Course Code & Title:	SOUNDS OF GERMAN	
Language of Instruction: German / English	Units: 3	

Course Description
<p>This course is an introduction to the phonetic system of the German language. It is primarily designed to help students who are learning German to improve their understanding, speaking and reading skills. Although theoretical content on the subject of German phonetics will be provided, students must conceive this course as a workshop rather than a lecture. Constant practice through pair work, games, interactive activities, recordings will be included and active participation from the students is therefore expected.</p> <p>Prerequisite GERM 1000 equivalent competence.</p>

Learning Outcomes
<p>After taking this course, students are expected to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) generally improve their reading, listening and speaking skills in German; (2) understand and produce the rhythmic groups, intonation patterns and stress of German. (3) understand and describe some basic articulatory features of German speech sounds; (4) be able to use the German IPA symbols provided in dictionaries; (5) understand the relationship between the German pronunciation and writing system.
