Course Description

This is a summer intensive German language course, covering the full syllabus of GERM2001 and 3000. This course aims at increasing students' communicative fluency in oral and written German. Through intensive practice they will be able to communicate in a wide range of social situations with the appropriate awareness of the pragmatic rules involved. Students receive guidance in the process of composing longer texts displaying a range of registers and styles relating to past, present and future events.

This course is suitable for students who have completed German II (GERM2000) or German I & II (GERM2050) or similar. Not for students who have taken German III (GERM 2001), German IV (GERM3000) or GERM3050 (German III & IV)

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to

- Ask for help.
- Delay appointments.
- Express preference and wishes.
- Talk about diseases, describe symptoms, and ask for help and advice.
- Describe the appearance and character of people.
- Talk about transport.
- Talk about items of clothing and comment on them.
- Talk about the weather. Talk about occupations and tell family stories.
- Give tips for furnishing an apartment.
- Go shopping and make plans with others.
- Make appointments. Make suggestions, agree or disagree.
- Express concerns, sympathy and hopes.
