Course Description

This course aims to enhance students' oral communication skills in German, and to a minor extend written communication. Through selected student-oriented stimuli and topics related to social issues and contemporary affairs, students will practice the expression and exchange of personal views and ideas. Classroom activities may include in-class activities such as dialogue, role-play, narration, speech, group discussion, debate and multimedia activities. Emphasis will be placed on oral practice and an interactive learning environment with a view to helping students build confidence and develop fluency in using the language, to speak spontaneously in social interaction and acquire conversational techniques commonly used in a German-speaking environment. The skills obtained during the course are to be implemented in a video-exchange project with German learners from Russia.

→ The prerequisite for this course is GERM3000 (2002), 3001, 3002, 3050 (2010) or 3051 (3010).

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student should be able to

- express his/her opinion in discussions and use appropriate techniques of verbal expression;
- write and/or perform short dialogues suitable for everyday situations;
- assess the quality of oral statements and make suggestions for improvement;
- introduce topics of personal interest to third parties by applying digital media.

Assessment Scheme				
Task nature	Description			
Participation and oral expression	Oral expression covers in-class participation, which may be in the form of Q & A, dialogue and role-playing exercises.	10%		
Homework/ smaller videos	Apart from a minor amount of homework, students submit two short videos: one related to a topic discussed in class, and one "introductory video" in which local and Russian students introduce each other.	15%		
Final Video Project	In groups, students produce a video on any topic related to Hong Kong that they would like to share with Russian learners of German.	30%		
Presentation	There is one assessed presentation to be held in class on a topic chosen by the student(s).	20%		
Oral exam	Test in pairs/groups for 10 minutes: dialogue and discussion.	25%
