#### Exercises

- Note: Remember to add ";" if you want to suppress the output. Marks will be deducted if there is any unnecessary output. Unless specified in the question, you should not print anything on the screen.
- 1. (15 marks)Define a recursive sequence  $\{x_n\}$  by

$$x_{n+1} = \frac{x_n}{30} + \frac{6}{x_n}$$

where  $x_1 = 3$ .

Write a **recursive** function q1(N) to calculate  $x_N$  by calling function itself. Save the function in the directory H:.

#### Instructions

- (a) Input of this function is the number of iteration N and output is the value of  $x_N$ ;
- (b) Indicate the *n*-th iteration by showing "step n", *n* is shown as an integer whose total number of characters is 2. Also show the value of  $x_n$  in each iteration with 5 decimal places, where total numbers of space is 6.

Note: In order to show the result as Sample Output, Please call the function itself only ONE time in each iteration, i.e., try to avoid using q1(n) twice in generating q1(n+1).

- 2. (15 marks) Write a script q2.m to complete the following tasks.
  - (a) Define  $u = x^2 + 5x$ ,  $v = 3 x^2$ . where x is a symbolic variable.
  - (b) Find the x-coordinate of the intersection points of the curves  $y = x^2 + 5x$ and  $y = 3 - x^2$ ,  $x_1, x_2$ , where  $x_1 < x_2$ .
  - (c) Find the area between the curves  $y = x^2 + 5x$  and  $y = 3 x^2$ , save your answer in a variable A.
  - (d) Find the equation of tangent of  $y = x^2 + 5x$  at x = 3. Then set z = mx + c, where m, c are answers computed by you, x is a symbolic variable. **Hint:** The equation of tangent is y = mx + c. Try to find m and c.
  - (e) Find the volume of solid obtained by rotating the region bounded by the curves  $y = x^2$ , x = 0, x = 1 and the x-axis about x-axis. Save your answer in a variable V.

**Hint:** The volume of solid obtained by rotating the region bounded by the curves y = f(x), x = 0, x = 1 and the *x*-axis about the *x*-axis equals to  $\pi \int_0^1 [f(x)]^2 dx$ .

3. (15 marks) In this question, you need to create a function RootTest(a\_n) to check whether an infinite series is convergent using Root Test.
Remark: Let s = ∑<sub>n=1</sub><sup>∞</sup> a<sub>n</sub> be an infinite series. Define

$$L = \lim_{n \to \infty} |a_n|^{\frac{1}{n}}$$

- If L < 1, the series is convergent.
- If L > 1, the series is divergent.
- If L = 1, the test has no conclusion.

Given  $a_n$ , the *n*-th term of the infinite series *s*. Check whether the series converges using root test.

(a) If the series converges, display

The series is convergent.

(b) If the series diverges, display

```
The series is divergent.
```

(c) If the test has no conclusion, display

No conclusion.

Your solution should look like the sample output.

#### Sample Output

4. (15 marks)Write a script "q4.m" to find the Taylor expansion of

$$f(x,y) = \cos(x)\sin(y)$$

at (x, y) = (2, 4) up to 3 order. Plot f(x, y) and its Taylor expansion in the SAME graph. You must follow the instructions as below:

## Instructions

(a) Compute the Taylor expansion of  $f(x, y) = \cos(x)\sin(y)$  at (x, y) = (2, 4) up to the order 3;

- (b) Plot the surface of the function f(x, y) and the mesh of its Taylor expansion in SAME graph, where  $x, y \in [-5, 5]$ ;
- (c) Add a title as

 $\cos(x)\sin(y)$  and its taylor expansion at (x,y) = (2,4). ;

(d) Save your figure as q4.jpg by using print('q4.jpg','-djpeg').

Note: Please don't need to set different line style or color in these curves. Solution




Figure 1: Spherical coordinate system

- 5. (20 marks) A spherical coordinate system can be seen as the three-dimensional version of the polar coordinate system. It uses three numbers  $(r, \theta, \varphi)$  to specify the position of a point in a three-dimensional space (see Figure 1).
  - (a) The Cartesian coordinates of a point (x, y, z) can be obtained from the spherical coordinates  $(r, \theta, \varphi)$ , where  $r \in [0, \infty), \theta \in [0, \pi], \varphi \in [0, 2\pi)$ , by

 $x = r \sin \theta \cos \varphi$  $y = r \sin \theta \sin \varphi$  $z = r \cos \theta$ 

Write a function [x, y, z] = sphecart(r, theta, phi) to compute the Cartesian coordinate (x, y, z) given the spherical coordinate (r, theta, phi).

(b) The spherical coordinate of a point  $(r, \theta, \varphi)$  can be obtained from its Cartesian coordinate (x, y, z) by the formulae

$$r = \sqrt{x^2 + y^2 + z^2}$$
$$\theta = \begin{cases} 0, & \text{if } r = 0\\ \arccos \frac{z}{r}, & \text{otherwise} \end{cases}$$
$$\varphi = \begin{cases} 0 & \text{if } x = 0\\ \arctan \frac{y}{x} & \text{otherwise} \end{cases}$$

Write a function [r, theta, phi] = cartsphe(x, y, z) to compute the spherical coordinate (r, theta, phi) from a Cartesian coordinate (x, y, z).

6. (20 marks) For nonnegative integers n and k, the binomial coefficient C(n,k) is defined as

$$C(n,k) := \frac{n!}{k!(n-k)!}.$$

In this question, you need to create a MATLAB function PrintToFile(n) that writes some numbers into a text file. In the text file, there should be n+1 lines, and the  $i^{\text{th}}$  line consists of i numbers  $C(i-1,0), C(i-1,1), \dots, C(i-1,i-1), i = 1, 2, \dots n + 1$ .

Follow the instructions below:

- (a) Use fopen with suitable parameters so that you can write into a file named binomial.txt.
- (b) Use 2 for-loops to write the numbers into the file.
- (c) Close the file using fclose.

Sample Output: For example, if you type PrintToFile(5) in the MATLAB Command Window, the content in binomial.txt should look like
