
Tutorial 3

1. Sketch the region whose area can be obtained by computing the following integral

$$\int_0^2 \int_{y-1}^{\frac{y}{2}} dx dy + \int_{-1}^0 \int_{y-1}^{2y} dx dy,$$

and find the area of this region.

Solution. The region is given by



The area is then the value of the given integral:

$$\int_{0}^{2} \int_{y-1}^{\frac{y}{2}} dx dy + \int_{-1}^{0} \int_{y-1}^{2y} dx dy$$
$$= \int_{0}^{2} \left(1 - \frac{y}{2}\right) dy + \int_{-1}^{0} (1 - y) dy$$
$$= \left(2 - \frac{2^{2}}{4}\right) + \left(1 - \frac{1}{2}\right)$$
$$= \frac{3}{2}$$

2. Find the area of the region lying in the first quadrant and bounded by the curve $x^3 + y^3 = 3xy$. (The curve is called the *Folium of Descartes*.)

Solution. First we rewrite the equation of the given curve in polar form $(x = r \cos \theta, y = r \sin \theta)$:

$$x^{3} + y^{3} = 3xy \iff r^{3}(\cos^{3}\theta + \sin^{3}\theta) = 3r^{2}\cos\theta\sin\theta$$
$$\iff r = \frac{3\cos\theta\sin\theta}{\cos^{3}\theta + \sin^{3}\theta}.$$

Notice that the set of θ for which the curve lies in the first quadrant is $\left[0, \frac{\pi}{2}\right]$. Now the area of the region is given by

$$\iint_{R} dx dy = \frac{1}{2} \int_{0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} r^{2} d\theta$$

$$= \frac{9}{2} \int_{0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \frac{\cos^{2} \theta \sin^{2} \theta}{(\cos^{3} \theta + \sin^{3} \theta)^{2}} d\theta$$

$$= \frac{9}{2} \int_{0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \frac{\tan^{2} \theta \sec^{2} \theta}{(1 + \tan^{3} \theta)^{2}} d\theta$$

$$= \frac{9}{2} \int_{0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}} \frac{\frac{1}{3} d (\tan^{3} \theta)}{(1 + \tan^{3} \theta)^{2}}$$

$$= \frac{3}{2} \left[-\frac{1}{1 + \tan^{3} \theta} \right]_{0}^{\frac{\pi}{2}}$$

$$= \frac{3}{2}.$$

3. Compute the volume of the solid bounded by the unit sphere $x^2 + y^2 + z^2 = 1$ without using polar coordinates.

Solution. By symmetry, the volume is equal to 8 times the volume of the piece lying in the first octant:

$$\begin{aligned} \text{volume} &= 8 \int_0^1 \int_0^{\sqrt{1-x^2}} \int_0^{\sqrt{1-x^2-y^2}} dz dy dx \\ &= 8 \int_0^1 \int_0^{\sqrt{1-x^2}} \sqrt{1-x^2-y^2} dy dx \\ &= 8 \int_0^1 \frac{\pi}{4} (1-x^2) dx \qquad \left(\text{recall } \int_0^a \sqrt{a^2-y^2} dy = \frac{\pi}{4} a^2 \right) \\ &= 2\pi \left[x - \frac{x^3}{3} \right]_0^1 \\ &= \frac{4\pi}{3} \end{aligned}$$
