Course Code & Title:	FREN 3001 A - B FRENCH V		
Language of Instruction: French / English	Units: 3		

Course Description

This course builds on the knowledge acquired through previous French language courses. It aims at leading students to a proficiency level comparable to A2.2/B1.1 level of the Common European Framework for Languages (CEFR), becoming “independent users” of French. To achieve this goal, students will be encouraged to work project-based through independent or collaborative work with their peers. At the end of this course students will have mastered the most important grammar features of French and be able to communicate effectively in a wide range of everyday situations and a number of professional contexts. They will be able to use their oral and written language skills to relate to, reflect on and analyze past and current issues involving the French-speaking societies. Pre-requisite: FREN2002 or 2010 or 3000 or equivalent competence (Not for students who have taken FREN3001 or 3002).

Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- talk about their life, past and present, share their experiences, tell a simple story.
- make projects and talk about their objectives.
- explain problems and issues, give advice, suggest solutions, and make hypothesis.
- describe and compare their living environment.

Students will be given tools to speak about various topics such as sport, nutrition, health, volunteering, Internet, real estate, Interior design, art, and French around the world.
