Course Code & Title: GERM2000 A/B/C/D/E German II

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Language of Instruction: German / English **Units**: 3

Course Description

Building on the knowledge acquired in GERM1000, this course aims to further develop students' ability to communicate in German in various everyday situations. It also seeks to give students a taste of German culture and invites them to explore cultural differences. Through intensive practice students will develop more confidence in interacting in German while further expanding and solidifying their understanding of the basic grammar and pronunciation patterns.

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to deal with some simple daily situations in German such as

- talking about food and dishes;
- talking about means of transportation and enquiring at the train station;
- talking about daily routines and past activities;
- asking for directions and giving instructions;
- giving details of an apartment and assess a house and an area in a city;
- asking for and offering help and reacting to requests;
- making appointments and delaying them.
