Language of Instruction:	German / English	Units: 3

Course Description

As the first in a series of six language courses, this course invites students without prior knowledge of German to explore the basic features of the German language. Supported by audiovisual aids, students will receive intensive practice in spoken and written German through interactive class work, homework and online exercises. They will become familiar with the basic concepts of German grammar and learn how to interact in some simple everyday situations.

→ This course is designed for complete beginners only; no prior knowledge of German is required. If you have studied German before, please contact your teacher for placement in appropriate level.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to deal with some simple daily situations in German such as

- greeting somebody and exchanging basic personal information;
- talking about family, profession, nationality and language abilities;
- naming furniture and everyday items; describing materials, colors and forms;
- talking about free time and weekend activities.
