify the dilemma and struggle the Shenzhen social workers and Hong Kong supervisors have in complying with social work practice codes in the social and political context of China, to explicate how they justify and reason for the social-moral order of social work in China, and the rationalities and underlying values supporting their construction. The study will enable a better understanding of the extent that liberalist tenets in western model of social work influence the new breed of social workers in China.

**2. “Rebuilding Post-disaster Community from Inside out: Action Research on a Asset-based Social Recovery Project in Beichuan”**

Conducted by Prof. Wong Hung (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Huang Yunong (Social Work Development Research Center, Southwestern University of Finance and Economics, Sichuan, China) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$190,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project aims to conduct an experimental asset-based social recovery project in Beichuan of Sichuan to rebuild social capital from inside out and preserve and revitalize cultural and natural assets of the post-disaster community, and to identify the impacts of the “Asset-Based Community Development” model on the livelihood of the residents in Beichuan. The model may serve as a demonstration model which included systematically reviewed knowledge, grounded practical experience and critical professional reflection, to other post-disaster projects in China and other developing countries.

**3. “Transplantation of Model Plays in Cantonese Operas, 1969 to 1975”**

Conducted by Prof. Pang Lai-kwan (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$130,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project aims to explore the aesthetic & ideological factors involved in these transplantation projects, and to analyze the negotiations taken place that might reveal a different angle to understand cultural production during the Cultural Revolution. Findings will help to fill up a clear scholarly gap in Cantonese Opera study, where very little has been written about this period.

**4. “From Doing Good for Fun to Doing Good Professionally: Exploring the Professionalization Process of Grassroots Philanthropic Organizations in Southeast China”**

Conducted by Prof. Zhou Huiquan (Department of

Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Xu Ying (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$100,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to study a snowball sample of southeast China GPOs (Jiangsu, Shanghai, Zhejiang, Fujian and Guangdong) involved in promoting compulsory education in rural China. The findings of the study will make significant contributions to the field of nonprofit studies in China. It will identify areas needing policy changes, share with the organizations that are struggling to professionalize in order to improve the service quality provided by these organizations.

**5. “Miss Etiquette: Hyper-feminites and Nation making in Guangzhou”**

Conducted by Prof. Wu Ka-ming (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to examine the phenomenon of and the discourse on the Miss Etiquettes, specifically in one of the major Chinese national events, the Guangzhou Asia Games in 2010, and to study how the Chinese society in the southern cosmopolitan actively responds, contests and negotiates with the official state construction of the national subject in the era of a rising China. Findings will help to contribute significantly to the existing scholarship on gender, nation-building, state-society relations, cultural identity and performance.

**6. “Political Attitude of Hong Kong People and Governance of Hong Kong: A Comparison with Other Asian Regions through the Asian Barometer Survey”**

Conducted by Prof. Ma Ngok (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator, with Prof. Wong Hok-wui (Department of Government and Public Administration), Prof. Lam Wai-man (Department of Politics and Public Administration, HKU), and Prof. Chan Kin-man (Department of Sociology) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$68,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to examine the change in political values longitudinally in Hong Kong, in particular the relationship between regime evaluation and democratic values, in order to bring very meaningful comparison with cross-national data in other Asian polities. Findings will shed important light on the relationship between the “democratic deficit” and the current governance problems of Hong Kong, and how to develop democratic values that are beneficial to the political transition to full democracy and the subsequent democratic consolidation of the regime.

### 7. “The Development of Major Mainland Cities and Its Implications to Hong Kong under the 12th FYP of China”

Conducted by Prof. Shen Jianfa (Department of Geography and Resource Management) as principal investigator, with Prof. Sung Yun-wing (Department of Economics), Prof. Xu Jiang (Department of Geography and Resource Management), and Prof. Wang Guixin (Research Center for Urban and Regional Development, Fudan University) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$180,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to assess the effectiveness of FYP in major Chinese cities and how the state-led planning system fits into Hong Kong’s planning and policy making, to examine the development, strategy and policies of four leading mainland cities (Shanghai, Nanjing, Guangzhou and Shenzhen), and to reveal the mechanism of the formulation of urban strategies and the process of intercity competition. Findings will contribute to academic debates and conceptualization of three interrelated issues, namely the role of state planning in economic development in socialist China, the relation between state and market in capitalist Hong Kong, and inter-city competition and urban competitiveness.

### 8. “The Mingei Movement: A History of Social Awareness in Environment and Energy Issues in the Folk Pottery Industry in Hong Kong and Japan”

Conducted by Prof. Lim Tai-wei (Department of Japanese Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to understand how East Asian societies like Hong Kong and Japan transformed themselves into advanced post-modern, post-industrial societies with their rejection of modernization values, to draw parallels and contrast with traditional notions and nuances of the ideas of ‘nature’, ‘environment’ and ‘development’ in these two societies, to construct a history of a social movement that combined notions of environmentalism, aesthetics and ideas about production of the folk pottery industries in Hong Kong and Japan.

### 9. “西方宗教傳入華南鄉村社會研究：以天主教為例證”

Conducted by Dr. Patrick Taveirne (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator, with Dr. Ha Keloon (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$78,000 was awarded in 2012.

本研究在學術與社會發展方面均極具意義。透過天主教進入中國鄉村所引發的“涵化作用” (Acculturation)，瞭解天主教信仰在底層

社會的發展處境，探尋族群或地域的文化個性，促進東西方文明進一步交流與對話。從研究天主教與中國鄉村傳統文化的關係中，有助推動今天的中國天主教會和諧發展，亦有著現實指導的意義。

### Ongoing Projects:

Eight projects funded by the Programme are ongoing. They are:

#### 1. “Parental Absence, Policy Intervention, and Children’s Educational and Health Outcomes in China”

Conducted by Prof. Zhang Junsen (Department of Economics) as principal investigator, with Prof. Jere R. Behrman (Population Studies Center, University of Pennsylvania), Prof. Simon C. Fan, Prof. Wei Xiangdong (Department of Economics, Lingnan University), and Prof. Zhang Hongliang (Department of Economics) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$200,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project provides policy guidance in solving the education difficulties for children of rural migrant workers who have been left behind in their hometown. Sample surveys will be conducted in 10 central elementary schools in Longhui County of Hunan. The school performance of the “left-behinds” who lack parental care and a home education environment will be compared with that of “left-behinds” who are receiving assistance in a designed intervention programme.

#### 2. “Two Countries, One System?: A Comparative Study of the Political Economy of Decentralization in China and Vietnam”

Conducted by Prof. Wong Hok-wui Stan (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator. HK\$90,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project studies the effects of decentralization on the political economy and economic development of China and Vietnam by drawing on comparative case studies in selected cities of the two countries.

#### 3. “Chinese NGOs as Incubators of Democratic Culture?”

Conducted by Prof. Anthony J. Spires (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator. HK\$90,000 was awarded in 2010.

This project studies the internal organizational culture of China’s emergent non-governmental organizations (NGOs) by drawing on comparative case studies in two different types of NGOs – professionalized groups mainly run by paid staff and volunteer-based social service delivery NGOs. The study will elucidate the links between

organizational culture and organizational structure, so as to shed light on the role of NGOs to help foster a democratic organizational culture in an authoritarian state.

**4. “Health Inequality and Noncognitive Human Capital: A Comparative Study of Adults in the Pearl River Delta, Hong Kong, and Taiwan”**

Conducted by Prof. Tam Hong-wing Tony (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Research Fellow Chang Ly-yun (Institute of Sociology, Academia Sinica, Taiwan) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$140,000 was awarded in 2010.

This project compares the role of noncognitive human capital in explaining health inequality in the Pearl River Delta (PRD), Hong Kong, and Taiwan, so that social intervention can be designed to shape the formation of noncognitive human capital from early childhood to adulthood.

**5. “Local Knowledge of Environmental Change and Risk: A Comparative Study in Guangdong and Guangxi”**

Conducted by Prof. Wu Fengshi (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator, with Research Fellow Fang Xiang (International Center for China Health and Sustainable Development, Peking University) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$57,800 was awarded in 2010.

This project explores both individual farmers’ and rural communities’ collective awareness of environmental degradation and health impacts, and to compare the causes of variation in different communities. Sample surveys will be conducted in 4 communities, 2 from Guangdong (Dapu and Gaopu in Meizhou County) and Guangxi (Gongcheng Tao Autonomous County and Guilin City) respectively, with diverging economic development and institutional history of environmental governance but similar changes in environmental pollution. Findings will help to incorporate traditional and community-based knowledge in “modern” public policy making.

**6. “The Economic and Non-economic Factors on the Intention of Return among Migrants Workers in the Pearl River Delta”**

Conducted by Prof. Tong Yuying (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator. HK\$52,960 was awarded in 2010.

This project examines how and to what extent economic and demographic factors trigger a decision among migrant workers in Shenzhen, Guangzhou, and Dongguan of the Pearl River Delta to return to their hometowns. The empirical findings would generate policy implications to

ease the emergence of increasingly severe labour shortages in southeast China.

**7. “Gender and Justice: Alternative Institutional Ideologies in Two Social Enterprises in Hong Kong and Hangzhou, Zhejiang Province”**

Conducted by Prof. Dai Haijing (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator. HK\$126,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project studies two social enterprises in Hong Kong and Hangzhou, Zhejiang Province, providing employment to low-skilled middle-aged women in the retail industry, and to investigate how different discourses and ideologies of gender equality and social justice are practiced in the two social enterprises, and how they take on different roles in social change in local social and political contexts. The evidence-based references will be provided for policymakers of different paradigms to follow in order to put discourses of justice into enterprise operations and formulate social policies.

**8. “Patriotic Cultural Organizations in Postwar Hong Kong: Case Studies in Sports, Literature and Music”**

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai Stephen (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Senior Instructor Cheung Wing-mui (Chinese Language & Literature), PhD Candidate Lee Siu-yan (Department of Music) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$59,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project is part of a larger project entitled “With China in Their Hearts: The History, Transformations and Social Impacts of the Patriotic Movement in Hong Kong”, consisting of eight sub-projects aiming to study the history of left-wing organizations in Hong Kong since the conclusion of the Second World War. The study focuses on three of the sub-projects on sports, literature and music which are coordinated by CU staff, namely, Happy Valley Athletic Association (愉園體育會), serial novels (連載小說) in the pro-China newspaper Wenweipo, and one of the most active Cantonese opera group (南國粵劇團). Findings will shed important light on the impacts of the “China connection” beyond a number of well-trodden areas of left-wing activities in Hong Kong.

**Project succeeded with Government Grant:**

An alternative funding from the General Research Fund of the Research Grants Council was received in 2011 to conduct the study on an extensive scale.

### **“Rights Consciousness and Rules Consciousness in Contemporary China”**

Conducted by Prof. Li Lianjiang (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator. HK\$160,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project identified the strength, sources, and significance of “rights consciousness” and “rules consciousness” of people in contemporary China, so as to better understand their political attitudes and aspirations; to shed light on the dynamics of the interactions between state and society; and the consequent political changes. Two papers were published in journal in 2010 and 2012.

### **Completed Projects:**

Seven projects funded by the Programme were completed in the report period.

#### **1. “Planning and Financing Regional Infrastructure in Mega-city Regions in China: An Institutional Perspective”**

Conducted by Prof. Xu Jiang (Department of Geography and Resource Management) as principal investigator. HK\$160,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project studied the interactions between the politics and the planning and financing of infrastructure at regional level in the mega-cities of China. It examined how a regional infrastructure project was initiated, planned, and negotiated, and the major methods and political activities involved in financing the infrastructure. Three papers were published in journal in 2010 and 2011.

#### **2. “Why Does Local Finance Go Extra-budgetary? A Study of China’s Informal Fiscal Institutions”**

Conducted by Prof. Zhan Jing Vivian (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator. HK\$100,000 was awarded in 2009.

This project examined how fiscal management and central-local interactions jointly operate in maintaining and manipulating the extra-budgetary system in China. Patterns on the expenditure of extra-budgetary items, and their role in local governance at provincial level were reviewed. The ways in which the central government regulated local practices and the responses of local governments to such regulations at the state level were examined.

#### **3. “Effects of Social Capital on the Mental Health of Migrant, Left-behind, and Returning Migrant Children in Southern China”**

Conducted by Prof. Wu Qiaobing (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. HE Liping (Department of Social Work, Sun Yat-Sen University) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$130,000 was awarded in 2010.

This project compared how the mental health status of the migrant, left-behind, and returning migrant children in Southern China might be influenced by their embedded social resources (i.e., family, school, peers, and community influences) in relation to their respective migration experiences.

#### **4. “Stucked in the City: Migration and Delinquency among Migrant Adolescents in Guangzhou”**

Conducted by Prof. Cheung Yuet-wah (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Nicole Wai-ting Cheung and Prof. Sara Hua Zhong (Department of Sociology) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$75,600 was awarded in 2010.

This project provided empirical explanations on the link between migration and delinquency of migrant adolescents. The study focused on the distinctive disadvantages posed by different school environments that might lead to different paths to delinquency.

#### **5. “Values, Beliefs and Socio-Political Engagement: An Intergenerational Investigation in Hong Kong and Guangzhou”**

Conducted by Prof. Wang Qian (Department of Psychology) as principal investigator. HK\$149,886 was awarded in 2010.

This project examined how values and beliefs are transmitted between generations in Hong Kong and Guangzhou by comparing the profiles of values, beliefs and socio-political engagement of the youth in the 2 cities. Findings helped refine and advance theories regarding parental socialization and human development.

#### **6. “Why Do Some Chinese Firms Choose Hong Kong as their Asia Regional Headquarters?”**

Conducted by Prof. Ma Xufei (Department of Management) as principal investigator. HK\$175,000 was awarded in 2010.

This project studied the determinants behind the decision of Chinese firms to locate their Asia regional headquarters in Hong Kong. References were provided on the appropriate policies for Hong Kong to follow in order to better adjust itself between the role of helping Chinese firms to globalize and the role of helping foreign firms to enter China. Two surveys were conducted, one with the general managers of the parent firms in China, and the other with those of their subsidiaries in Hong Kong.

## 7. "Rising Labor Costs and Rural-Urban Migration in China"

Conducted by Prof. Yang Tao Dennis (Department of Economics) as principal investigator, with Prof. Ge Suqin (Department of Economics, Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$88,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project examined the determinants of labor mobility across regions and rural-urban sectors. It identified major impediments to a well-functioning labor market in China in order to help anticipate future wage trends and provide some insights into scientific policy making.

### Archive on Folk History in China

Since 2006, there has been an annual allocation from the Programme towards the building of an archive and a website (<http://mjlsh.usc.cuhk.edu.hk>) on the folk history of the people of China. The project is overseen by the Universities Service Centre for China Studies at CUHK. A three-year progress report was submitted to the Programme in June 2012.

The archive is a depository for memoirs and non-fiction writings by common citizens in mainland China. The website is a window through which the collection can be made accessible to the general public and memoir-writers, and to arouse the interest of the public in writing about their personal experiences with China's changing society.

## Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia Programme

Director: Prof. SHEN Jianfa

### Objectives

The research programme is focused on urban and regional development in the Asia-Pacific region especially China. This programme has undertaken research on world cities, globalization, Chinese urbanization and urban and regional development in China covering Pearl River Delta (PRD), Pan-PRD, Guangdong, Shanghai, Fujian and western region. Ongoing research focuses on two themes. **Theme 1: Urban and regional development in Hong Kong and Pan-PRD** will examine the inter-city relations between Hong Kong and Shenzhen, Hong Kong-Shenzhen metropolis in the context of PRD and Pan-PRD, as well as dramatic urban, socio-economic and environmental transformations in PRD and Pan-PRD region. **Theme 2: Population change and urbanization in China** will examine inter-city and inter-provincial migration, urbanization and urban development in China.

### Research Activities

Prof. Ng Mee Kam, Professor in the Department of Geography and Resource Management, joined the Programme on 1 October 2011. The main research activities in 2011/12 include seven research projects and one working paper series:

- ◆ Research project “‘The production of space is a matter of life and death’? A Lefebvrian perspective on old urban neighbourhood renewal in Hong Kong and Taipei” (PI: Ng Mee Kam, 01 January 2010 – 30 June 2012), funded by General Research Fund, Research Grants Council of Hong Kong.
- ◆ Research project “‘Walled buildings’, ‘the right to the city’, place governance and the delayed amendment of an outdated planning ordinance: an institutional analysis” (PI: Ng Mee Kam, 01 January 2011 – 31 December 2012), funded by General Research Fund, Research Grants Council of Hong Kong.
- ◆ Research project “Analyzing the effect of spatial interaction: The case of interregional migration in China” (PI: Shen Jianfa, 15 March 2011 - 14 March 2013), funded by the Direct Grant, The Chinese University of Hong Kong.

A research monograph is in progress.
- ◆ The Programme and The Department of Urban Planning of Faculty of Architecture and Urban Planning and Research Centre of Human Geography of Nanjing University organized “International Conference on Urban and Regional Governance in China: Retrospect and Prospect of 10 Years of Research (中國城市區域管治研究十年回顧與展望國際學術研討會)” on 1-2 July 2012 in Nanjing University. The conference is co-organized by Nanjing Urban Construction Investment Holding (Group) and Urban Planning Association of Jiangsu Province. Over 40 participants from mainland

China, Hong Kong, Taiwan, UK, USA and Canada attended the conference.

## Telephone Survey Research Laboratory

*Coordinators: Prof. WONG Ka-ying, Timothy*

*Dr. ZHENG Wan-tai, Victor*

Established in May 1995, the Laboratory now can handle 56 telephone lines, all connected to the CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) system operated through a main server. It can cope with the demands of large samples under time constraint.

### *Objectives*

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1. To provide a telephone survey laboratory to researchers at the Chinese University who want to use a telephone interview technique to facilitate their research.
2. To enable the development of new research interests using the telephone interview method.
3. To collect panel public opinion data of academic and social value.
4. To serve as a link between the Chinese University and the public by regularly offering results of survey polls on public issues.

### *Accomplishments*

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Over 1,000 commissioned surveys have been completed since the establishment of the Laboratory (about 70 surveys in the past year). Our survey findings have been widely covered by the media, thereby helping to raise the profile of the Institute and the Chinese University.

The Laboratory has attracted an increasing number of researchers from academic circles and the media who want to use telephone survey as an alternative method of data collection.

With the improving financial situation, we have designed and launched our panel surveys for academic research.

Now the Laboratory has 60 interviewing stations and we have trained and pooled over 150 experienced interviewers from amongst CUHK students as well as students from other universities, providing them with not only a good source of income but also the valuable experience of conducting telephone survey research.

### *Policy*

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The Laboratory welcomes the sponsorship or commission of surveys; it also collaborates with external researchers and organizations on projects with common interests.

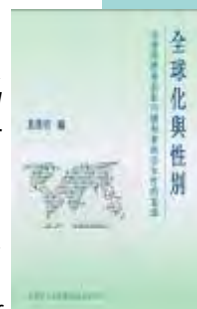

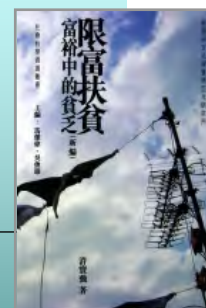
