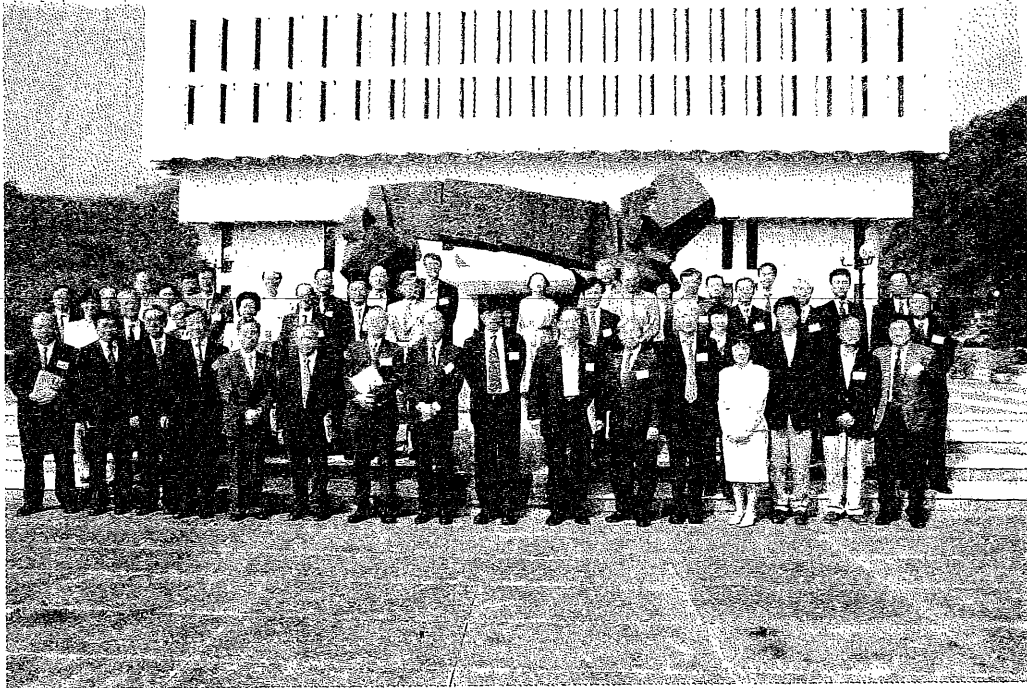
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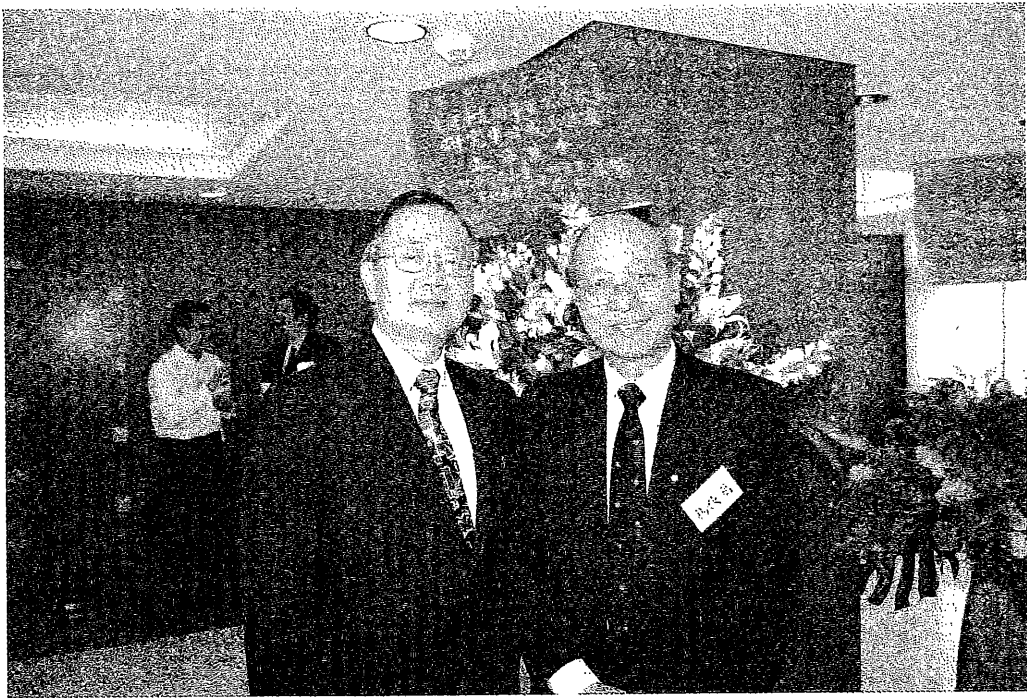

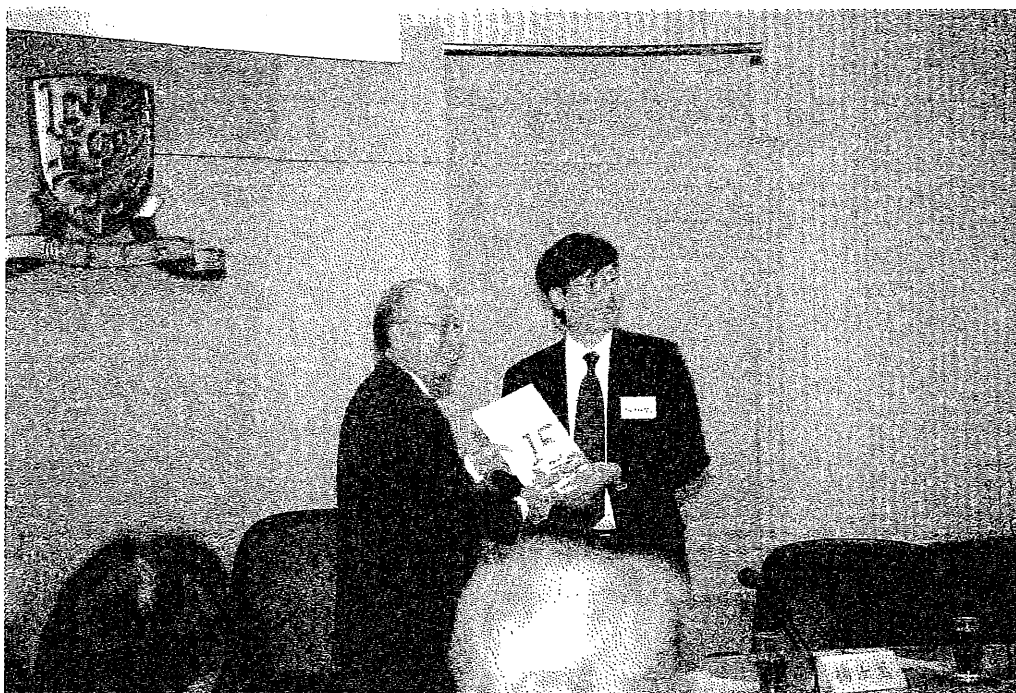

## INTRODUCTION

Since its establishment in September 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (hereafter, the Institute or HKIAPS) has been promoting and coordinating inter-disciplinary studies on Hong Kong and neighbouring Asian countries and communities within the Asia-Pacific region. The Institute aims to serve as a bridge between overseas scholars in Asia-Pacific studies and teaching and research staff at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (hereafter, the Chinese University or CUHK).

The Institute supports two major types of research activities: individual projects funded by or affiliated with the Institute, and long-term inter-disciplinary research programmes that constitute the backbone of the activities of the Institute. The latter activities are described at length in the following pages, while the former will be mentioned in particular segments of specific programme reports.

## MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

It has been an eventful year that will go down the annals of the Institute, Hong Kong and China as one that will be remembered. Many of the events have been able to and will create opportunities for our colleagues to undertake more evidence-based research to meet the mission of the Institute.

First, the Institute celebrated the 15th anniversary of its founding in September 2005, when a brief but solemn ceremony was held to mark the occasion. At the same time, a special volume entitled "HKIAPS at 15" was released. The volume provided a complete record of what the Institute was able to achieve between 1990 and 2005 from diverse perspectives. Encouraged by very favourable responses, the Institute will redouble its efforts to scale another level of success. Second, following the establishment of the Public Policy Research Centre in August 2005, the Institute, with the support of the University, founded the Quality of Life Research Centre in July 2006. The latter move was seen as a step to further consolidate cooperation between the Institute and the Faculty of Social Science under whose auspices a group of social science colleagues from several departments have been working on the subject for a few years. Professor Daniel Shek has been appointed Director of the new research centre. Third, the Institute carried out its assigned role by the University to oversee the task of arranging to critique research proposals in public policy submitted by colleagues to the Research Grant Council (RGC). With an annual allocation of \$20 million a year, it has gone through several rounds with two invited rounds in an academic year.

In the Hong Kong community, the Chief Executive, Donald Tsang, has already served one year. During this period Hong Kong has continued to improve in its economic performance, although his political reform package was voted down at the Legislative Council in December 2005. Earlier that month, Hong

Kong hosted the 6th Ministerial Meeting of the WTO at the Convention and Exhibition Centre. The week-long event fully engaged the attention of Hong Kong people. Every day, not only important discussions went on at the conference venue, but also the Wanchai streets witnessed scenes of "anti-globalization" drama and demonstration. Some of the latter turned violent towards the end, resulting in arrests of demonstrators. The "Hong Kong Declaration" was passed by the conference as a major contribution from Hong Kong. It was a momentous week for Hong Kong and a learning experience for the government and the people. In September 2005, the long awaited Hong Kong Disneyland opened its doors for business as the first in China and second in Asia. It has brought in more tourists to Hong Kong, although the numbers until now are below expectation.

At the national level, many of the policies that are favourable to Hong Kong, such as CEPA, the individual travel scheme, relaxed Reminbi trading and the Pan-Pearl River Delta Cooperative Framework have continued to bring positive influences on Hong Kong. However, the most important event over the past year was the release of the Eleventh Five-year Plan (2006-2010) that will further launch China on a path of developing into a *xiaokang* (moderately well-off) country. The ensuing community focus was whether Hong Kong might be marginalized in some of the plans that have been made known. As a consequence, the Institute was commissioned by the newly established Bauhinia Foundation to undertake a research project on the subject.

Apart from the above research project, the Institute also undertook a Quality of Life Baseline Research Project in Macao, along with the Centre of Asian Studies at the University of Hong Kong, for the Quality of Life Centre of the Macao SAR government. The project was completed in March 2006 and has gone on for a second phase. Other research projects undertaken by different programmes are detailed in the individual programme reports.

The staff of the Institute have continued to contribute to public affairs in Hong Kong and internationally. For example, Liu Pak-wai and Yeung Yue-man were appointed members of the Commission of Strategic Development until July 2007. Yeung Yue-man and Sung Yun-wing were reappointed as Chairman and member, respectively, of the Pan-Pearl River Delta Panel under the Central Policy Unit in January 2006. In addition, Yeung Yue-man was appointed a member of the Steering Committee of the US National Research Council in its attempt to develop a multi-country project on urban sustainable development involving China, Mexico, South Africa and Tanzania, with funding from the Moore Foundation.

In terms of the line functions of the Institute, one noteworthy development has been our efforts to speed up the scanning of the Hong Kong newspaper collection, a project that has been on-going for many years. We have now contracted a firm on the mainland and the process is anticipated to be complete before the end of this academic year. Our sincere appreciation and thanks go to the Lee Hysan Foundation, especially Dr. Louie Kin-sheun, for the support of this important project. We have already begun the related process of redeploying our staff and reorganizing the limited space in our Documentation Unit. During the past year, the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory was as busy as ever. Over 620 commissioned surveys have been completed since its establishment in 1995, with 50 completed during the past year. Our Publication Unit has had an exceptionally busy year, with 5 monographs published and another 14 occasional papers. The latter has set a new record, exceeding our rule-of-thumb of one occasional paper a month. We have to pay tribute to our colleagues who continued to be very research-active. During the past year, the Institute has organized 10 seminars, forums, conferences and press conferences. In addition, we were visited by 70 scholars from the mainland and overseas, greatly helping us to maintain our active links.

In all, it has been another good year in which the Institute was able to respond to opportunities that have come about in Hong Kong and elsewhere to undertake research, consultancy, public service and other activities that have justified the confidence colleagues and friends inside and outside the University have placed in us. With many events that continue to crop out in Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region, we pledge to respond as best as we possibly can.

## Profiles of the Senior Staff

### Prof. Yeung Yue-man 楊汝萬

With basic training in geography in Hong Kong, Canada and the United States, Prof. Yeung has had a rich and varied career that has spanned teaching, research, international development and university administration. He had been away from Hong Kong for almost two decades, studying in North America and working in Singapore and Canada, before being appointed Chair Professor of Geography at this University in 1984. Prof. Yeung has travelled to most countries in the Asia-Pacific region and has worked with many Asian research institutes and researchers. His research interests lie mainly in Asian cities, low-cost housing and policy studies and design for development, with particular reference to Pacific Asia. He has published numerous books and articles in international learned journals on these subjects. Apart from being the Director of the Institute, Prof. Yeung leads the Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia Research Programme. Prof. Yeung plays a very active role in serving the Hong Kong community through memberships in several public bodies providing key urban services, and he participates collaboratively in many regional and global research projects.

### Prof. Sung Yun-wing 宋恩榮

Prof. Sung is currently Professor and Chairman of the Economics Department of the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is Director of Institute of Economics, Associate Director of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, and also Co-Director of the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme of the same Institute at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is Editor of the *Asian Economic Journal* (2001 - present), Corresponding Editor (Hong Kong) of the *Asian-Pacific Economic Literature* (1987 - present), and member of the Editorial Board of *The China Review* (2000-present). He is a member of the Board of Advisors of Shanghai University MBA Center (2004-present), and the Social Sciences Advisory Board

of Lingnan University (2002-08). In public service, he is a part-time member of the Central Policy Unit (2001-04), and a member of the CPU Panel on the Pearl River Delta (2003-04), which was reorganized as the Panel on Pan-Pearl River Delta (2005- present). He is a member of the Hong Kong Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation (HKCPEC) (2004-06), and is also HKCPEC's Representative to the International Advisory Groups of the PECC Trade Forum. His research interests include international trade, economic development, the Hong Kong economy, and the Chinese economy.

**Prof. Fanny M. Cheung 張妙清**

Prof. Cheung, Ph.D. (Minnesota), Director of the Gender Research Centre, established the Gender Research Programme at CUHK in 1985. When she was Dean of the Faculty of Social Science in 1995-1996, she initiated the Gender Studies Programme. An active advocate for women's development in the community and a recognized women's leader in the Asia-Pacific region, she served as the founding chairperson of Hong Kong's Equal Opportunities Commission from 1996-1999. Her research interests in gender issues include gender roles, violence against women, women's health and gender equality. Other research interests in psychology include personality assessment and cross-cultural psychopathology.

**Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stephen 趙永佳**

Prof. Chiu got his doctorate from Princeton University and is currently Professor in the Sociology Department, the Chinese University of Hong Kong and Associate Dean, Faculty of Social Science, The Chinese University of Hong Kong. His research interests include development studies, industrial relations, social movements and the comparative study of the East Asian Newly Industrialized Economies. He has published widely in international journals and has also written two co-authored books: *East Asia and the World Economy* (1995, Newbury Park: Sage) and *City-States in the*

*Global Economy: The Industrial Restructuring of Hong Kong and Singapore* (1997, Boulder: Westview). His recent publication includes an co-edited volume in 2000, *The Dynamics of Social Movement in Hong Kong* (Hong Kong: University of Hong Kong Press). He is also concurrently serving as the Deputy Chair of Social and Economic Policy Institute, a think-tank serving grassroots labour organizations in Hong Kong. Active in the Liberal Studies community in the secondary school sector, he has been the coordinator of the Support Programme on the Teaching and Learning of Liberal Studies", Sociology Department, the Chinese University of Hong Kong since its inception in 1997 and is also a member of the CDC-HKEAA Committee on Liberal Studies (Senior Secondary). Served as the Part-time Member of the Central Policy Unit, HKSAR Government, he is a member of the Strategic Development Commission, HKSAR Government.

**Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi 關信基**

Prof. Kuan, Director of the South China Programme, is Professor of Government and Public Administration and the Chairman of the Department. He is also the Director of CUHK's Universities Service Centre for China Studies. He has co-authored *The Ethos of the Hong Kong Chinese* and co-edited the first two volumes of *China Review* and *China Review 1992*, as well as *China Review 1997*. He has contributed to *The China Quarterly*, *Studies in Comparative Communism*, *Asian Survey*, *Journal of Comparative and Commonwealth Studies* and *Pacific Affairs*.

**Prof. Lau Siu-kai 劉兆佳**

Prof. Lau graduated from the University of Hong Kong in 1971 with a BSocSc degree in sociology and economics, and from the University of Minnesota in 1975 with a Ph.D. in sociology. He joined CUHK in 1975. His major research interests are comparative political and social development, society and politics in Hong Kong, and political development in traditional and modern China. He tackles both macroscopic and microscopic

issues, such as political culture and political behaviour. His favourite approach is the comparative historical method. His publications include *Society and Politics in Hong Kong* (1982) and, with Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, *The Ethos of the Hong Kong Chinese* (1988).

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**Prof. Liu Pak-wai 廖柏偉**

Prof. Liu is currently Professor in Economics, Pro-Vice Chancellor of the Chinese University of Hong Kong, and Director of the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is Director of the EAEA (1997-2002, 2005-present), and member of Management Committee of Hong Kong Institute of Economic and Business Strategy (2002-present). In public service, he serves as Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Monetary Research (2003-present), and Non-Executive Director of Securities and Futures Commission (2005-06). He is a member of many advisory committees, including the Panel of Arbitrators, which arbitrate on labour disputes (1999-2005), Process Review Panel for the Securities and Futures Commission (2000-04), Skills Upgrading Scheme Steering Committee (2000-present), Manpower Development Committee (2002-present), Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislative Council of the HKSAR (2003-08), Land and Building Advisory Committee (2003-05), Independent Commission on Remuneration Package and Post-Office Arrangements for the Chief Executive of the HKSAR (2005-06), and Hong Kong Committee on Pacific Economic Co-operation (1990-98, 2000-06). His research interests cover the areas of applied theory, labour market and employment, and the Hong Kong economy. Besides a continuing interest in economic theory, Professor Liu is interested in the empirical aspects of economics.

**Prof. Shen Jianfa 沈建法**

Prof. Shen is Professor and Head of Graduate Division in the Department of Geography and Resource Management. He is also

Co-director of Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia Program of the Institute. He is a member of the Steering Committee of the Commission on Population and Vulnerability, International Geographical Union and an executive member of the Editorial Board of *China Review: An Interdisciplinary Journal on Greater China*. He obtained his PhD degree in Geography from the London School of Economics in 1994. His research interests focus on migration, urbanization, urban and regional development/governance in China. He is the co-editor of *China Review 2000* (2000), *Resource Management, Urbanization and Governance in Hong Kong and the Zhujiang Delta* (2002) and *Developing China's West* (2004). He has contributed to many international journals such as *The Professional Geographer*, *Urban Geography*, *Geoforum*, *Environment and Planning A*, *Geographical Journal*, *Habitat International*, *Progress in Planning*.

**Mr. Simon X.H. Shen 沈旭暉**

Mr. Shen received his MA in political science and BA in political science and history from Yale University. His PhD in politics and international relations will be received from University of Oxford in September 2006. He has taught at the Chinese University Hong Kong and Hong Kong University of Science and Technology, and has conducted research for Tsinghua University. His research interests include international relations, Chinese nationalism, terrorism and anti-terrorism and globalization. He has contributed to political science and history journals as well as book projects in English, French and Chinese. He is presently the coordinator of the Institute's Documentation Unit and the South China Program's research project on the external relations of Hong Kong.

**Ms. Wan Po-san 尹寶珊**

Ms Wan received her BSSc and MPhil in sociology from CUHK. She is experienced in conducting sample surveys and in research

in the field of Hong Kong studies. Her major research interests are the status of women and the state of the environment. Other interests include gender issues, the quality of life, social problems, and patterns of social change in Hong Kong. She is responsible for the Institute's publications and is Co-director of the Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong Research Programme.

**Prof. Timothy Ka-ying Wong 王家英**

Professor Timothy Ka-ying Wong received his Ph.D. in sociology at the University of Manitoba, Canada. He is currently a Research Associate Professor and coordinator of the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies at The Chinese University of Hong Kong. Professor Wong's major research interests include cross-Taiwan-Strait relations and social and political development in Taiwan and Hong Kong. He has published a number of books and book chapters and has contributed to such academic journals as *Nations and Nationalism*, *Journal of Contemporary China*, *Asian Perspective*, *Journal of East Asian Affairs*, *Social Development Issues*, *Democratization*, *Social Policy and Society*, *International Journal of Social Welfare*, *Social Indicators Research*, and *Issues and Studies*.

**Prof. Yip Hon-ming 葉漢明**

Prof. Yip (Ph.D., University of California, Los Angeles), Associate Director of the Gender Research Centre, has published on gender/women's history, the history of the overseas Chinese, modern and contemporary Chinese socio-economic history, and the local history of China and Hong Kong. As a member of the Association for the Advancement of Feminism, the Hong Kong Women Christian Council and other community organizations, she considers the coordination of teaching, research and social practice her greatest challenges at present. Taking power in history as her focal point of reflection in recent years, she is

interested in exploring the historical contexts of developments and changes in the operation of power in human society. She is also interested in ways of exposing the historical roots of human manipulation and resistance in daily life. Related issues include marginalization and subordination, and subversion and struggle in the fields of gender, class and ethnicity.

**Prof. Yu Xingzhong 於興中**

Prof. Yu obtained a BA in English Literature from Lanzhou University in China, and an LLM (Master of Laws) and SJD (Doctor of Juridical Science) from the Harvard Law School. He teaches Chinese law and constitutional law at the Department of Government and Public Administration. He has been the Director of the Chinese Law Programme since March 2003. He has previously served as a Lecturer on law at the Harvard Law School (September-December 1999), a Senior Research Fellow in East Asian Legal Studies, Harvard Law School (1998-1999), a Visiting Professor at Beijing University's Department of Law (Spring 1998) and as an Associate (Chinese Legal Specialist) with the Chicago office of Baker & McKenzie (November 1995-February 1998). He was also a Visiting Scholar at Columbia Law School (1988-1990) and a Visiting Fellow at the Australian National University (1984-1986). His research interests include social and political theory, cultural studies of law, jurisprudence, constitutional and administrative law, constitutionalism in Hong Kong and China, comparative law, Chinese legal history, and PRC law. He has contributed to various journals and book projects.

## RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

### Gender Research Centre

Director: **Prof. Fanny M. Cheung**

Associate Director: **Prof. Yip Hon-ming**

The Gender Research Centre, which was founded as Gender Research Programme in 1985, is the first research unit on gender and women's issues in Hong Kong. Our mission is to promote knowledge in gender research and women's status. Given the interdisciplinary nature of gender research, members include scholars from Social Science, Humanities, Education, Medicine, Business Administration, and other interdisciplinary fields. Other faculty and staff of the university may join as members. Non-CUHK members and students may also join as affiliates.

#### *International symposium and conference*

The Gender Research Centre, in collaboration with Southeast Asia Research Centre (City University of Hong Kong) and International Gender and Trade Network organized a symposium on "Gender and Trade Liberalization – Global-local processes and gendered impacts in Asia and beyond" on 22-23 August 2005. This international symposium examined the gendered impact of trade liberalization on women in Asia and beyond. Comparative analysis has been done on the rapid, recent changes that have occurred in the economic and social fabric of many countries, brought about by converging global and local processes, with far-reaching gender implications.

To celebrate its 20th anniversary, the Gender Research Centre in collaboration with Gender Studies Program of The



Chinese University of Hong Kong and Centre for Women's Studies of Peking University organized an International Conference on "20 Years of Gender Research in Chinese Societies" on 17-19 November 2006. The conference gathered Chinese scholars from China, Taiwan and Hong Kong to review and exchange ideas on gender research in the past twenty years and probe research direction regarding academic and strategic plans in the future.

### *Workshop*

The 2006 Annual Gender Role Workshop on "Work- Family Interface" was held on 13 June 2006. The aim of the workshop was to explore the current state of work-family interface of women in Hong Kong, including the obstacles and opportunities women are facing. Around 50 participants, including academics, students, members of women's groups, providers of services for women, and practitioners in the field of business engaged in active discussion.

### *Seminars and Training*

The Gender Research Centre conducted training workshops for civil servants at the request of Women's Commission, Health, Welfare and Food Bureau. The workshops aimed to enhance gender awareness and mainstream gender perspectives in their work. Two workshops were organized in 2005-2006:

One Gender-related Training Workshop for Gender Focal Points within the Administration.

One Gender Sensitivity Training Workshop for Newly-recruited Administration Officers.

A Postgraduate Workshop was co-presented by the Gender Research Centre and the Gender Studies Programme on 4 April 2006:

"Legislating Desire: Homosexuality, Intellectual Property Rights and Consumer Fraud" by Prof. Lisa Rofel, Department of Anthropology, University of California, Santa Cruz.

A Public Lecture and A Faculty Roundtable were co-presented by the Gender Research Centre and the Gender Studies Programme on 6 April 2006:

### *Objectives*

Economic competition and cooperation between Hong Kong and other Asia-Pacific countries constitute this Programme's main interest and the thrust of our investigation. Major research topics include the Hong Kong economy and its transformation; government policies; the economic integration of Hong Kong, the mainland and Taiwan; trade and investment relations between Hong Kong and economies in the Asia-Pacific region; and, intra-regional trade and investment.

### *Asian Economic Journal*

This is the sixteenth year in which our Programme has jointly published the *Asian Economic Journal* for the East Asian Economic Association with our partner in Japan. Since 1997, the number of issues published each year has been increased from three to four. Professors Liu Pak-wai and Kwong Kai-sun have served as the Secretary General of the East Asian Economic Association from 1997 to 2002, and from 2003 onwards respectively. Professors Sung Yun-wing, Kwong Kai-sun, and Chou Win-lin have served as Managing Editor of the journal from 1997 to 2000, 2001-2003, and from 2003 onwards respectively. Professor Sung Yun-wing served as Editor of the Journal since 2001. Since 2005, Professor Liu Pak-wai was elected Director of the EAEA, and Professor Lawrence Lau was elected President of the EAEA.

### *Impact*

As a result of their expertise, the Co-Directors of the programme have served in many public and professional advisory committees which are listed below. These professional activities, which are related to HKAPE, have an impact on the local community as well as the Asia-Pacific. They also help to project the image of the

Research Programme.

Professor Liu Pak-wai is Director of the EAEA, a member of Management Committee of Hong Kong Institute of Economic and Business Strategy, and an advisor of Bauhinia Foundation Research Centre. In public service, he serves as Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Monetary Research, Non-Executive Director of Securities and Futures Commission. He is a member of many advisory committees, including the Panel of Arbitrators (which arbitrates on labour disputes), Skills Upgrading Scheme Steering Committee, Manpower Development Committee, Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislative Council of the HKSAR, Independent Commission on Remuneration Package and Post-Office Arrangements for the Chief Executive of the HKSAR, Committee on Economic Co-operation with the Mainland of the Commission on Strategic Development, Hong Kong Committee on Pacific Economic Co-operation, and Aviation Development Advisory Committee.

Professor Sung Yun-wing is Editor of the *Asian Economic Journal*, Corresponding Editor (Hong Kong) of the *Asian-Pacific Economic Literature*, and member of the Editorial Board of *The China Review*. He is a member of the Board of the Hong Kong and Macau Research centre of the Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences, the Board of Advisors of Shanghai University MBA Centre, the Social Sciences Advisory Board of Lingnan University, the Academic Committee of the Research Base on the International Competitiveness of the Chinese Economy of the Fudan University. In public service, he is a member of the CPU Panel on the Pan-Pearl River Delta, the Economic Development Committee of the Business Professional Federation, and the Hong Kong Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation (HKCPEC).

*Asian Economic Journal* is a journal that is devoted to publishing articles on the Asian economies which is based in the Asian region. The journal has a wide circulation not only in Asia but also in Europe and North America. Its readership is expected to



increase as economists worldwide focus their attention on the economic successes and problems of the Asia Pacific region. Since 2004, all issues of the journal have been published on time and it is applying for inclusion in the Social Science Citation Index. The Editorial Committee is very broad based. It includes leading economists from all major East and Southeast Asian countries. Because the journal is edited, printed and published at CUHK, it bears the name of CUHK together with The International Centre for the Study of East Asian Development on the front cover as the two institutions which produce the journal. The Secretariat of the East Asian Economic Association is also located at CUHK using HKIAPS as its address. The journal and the location of the Secretariat have promoted the image of CUHK in general, and HKAPE and HKIAPS in particular as institutions active in research within the Asia-Pacific region.

## Public Policy Research Centre

Director: **Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stephen**  
Associate Director: **Prof. Wong Ka-Ying, Timothy**

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### *Objectives*

The Public Policy Research Centre is an interdisciplinary research unit under The Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies. Working closely with the Social Science Faculty of the University, and also other faculties, centres and institutes, the Centre strives to promote public policy research on Hong Kong, the Pearl River Delta and also the Asia-Pacific region in general. To achieve this mission, the Centre endeavours to provide a platform for supporting and stimulating faculty members to carry out public policy research and to exchange their ideas and findings.

### *Working Groups*

The Centre organizes its activities around multi-disciplinary working groups, each focusing on a major policy issue and under the purview of one coordinator. Currently four working groups have been formed. Themes and coordinators of these groups are:

1. Public Policy Education  
Coordinator: Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stephen
2. Governance  
Coordinator: Prof. Chan Kin-man
3. Social Policy  
Coordinator: Prof. Wong Chack-kie
4. Mass Media  
Coordinator: Prof. So Y. K., Clement

## *Forums*

To act as a bridge between the University and the wider community in the understanding and deliberation of policy issues, the Centre sponsors and organizes policy forums, conferences and seminars. Four public policy forums were organized in the last academic year and details of the forums are as follows:

*Public Policy Forum on "Liberal Studies Curriculum Reform and Teachers' Professional Development in Hong Kong" (October 2005):* The forum was co-organized by the Department of Sociology, the Chinese University of Hong Kong and the Hong Kong Liberal Studies Teachers' Association. Dr. Chan Ka-ki, Principal Assistant Secretary of the Education and Manpower Bureau delivered her speech to over one hundred secondary school teachers at the forum.

*Public Policy Forum on "The Constitutional Development of Hong Kong" (December 2005):* Participants included major political party leaders, legislators, district councillors and leading scholars on Hong Kong politics.

*Public Policy Forum on "How to Build up a Harmonious Society in Hong Kong" (March 2006):* Speakers from Executive Council, Legislative Council, Universities and non-government organization freely exchanged their view on this issue.

*Public Policy Forum on "Governance, Financing and Accountability of Public Service Broadcasting in Hong Kong" (June 2006):* Jointly organized by School of Communication, Hong Kong Baptist University, School of Journalism and Communication, The Chinese University of Hong Kong, and the Public Policy Research Centre, the forum was held in the Council Chamber of Hong Kong Baptist University. Distinguished guests included Chu Pui-hing, Director of Broadcasting, and Raymond Roy Wong, Chairman of the Committee on Review of Public Service Broadcasting.

### *Press Conferences*

In order to disseminate widely the findings to the general public and scholarly community and raise public awareness of policy issues, three press conferences were held to publicize our survey findings. Topics and dates of these press conferences are as follows:

*"Public Attitude towards the Constitutional Development of Hong Kong (1st Round)" (November 2005)*

*"Public Attitude towards the Constitutional Development of Hong Kong (2nd Round)" (December 2005)*

*"Public Attitude towards the Social Harmony of Hong Kong" (March 2006)*

### *Surveys*

Four surveys were conducted to collect public opinion on liberal studies curriculum, constitutional development and public services broadcasting respectively. Survey findings were publicized at relevant public policy forums and press conferences mentioned above.

*Survey on "Teachers' Attitude towards the Liberal Studies Curriculum Development of Hong Kong" (July – September 2005):* Questionnaires were sent by mail to 398 secondary school teachers who either teach Liberal Studies or are interested in that subject. Finally 131 completed questionnaires were received, yielding a response rate of 32.9%.

*Survey on "Public Attitude towards the Constitutional Development of Hong Kong" (October and November 2005):* Two telephone polls were launched to collect public opinion on the widely debated political reform proposed by the government. 1006 and 924 interviewees were successfully interviewed respectively.

*Survey on "Public Attitude towards RTHK and Public Service Broadcasting in Hong Kong" (May 2006):* We interviewed 1002 Hong Kong citizens through telephone, yielding a response rate of 51.7%.

In collaboration with the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory and the Social Indicators Programme of the Institute, the Centre was commissioned by Prof. Lui Tai-lok of the Sociology Department to conduct a household survey of 2000 cases on Hong Kong social mobility. Fieldwork of this territory-wide survey was started in May 2006 and was expected to be completed in October.

### ***Research Grants***

*"A Study on Social Enterprises in Comparative Perspective" by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai and Prof. Wong Ka-ying:*

This research project is commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the Hong Kong Government. It aims to compare the development of social enterprises in different countries and sees how relevant their experiences are to Hong Kong. The project is divided into two stages. The first stage involves a descriptive overview of social enterprise development in the US, the UK, Italy, Sweden and Taiwan within a comparative framework inspired by the welfare regime literature. The second stage involves more in-depth, theory-driven comparison of how social contexts vary to affect 1) the scale and scope of social enterprise development and 2) the level of success of social enterprise development. It is expected to be completed by the end of 2006 and a final report will be submitted to the government.

*"Developing Curriculum Materials for Liberal Studies (Advanced Supplementary Level): Basic Law and Legal System in Hong Kong" by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai:*

Funded by the Education and Manpower Bureau, this project targets to develop curriculum materials for the unit "Basic Law and Legal System in Hong Kong" that is part of the existing Liberal Studies (Advanced Supplementary Level) curriculum and will also be part of New Senior Secondary Liberal Studies. Main jobs of the project includes collection of relevant web links and references, identification of relevant concepts, developing of fact sheets and lesson plans, organization of workshops and compilation of a summary report. The project is planned to be completed in fall 2006.

## **Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong**

Programme Directors: **Prof. Lau Siu-kai** (on leave)  
**Ms Wan Po-san**

### *Objectives*

The Programme focuses on measuring and studying social developments in Hong Kong. Its prime purpose is to build up a comprehensive system of social indicators, i.e., a set of longitudinal data on the subjective and objective dimensions of social conditions and social changes, for Hong Kong. It is hoped that the availability of such data will facilitate not only analyses of patterns of social change and explorations of social issues and problems but also contribute to the evaluation and formulation of public policy.

### *Research Activities*

Highlights of the main activities during the past year are underlined as follows:

"Social Indicators Survey Series" coordinated by Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Ms. Wan Po-san

The Programme has been conducting a series of biennial territory-wide household surveys since 1988. These periodic surveys aim to measure the scope and extent of significant aspects of social change in Hong Kong by focusing on the perceptions, values, feelings, aspirations, and sense of well-being of the Hong Kong people on various important aspects of their daily lives.

The survey "Crisis and Reintegration: Indicators of Social Development in Hong Kong 2004," was funded by a Competitive

Earmarked Research Grant (HK\$1,554,000) from the Research Grants Council, and was conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong and the Department of Applied Social Sciences of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University. The members of the CUHK team included Prof. Cheung Yuet-wah, Prof. Stephen W. K. Chiu, Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Prof. Lau Siu-kai, Prof. Rance P. L. Lee, Prof. Lui Tai-lok, and Ms Wan Po-san. Special topics in the 2004 survey included: (1) fertility decline, continuing and life-long education; (2) employment, cross-border activities, and identity; (3) legal culture and political attitudes; and (4) health and class. The survey fieldwork began in May 2004. A general report, entitled *Indicators of Social Development: Hong Kong 2004*, was published by the Institute in December 2005.

The survey "Hong Kong as a Risk Society: Indicators of Social Development in Hong Kong 2005," is funded by a Competitive Earmarked Research Grant (HK\$1,635,200) from the Research Grants Council, and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong and the Department of Applied Social Sciences of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University. The members of the CUHK team include Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Prof. Lau Siu-kai, Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Lingnan University), Prof. Simon T. M. Ng (Open University of Hong Kong), Prof. Benny Y. T. Tai (University of Hong Kong), Ms Wan Po-san, and Prof. Timothy K. Y. Wong. Special topics in this survey include: (1) family and marriage; (2) social risk; (3) political attitudes and the welfare state; and (4) legal attitudes and retirement. The survey fieldwork began in May 2006.

In addition to the household survey, a series of topical polls was launched in 2004 to take the pulse of the society and to provide timely information on new developments falling outside of the regular trend series. Two telephone polls on government-business relations and interpersonal risk were completed in January and May 2006, respectively.

**“A Baseline Study on the Quality of Life in Macao 2005”**

The study was commissioned by the Center for the Study of Quality of Life of the Government of Macao Special Administrative Region and was conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong. The members of the CUHK team included Prof. Yeung Yue-man, Prof. Chan Ying-keung, Prof. Timothy K. Y. Wong, and Ms Wan Po-san. A territory-wide household survey was conducted in August 2005 and the final report was submitted in March 2006.

**“A Comparative Study of the Social Image of Taiwan and Hong Kong”**

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica, Taiwan. A telephone survey will be conducted once or twice a year to gauge the perceptions, values, and subjective well-being of the people of both societies. The core questions of the questionnaire will be kept unchanged as far as possible in order to detect social trends and changes, while questions on special topics will be flexible enough to reflect changes in social conditions. The seventh survey, which focused on subjective well-being and socio-political trust, was carried out in December 2005.

**“An Exploratory Study of Public Opinions on the Impact of the Comprehensive Social Security Scheme in Hong Kong”** by Prof. Wong Chack-kie (Principal Investigator), Prof. Tang Kwong-leung, and Prof. Wong Hung

This study aims to identify subjective indicators of public opinion on the impact of the social policy on poverty alleviation and employment promotion. Identifying these indicators will help policy makers to determine whether the policy is effective, on the basis of public perceptions, in achieving the intended consequences. The study is partly funded by Mr Richard Liu.

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**“Gender Socialization in Hong Kong’s Primary Sector Education”** by Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Principal Investigator), Prof. Annie H. N. Chan (Lingnan University, Principal Investigator), and Ms Wan Po-san

This project is funded by the Quality Education Fund. This study aims: (1) to establish a set of baseline measures regarding the current state of gender socialization in Hong Kong’s primary schools; (2) to examine the context and processes of gender socialization in primary education; and (3) to address some of the theoretical issues that have arisen out of the academic literature on gender in the schooling process. A variety of methods, including a student survey on gender role attitudes, focus group interviews with primary school teachers and students, classroom observations, a survey on the participation of primary school students in extra-curricular activities, and a content analysis of primary school textbooks, are being used to collect data.

**“The Second Phase Study on the Quality of Life in Macao 2006”**

The study is commissioned by the Research Centre for Sustainable Development Strategies of the Government of Macao Special Administrative Region and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong. The members of the CUHK team include Prof. Yeung Yue-man, Prof. Chan Ying-keung, Prof. Timothy K. Y. Wong, and Ms Wan Po-san. Five telephone surveys, a mail

questionnaire survey, and focus group interviews will be launched. The study is scheduled to be completed in December 2006.

## South China

Programme Director: **Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi**

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### *Objectives*

The Programme was designed to promote scholarly research in issues of development in China since the mid-1980s. It continues to focus on the transition away from old practices and the emergence of new institutions and behaviour in the economic, social, mass media and political systems. South China remains an area of emphasis, although other areas also receive due attention. Apart from interdisciplinary cooperation among colleagues in the Chinese University, the Programme welcomes research linkages with counterparts in the Mainland.

### *Executive Committee*

The Executive Committee's membership registered no change. Prof. H. C. Kuan continued to serve as the convener. Members included Prof. Y.M. Yeung, Prof. C.C. Lau and Prof. K.Y. Tsui.

### *Individual Research*

During the year, four faculty members were awarded with research grants to support their projects. The details are as follows:

1. Lin Hui, Institute of Space and Earth Information Science, "GIS-based Near Real-time In SAR Method for Monitoring Slope Movement." This proposed research aims to improve the computation methods such that the In SAR analysis results can be produced in near real time domain, i.e. within 12 hours of computation. This would address the



bottlenecks of the current methods and enhance the optimal use of the radar data received by the CUHK Satellite Remote Sensing Receiving Station.

2. Simon Shen, Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, "External Relations of Hong Kong and South China." This research has three major themes. First, it studies the way in which globalization interacts with the nature and changing patterns of provincial government engagement in external relations with reference to South China. Secondly, the Hong Kong policy of major countries in the world and their interactions with local entities in town will be examined. Thirdly, the investigator is interested in the normative orientations and values on the position of Hong Kong vis-à-vis South China.

### *Group Research Project on Civil Society*

The Project was formed in 2002 to replace "the Comparative Study of Civil Organizations in Chinese Societies." Prof. K.M. Chan from the Department of Sociology served as the convener of the project. Members included Prof. H.C. Kuan and Prof. S.G. Wang of the Department of Government and Public Administration, Prof. Lui Tai-lok from the Department of Sociology, and Prof. Joseph Man Chan from the School of Journalism and Communication. The project aims at promoting study on civil society in mainland China, Taiwan and Hong Kong, with an emphasis on Guangdong in its current phase of development.

The project at first worked closely with the Research Institute on Guangdong Development at Changsha University in Guangzhou. A Research Center for NGOs in South China was jointly established in 2003 but was renamed as the Institute for Civil Society (ICS) in 2005. Besides conducting research on civil society, ICS now also provides capacity building courses to

NGOs and promotes social innovation by publishing the *Minjian* magazine, establishing local foundations and providing seed money to newly established NGOs. Funding source of ICS includes Rockefeller Brothers Foundation, Oxfam, Community Partnership and other local donors. The institute aims at developing itself into the most influential organization with the view to enhancing the development of civil society in China.

In the report year, Chan Kin-man and Qiu Haixiong completed the research on "Social and Political Impacts of Business Organizations in South China." A book manuscript had been completed and edited. The book would be published by the Beijing Commercial Press soon.

With further financial support by the Programme, a new project was launched under the title "A Tale of Two Rivers." Chan Kin Man served as the principal investigator with Zhu Jiangang and Zhou Yan, both from the Institute for Civil Society, Sun Yat-sen University, Guangzhou as collaborators. Using anti-dam movements in Yunan as a case, the study is to investigate how two models of mobilization by civil society may affect the structure of collective action in terms of resource mobilization, political opportunities, framing and identity construction. In the first model or "external elite model", NGOs external to local communities play a more important role in social mobilization. It is illustrated in the case of anti-dam movement in Nu Jiang. In the second model or "indigenous model," social mobilization relies mainly on local groups and networks as illustrated in the case of the anti-dam movement in Jinsha Jiang. Besides this major research objective, the study will also demonstrate the emergence of civil society in China and its impacts on public policy.

### *Graduate Seminar on China*

Since 2005, the Programme had sponsored an annual seminar on

China in early January under the auspice of the Universities Service Centre for China Studies of the Chinese University. The purpose of the seminar is to provide advanced-level PhD students in China studies a platform for the participants to present their thesis research findings, to conduct intellectual dialogue with other participants and local scholars, and to carry out research at the Centre before or after the seminar.

The second Graduate Seminar was held from 5-9 January 2006. A total of 58 participants were chosen from 111 applications. Among them, 35 participants received subsidies from the Programme whereas 23 came on a self-financed basis. A total of 58 high quality papers were presented that covered no less than 14 subject areas: investment and finance, centre and region, education, population, law, society, political socialization, the Party, foreign relations, rural China, ethnic minorities, media, culture and history, and environment. Some of the papers presented had been chosen and recommended to academic journals for consideration of publication.

### *Research Activities*

The programme has continued to devote its efforts to Chinese regional studies along several lines. First, a series of research reports focused on the infrastructure of the Pan-Pearl River Delta region have been completed. Five such studies have been published as occasional papers under the Institute's occasional paper series. Second, also focused on the Pan-Pearl River Delta region has been a continuing book project on a survey and analysis of the emerging region in a systematic enquiry. A book in English, fifth in the series published by The Chinese University Press, is in an advanced stage of preparation. Third, a new series on the relationship between Hong Kong and the Pan-Pearl River Delta under the 11th Five-year Plan (2006-2010) is about to be launched. The reports are anticipated to be published in our occasional paper series. Finally, a research project on the 11th Five-year Plan and its opportunities and challenges for Hong Kong has been ongoing with funding by the Bauhinia Foundation. The programme has received a sum of \$400,000 for this endeavour, with Yeung Yue-man, Shen Jianfa and Zhang Li as primary investigators.

During the past year, the Programme has been involved in other research activities as well. Shen Jianfa has worked with the Institute of Finance and Trade Economics, Chinese Academy on Social Sciences on the 2006 China Urban Competitiveness Study (Hong Kong). A press conference was called in Hong Kong on 7 April, 2006, jointly with The Better Hong Kong Foundation.

In addition, Yeung Yue-man has been appointed a member of the Steering Committee under the US National Research Council in its project on Urban Environmental Sustainability involving China, Mexico, South Africa and Tanzania. He has

contributed to the project development efforts in a series of global teleconferencing discussions, taken part in a week-long consultative meetings in Beijing and Nanning in November 2005 to meet government officials, academics and attended a UN-China organized conference in Nanning, and presented a paper at a workshop in Newport Beach, California in February 2006. The objective of all these efforts is to develop a proposal to secure funding by the Moore Foundation for a long-term project of at least 10 years.

## AFFILIATED PROGRAMME

### Chinese Law

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Programme Director: Prof. Yu Xingzhong

#### *Objectives*

With China's resumption of sovereignty over Hong Kong on 1 July 1997 and the increasing economic and cultural exchange, epitomized in the CEPA arrangement, between Hong Kong and the Mainland ever since, there is a great need for clear understanding of the Chinese legal system and its interaction with the common law in Hong Kong. Accordingly, current work of the Chinese Law Programme is focused on issues relating to the interface between the legal system of Hong Kong and that of the Mainland.

#### *Website*

The website of the Chinese Law Programme ([www.lexchina.com](http://www.lexchina.com)) established in the 2004-2005 academic year and dedicated to Chinese legal studies has seen more substantial development. As a research tool, this website is designed to study Chinese law in a broader cultural context and from a comparative perspective, focusing on the issues specific to Hong Kong in relation to Chinese law and legal system and issues relating to law and disability, law and rural areas, law and gender studies, and law and animals, which are usually underrepresented in many Chinese law websites. By focusing on these issues, this website may emerge as a website having its own unique identity.

### *Conference, Seminars and Talks*

The first such symposium was held on Thursday, 3 March 2006, which addressed issues relating to China's newly revised company law. He continued to assist individuals who were wronged or mistreated by the legal system or personnel of the Mainland in getting justice or compensation. He also was a lecturer on Chinese law for legal training classes organized by local communities.

## FUNCTIONAL SERVICES

### Documentation Unit

Coordinator: **Mr. Simon X.H. Shen**

The Documentation Unit (DU) has continued to build up its collections in the past year. 175, 136 and 1,149 items have been added to the Hong Kong Collection, the Asia-Pacific Collection and the Academic Journal Collection respectively. The total number of books, periodicals, and other reference materials has reached approximately 50,000. As in the past years, the DU pursues the strategy of acquiring basic reference materials on one hand and other items of interest that are not generally acquired by major academic and public libraries on the other. Such items included research data, government publications, regular and occasional reports by private and public academic institutions, etc. We are currently more selective in acquiring these items than before as some of them have become available through the internet.

The most distinctive asset of the DU is its collection of Hong Kong newspaper clippings from 1955 to 2000. Functions as a source of information supporting numerous fields of Hong Kong Studies, the collection is one of the longest-running collections of Hong Kong newspaper articles. Since 1998, the DU has initiated a project to convert the 450,000 clippings into an electronic database. With the generous support from the Lee Hysan Foundation Limited in 2005, we were finally able to invite professional data processing companies to handle the project. We have agreed to donate a hardcopy of our clippings to the Zhuhai Campus of Beijing Normal University when the conversion is completed. The project is expected to be completed in 2006/2007.

The DU's reading room had 47 visitors in the past year. 13 of them were from outside the Chinese University. The reading room also continues to provide its archival function and services to the Institutes' research programmes and the University.

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## **External Liaison**

Coordinator: **Prof. Timothy Ka-ying Wong**

Prof. Timothy Ka-ying Wong is responsible for external liaison work of the Institute. This is a duty of a rather regular and routine nature. The overall objective is to publicize the activities of the Institute so that the public and concerned groups or persons can be informed of our work, make use of our research results and take part in our activities. External liaison has three main components:

Publicity about our publications includes preparing and issuing press releases to the media, distributing information sheets and order forms to relevant institutions and individuals, and liaising with our distributors.

Publicity about our conferences and seminars includes preparing and issuing press releases, sending invitations and publicity materials to the media, arranging and facilitating the reporting work of the press, and assisting the organizing committees to handle enquiries and public relations.

Liaison with overseas institutions and individuals includes the handling of enquiries and the exchange of information and publications.

During the last year, over 70 scholars from the mainland and overseas have visited the Institute, 10 seminars, forums, conferences and press conferences have been held, and 14 occasional papers and 5 research monographs have been published. On the whole, our guests and visiting participants were pleased, and the coverage of our seminar/conference activities by the media was satisfactory. Our publications were also made known and distributed in an effective manner.

## Publications

Coordinator: Ms Wan Po-san

The aim behind the publications of the HKIAPS is to disseminate and promote research on social, economic, and political developments in Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region. It is hoped that the extensive and effective dissemination of our research findings will broaden their intellectual and social impact, and allow more donations to be solicited for studies in the applied social sciences.

Scholars both inside and outside the Chinese University are welcome to submit manuscripts for consideration. The manuscripts received are evaluated by the Editorial Committee in collaboration with invited reviewers of relevant specialities. Priority in publication is given to the results of research undertaken by academics affiliated with the Institute and related to the domains of the established strategic research programmes.

Six publication series, namely the Research Monograph Series, Occasional Paper Series, the Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute (SHKDI) Research Monograph Series, the SHKDI Occasional Paper Series, the SHKDI Forum Series, and the USC Seminar Series, are regularly produced. The first four series are mostly the results of research undertaken by scholars at the Institute. The SHKDI Forum Series publishes selected papers presented at the annual forums of the SHKDI. The USC Seminar Series publishes selected research papers presented at the seminars of the Universities Service Centre for China Studies. In addition, the Institute publishes the *Asian Economic Journal* for the East Asian Economic Association.

## **Telephone Survey Research Laboratory**

Coordinator: **Prof. Timothy Ka-ying Wong**

### *The Laboratory*

Established in May 1995, the Laboratory can handle over 30 telephone lines, all connected to the CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) system operated through a main server. It can cope with the demands of large samples under time constraint.

### *Objectives*

- a. To provide a telephone survey laboratory to researchers at the Chinese University who want to use a telephone interview technique to facilitate their research.
- b. To enable the development of new research interests using the telephone interview method.
- c. To collect panel public opinion data of academic and social value.
- d. To serve as a link between the Chinese University and the public by regularly offering results of survey polls on public issues.

### *Accomplishments*

Over 620 commissioned surveys have been completed since the establishment of the Laboratory (50 surveys in the past year).

Our survey findings have been widely covered by the media, thereby helping to raise the profile of the Institute and the Chinese University.

The Laboratory has attracted an increasing number of

researchers from academic circles and the media who want to use telephone survey as an alternative method of data collection.

With the improving financial situation, we have designed and launched our panel surveys for academic research. We have trained and pooled over 70 experienced interviewers from amongst CUHK students as well as students from other universities, providing them with not only a good source of income but also the valuable experience of conducting telephone survey research.

We have conducted several seminars for secondary school and technical college students and introduced them to the methodology and interpretation of opinion polling.

### *Policy*

The Laboratory welcomes the sponsorship or commission of surveys; it is also open to collaboration with interested persons or organizations.
