1. Project objectives

As of mid-January 2018 the CDG project has been fully completed, and put online ready for student use. As such no more work on the project is to be undertaken.

The project's website has been distributed to students of course HIST4400C in week 2 of term 2, and will form part of their ongoing studies as part of the course. It will also be relevant to their assignment 1 and take home exam. Moreover, the CDG website is intended to be relevant to students undertaking ELTU2011 and ELTU3011, English development courses that encourage students to study/discuss broad cultural and anthropological themes such as colonization and acculturation, i.e. the topics covered by materials embedded into the CDG website.

With respect to changing the objectives the smooth planning, design, and implementation of the CDG has meant original learning objectives have been met. In light of the success of making the project Prof. Morley is now seeking how to expand eLearning tools into the field of Digital Humanities. He is due to attend, and present, at a conference held at Stanford University in April 2018 on this matter.

As with prior CDG projects undertaken by Prof. Morley the input of ITSC staff member Ms Eva Cheung was vital to the deliverables of the project being met on the timeline suggested in the CDG application in early-2017. Due to her attention, effort and general diligence despite the complexity of the project in terms of IT engineering meetings were regularly held to discuss design and presentation matters, and as a consequence deliverables attained in accordance with the timeline stipulated prior to the onset of the project. In light of this actuality as noted in Section 1 of this report the project was completed in a more than satisfactory manner, and on time ready for student use from early in Term 2 of the 2017-18 academic year. What's more given the completion of the CDG, from the students' learning perspective, the newly created online facility offers a unique interactive learning experience. Student feedback will be gauged in the coming weeks as to the usability of the CDG.

No. Evaluation plans set out in the CDG application in 2015 were clear, and did not alter as the project unfolded. As a consequence of open, regular contact with ITSC all matters with respect to the design and implementation of the project meant original plans were followed. No data was collected from students during the design and project construction stage, but data is to be gathered from talking with students now that the learning facility is online.

However, to measure the impact of the CDG and to also disseminate information on the project a number of basic actions are to be undertaken in Term 2:

- Discussion will be held informally and formally with students of HIST4400C as to their use of the tool, its usability, etc.;
- A weblink is to be provided on the History Department's homepage so that all History students can use the eLearning facility;
- A TDLEG project in early-2018 has commenced. It will strive to build upon the success of prior CDGs so as to enhance English language skill building in the History Department at CUHK;
- As Prof. Morley has been nominated for History Department Teaching Award and the University Teaching Award the CDG project will be embraced as part of a larger eLearning scaffold in the future. The notion is to ultimately establish a Digital History platform. Such a facility will operate in conjunction with the Digital Humanities Lab at the University Library, and be easily accessible so that non-History majors in the Faculty of Arts at CUHK can embrace the learning tool either to supplement their practice of English and/or to readily find primary sources on colonization and the history of the Philippines.

A fundamental success of the CDG was the capacity to propose, and then construct, an interactive learning tool unlike anything currently available to students

in the History Department. In this regard its uniqueness will, it is anticipated, pique student learning curiosity and in addition provide a security net for those students who find English reading problematic.

With regard to problems encountered none of any serious note transpired during the undertaking of the CDG. Moreover only minor changes should be noted between the original learning tool concept discussed in the CDG application and, by the end of 2017, the completed eLearning platform. Much of this success was an outcome of the partnership between Prof. Morley and Ms Eva Cheung who have worked together on a handful of online learning facilities.
