INTRODUCTION

Since its establishment in September 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (hereafter, the Institute or HKIAPS) has been promoting and coordinating interdisciplinary studies on Hong Kong and neighbouring Asian societies within the Asia-Pacific region. The Institute aims to serve as a bridge between overseas scholars in Asia-Pacific studies and teaching and research staff at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (hereafter, the Chinese University or CUHK).

The Institute supports two major types of research activities: individual projects funded by or affiliated

with the Institute and long-term interdisciplinary research programmes that constitute the backbone of the activities of the Institute. The latter activities are described at length in the following pages, while the former will be mentioned in particular sections of individual programme reports.

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies has established our reputation as a knowledge hub of social science research in Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region. Findings of our ongoing research on social, political and economic development of Hong Kong, Mainland China and the region are disseminated extensively across the intellectual community. We collaborate closely with policy-makers in the public and private sectors to provide scientific and evidence-based input to inform policy analyses and decisions. To promote scholarly exchange, the Institute organizes academic and public events regularly.

Last year has been another noteworthy year for the Institute. During the reporting period, 60 conferences, seminars, public lectures and workshops were organized, addressing diverse issues such as gender advocacy for NGO practitioners from Mainland China, gender sensitivity and education, liberal studies in secondary schools, sociology and social image, Sino-Japanese relations, Myanmar's development, as well as law and institutions in China's economic and societal transition. The Publication Unit, another core service function of the Institute, has published 1 book in *Asia-Pacific in the 21st Century Book Series*, 2 monographs and 4 occasional papers last year in addition to the academic publications of the individual researchers.

In order to raise public awareness on policy issues, a press conference was held on "Public Perception of Land Supply and Development in Hong Kong" on 17 June 2013 to disseminate the research findings of the Institute on this topical issue. It attracted more than 20 reporters of various media to cover the event. The research effort behind the scene was the synergy across various Research Centres of the Institute

(Centre for Quality of Life, Centre for Social and Political Development Studies and our Telephone Research Survey Laboratory).

The Telephone Survey Research Laboratory, which conducts quality surveys to facilitate academic research of our university colleagues and opinion polls for the local community, has conducted 60 telephone surveys (50 completed) during the reporting period. The survey results were released regularly to raise public awareness on social issues and to reflect public opinions.

With the increasing demand for high quality telephone surveys and rapid advancement of technology, the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory has reviewed these new advances and expectations. An operational manual has been prepared for assurance of swift, efficient and accurate running of telephone polling.

Since 2010, HKIAPS has extended its services to the provision of training courses related to social, political and economic infrastructure and development in Hong Kong to senior officials and management personnel from mainland China. The Institute designed thematic training modules to address the specific needs and interests of the trainees, drawing upon the expertise from faculty members of the University as well as from external experts. Through these training programs, the Institute aims to establish a platform for promoting exchange between mainland China and Hong Kong, and serve as a focal point in supporting leadership training in mainland China. In the past year, seven training courses were successfully held.



In order to strengthen this stream of service, we established strategic collaboration with partners in Mainland China. In May 2013, a collaborative agreement was signed with Yunnan Province on provision of training courses to their officials of various discipline.

For strategic planning, we have reviewed the research landscape within the Chinese University as well as in Hong Kong, Mainland China and the Asia-Pacific region since the establishment of the Institute twenty years ago. We have made a number of structural changes to consolidate our strategic position and directions in achieving its mission and objectives.

First, The Institute will further strengthen our platform for consolidating cross-disciplinary in social science research. Two research programmes were upgraded as research centres: The International Affairs Research Centre in August 2012; the Research Centre for Urban and Regional Development has been renamed in March 2013.

Second, The Institute will continue to review the role of the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory with a view of exploring the capacity to incorporate modern information technology to conduct state-of-the-art opinion polls.

Third, the Institute, via its Research Centres and Programmes, will continue to strengthen its collaboration with renowned academia in Greater China and regional partners in other parts of Asia. For example, we co-organized the China-India Conference with University of Malaya and University of Hyderabad in Kuala Lumpur in December 2012. A follow up conference in Hong Kong is being planned

In addition to advancing academic research, the Institute considers policy research an integral function whereby we contribute to evidence-based policy recommendations and decisions. The Institute provides the platform to facilitate our colleagues' engagement in policy research and knowledge transfer.

The contributions of the Research Centres and Programmes to the Institute's collective accomplishment in the past year are described in the ensuing individual reports. Here, I would like to

express my sincere gratitude and appreciation to the Management Committee and all our colleagues in the Institute. Their passion, commitment, professionalism and excellent teamwork are most invaluable to the development of the Institute. I am particularly grateful for our Associate Directors, Professors Stephen W. K. Chiu, Sung Yun-wing and Timothy K. Y. Wong.

I wish to take this opportunity to recognize all our current and former colleagues for their contributions to our accomplishments in the past year. With our sustained and concerted efforts, I have every confidence that the Institute will build on our strength to make even greater strides in promoting evidence-based knowledge to serve the society.

PROFILES OF THE SENIOR STAFF

CHAN Kin-man (陳健民)

PhD (Sociology), Yale University

Professor Chan's research interests include democracy, civil society and governance, social movement, corruption and political trust. He serves in the editorial boards of *Journal of Civil Society*, *China Non-Profit Review* (Beijing) and *Third Sector Review* (Taiwan), and is academic advisor of China Charity and Donation Information Center under the Ministry of Civil Affairs in China. He is the Chair of Adjudication Committee (2009, 2010) of the Philanthropy Awards of the Jet Li One Foundation, and Strategic Advisor of the Guangdong Harmonious Foundation. In Hong Kong, his previous community engagements include member of Community Research Committee of the Independent Commission Against Corruption, part-time member of Central Policy Unit, founding member of Hong Kong Democratic Development Network, member of Chief Executive Election Committee (higher education subsector), and he is currently Director of Hong Kong Civil Education Foundation and Advisor to the Hong Kong Social Enterprise Incubation Centre. He has published in *Journal of Civil Society*, *Communist and Post-Communist Studies*, *Sociological Research* (Beijing), and other academic journals. He is the co-author of several books including *Stories and Theories of Democracy* (with Choy Chi Keung), *Contentious Views: Nine Debates that Changed Hong Kong* (with Ng Shu Yui), *One Country Two Systems* (with Tsui Sing Yan), *Trade Association and Social Capital* (with Qiu Haixiong), and he is the sole author of *Towards Civil Society and Civil Society Perspective: Towards Good Governance*. Professor Chan is also Associate Director of the Center for Entrepreneurship at CUHK, as well as Visiting Professor of Sociology and Chair of Board of Directors at the Institute for Civil Society in Sun Yat-sen (Zhongshan) University of Guangzhou.

Professor Cheung was formerly Dean of the Faculty of Social Science and Chairperson of the Department of Psychology. An active advocate for promoting women's status through scientific research. She established the Gender Research Centre in 1985 and served as the Director until 2010., and initiated the Gender Studies Programme at CUHK. Her work has led to increased awareness of gender issues in

the academia and the community.

Professor Cheung obtained her bachelor's degree in Psychology from the University of California, Berkeley, and PhD in Psychology from the University of Minnesota. Her research expertise lies in cross-cultural personality assessment and psychopathology, gender equality, and women leadership. Professor Cheung is currently President of the International Test Commission, a Fellow and former President of the Hong Kong Psychological Society, and a Fellow of the American Psychological Association (APA) as well as the Association for Psychological Science (APS).

Professor Cheung is dedicated to public service and has served on many government committees and advisory bodies. From 1996 to 1999, She served as the Founding Chairperson of the Hong Kong Equal Opportunities Commission, setting up the mechanism to eliminate discrimination and promote equal opportunities for women and men, and for people with disabilities. Currently she is serving in the Electoral Affairs Commission, the Women's Commission, the Independent Police Complaints Council, the Regional Council, and the Advisory Committee on Social Work Training and Manpower Planning. She was invited as a special representative for the 7th-10th National Congress of Chinese Women. In honour of her contributions to the community, she was appointed Justice of Peace in 1988 and a Hong Kong Affairs Advisor in 1995-97. She was made an Officer of The Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (OBE) in 1997.

Professor Cheung's research covers cross-cultural personality assessment, clinical and community psychology, women's leadership, and gender equality. She has published and lectured widely internationally. Her academic publications total over 180 international refereed journal articles, book chapters, books and monographs. Her academic honours and awards include the APA Award for Distinguished Contributions to the International Advancement of Psychology 2012, Distinguished International Psychologist Award of APA Division 52 (2005), and Distinguished Leadership Award for Internationals from the University of Minnesota (2003).

She is also currently an appointed member of government advisory bodies of HKSAR including Commission on Youth, Home Affairs Bureau (2009-present), Treatment and Rehabilitation Subcommittee, Action Committee Against Narcotics, Narcotics Bureau (2009-present), and Advisory Committee on Admission of Quality Migrants and Professionals, Department of Immigration (2010-present).

He has published widely in international journals and has also written three co-authored books: *East Asia and the World Economy* (1995, Newbury Park: Sage), *City-States in the Global Economy: The Industrial Restructuring of Hong Kong and Singapore* (1997, Boulder: Westview), and *Hong Kong: Becoming a Chinese Global City* (1997, London: Routledge). Active in the Liberal Studies community in the secondary school sector, he has been the coordinator of the Support Programme on the Teaching and Learning of Liberal Studies, Sociology Department, CUHK since its inception in 1997 and is also the Chair of the CDC-HKEAA Committee on Liberal Studies (Senior Secondary). He also served as the Part-time Member of the Central Policy Unit, and was a member of the Strategic Development Commission of the HKSAR Government.

Her research interests include gender, health, migration, family and transitional justice. Her research papers were published in various international journals, including *American Journal of Sociology, Sociology of Health and Illness, The China Quarterly, Political Psychology, Social Science and Medicine, AIDS Care, Journal of Conflict Resolution, International Migration Review, Human Rights Quarterly, Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Journal of Interpersonal Violence, Culture, Health and Sexuality, and American Journal of Gastroenterology.* Her current projects examine the impact

of migration on family lives and gender equalities in intimate relationships.

Professor Chong's main research areas include Econometrics and Finance. He has published over 250 Chinese and English articles covering a wide spectrum of topics in Econometrics, Finance, Mathematics, Psychology, Education, and the Hong Kong Economy. He ranks top 37th worldwide in theoretical econometrics and top 5% authors worldwide according to the number of distinct works and number of journal pages per author. His papers appear in reputable international journals, including *Journal of Econometrics, Econometric Theory, Econometric Review, Econometrics Journal, Journal of Banking and Finance, Financial Management, Quantitative Finance, Financial Review, Pacific-Basin Finance Journal, Journal of Economic Psychology, Southern Economic Journal, Economics Letters and China Economic Review.* Some of his papers are lead articles or the most downloaded papers of the journals. Prof. Chong has been a Part-time member of the Central Policy Unit of the HKSAR Government. He is currently a member of Standard Working Hours Committee of the HKSAR Government, the associate editor of *Singapore Economic Review* and *Economics Bulletin*, the Associate Dean of Students of New Asia College, a member of the Board of Governors of Hong Lok Yuen International School.

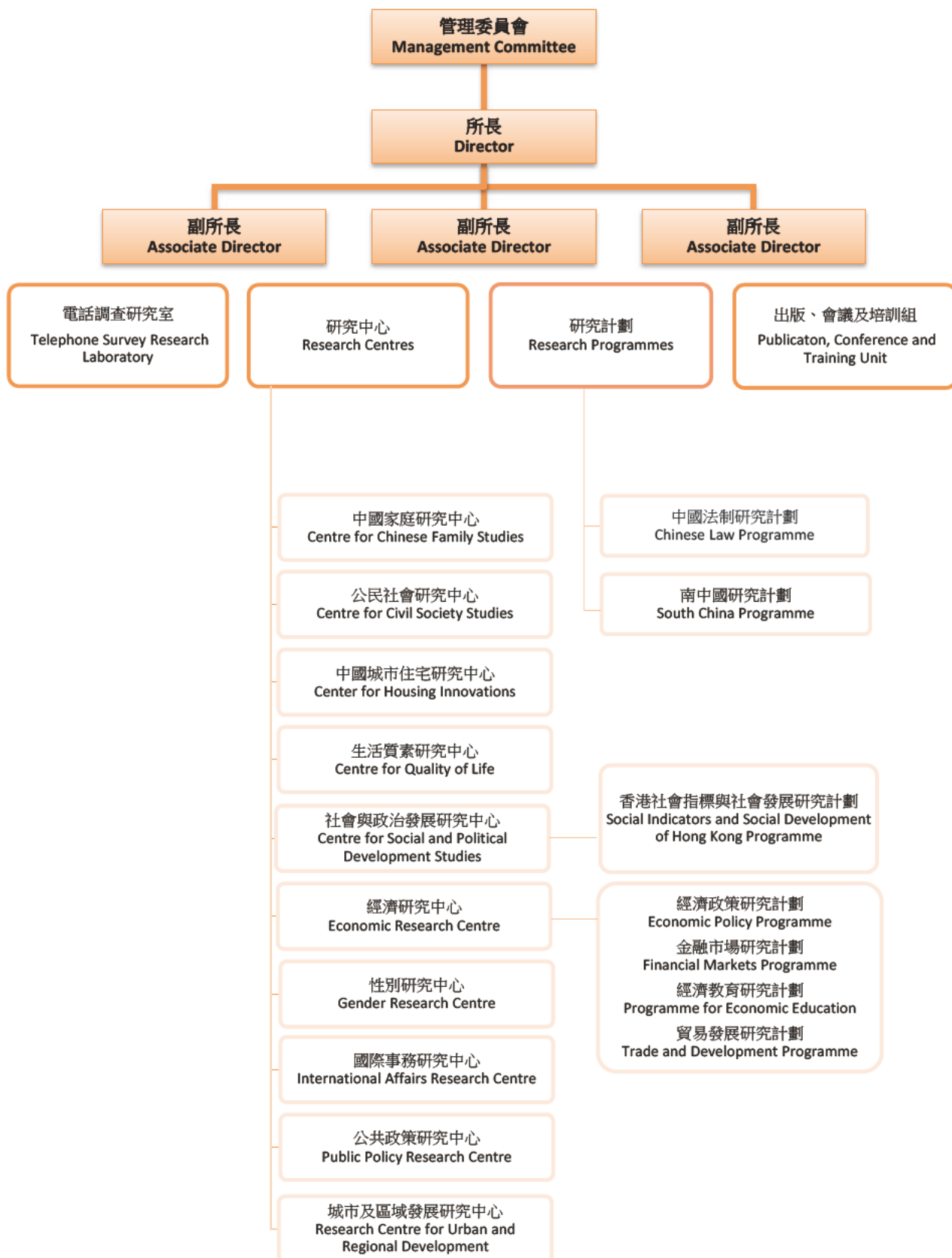

Objectives

The Centre is a cross-disciplinary research organization for family studies in Chinese societies. Our goal is to establish a platform for promoting empirical research and intellectual exchanges among family scholars. One of our missions is to disseminate research data to facilitate family research through resource sharing. Recently, the Centre has completed a comparative family survey with Peking University and Fudan University in three Chinese cities: Hong Kong, Beijing and Shanghai. These surveys document major aspects of family life and the course of family changes in the context of rapid social transformations in Chinese societies. A data archive will be established to disseminate the survey data to all interested family scholars and to inform the public and policy makers on pressing family issues.

Background

The Centre for Civil Society Studies (CCSS) was established in 2008 under the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies at CUHK.

Objectives

The mission of the Centre is to enhance the development of civil society in Chinese societies through research and education. The Centre has the following objectives:

1. To provide database support for academic and consultancy research on civil society in Chinese societies, including mainland China, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Macau;
2. To promote public awareness and disseminate advanced knowledge of civil society through educational programs and other academic activities;
3. To facilitate cooperation across sectors by building a network of academic institutes, governments, businesses and NGOs in the region; and
4. To enhance innovation in public policy making by promoting the importance of civil society in good governance.

Research-related Activities

A. Database Construction

CCSS was established in 2008 with a grant from the University's Focused Investment Scheme. The Centre built three civil society databases over the years: 1) NGO Archives, 2) Collective Action Database, and 3) Civil Society Opinion Survey Datasets. With the completion of the data collection work by end of 2012, the originally planned database construction tasks have been concluded. Selective datasets will be made available for use by local and international scholars upon application by end of 2103.

B. Applied Research Projects

New research projects and developments over the past year comprise three broad areas. First, CCSS undertook NGO case writing and grant evaluation studies commissioned by philanthropic institutions such as the Global Greengrants Fund and the Centre for Asian Philanthropy and Society. Second, in its effort to support the development of grassroots nonprofit groups in China, the Centre undertook needs assessment and capacity building activities for community-based HIV/AIDS organizations, helping these nonprofit groups to strengthen organizational management and network governance. Third, the Centre conducted policy research and supported a number of initiatives to strengthen policy exchange and dialogue. For instance, the Centre supported the Asia Foundation's effort to build the Mainland-Hong Kong Multi-stakeholder Platform for More Effective Philanthropy. In May 2013, CCSS also joined a research consortium to conduct the Social Enterprise Sector Landscape Study commissioned by the Social Enterprise Advisory Committee under the Home Affairs Bureau of the Hong Kong Government.

C. Organization of the 6th China Charity 100 Forum at CUHK

CCSS hosted the 6th China Charity 100 Forum at the CUHK campus in November with the theme "Cross-sector Collaboration – Diversity and Innovation" (the event was co-hosted with the Peter F. Drucker Academy in Hong Kong). Over forty NGO and charity sector leaders and academics from Hong Kong, Taiwan, Macau and Mainland China participated in the two-day event. Participants debated contending issues and emerging development trends concerning subvention and service contracting arrangements, use of consultative bodies as a means to enhance civic engagement, as well as new directions in promoting corporate social engagement and social entrepreneurship. Forum participants also spent a day visiting local institutions

including the Hong Kong Consumer Council, a multi-service social welfare organization, and social enterprises

D. Seminars

During the 2012/13 academic year, the Centre organized 19 seminars and civil society salons (with some of the events being co-organized with the Universities Service Centre for China Studies). The seminars covered a wide range of topics from NGO management practices to civil society theories and cutting-edge citizen sector practices. The events were well received by students, scholars and NGO practitioners.

Education and Professional Development Activities

A. Southern China Visiting Fellows Program

In response to the enormous capacity building needs of the social and philanthropic sector in China, the Centre continued to organize its flagship Visiting Fellows Program which allows nonprofit practitioners and civil society stakeholders from Mainland China to spend time in Hong Kong to attend seminars and conduct field research. Launched since 2008, the Visiting Fellows Program has three main objectives:

- i) to allow civil society stakeholders in China to learn cutting-edge developments in civil society for the promotion of social innovation and good governance;
- ii) to help program participants gain first-hand experience in NGO management; and
- iii) to build a network of civil society stakeholders within and outside of the government in China.

During the period between August 2012 and July 2013, three strategic groups of civil society practitioners have joined the program. As in the previous year, they included NGO workers, executives of intermediaries and support organizations, officials from Civil Affairs and other government authorities, and scholars involved in teaching and researching civil society and social welfare. Besides, selected journalists and business entrepreneurs have also joined the program as they also played an important role in fostering civil society in China.

In 2012-13, the Centre hosted 35 visitors which were picked from a pool of 180 applicants. Over the period of four years, the Centre has already hosted 142 fellows, with the length of each visit lasted from two to four

weeks. Activities include workshops, seminars, site visits, short-term internship, as well as conducting independent research.

B. Gender Advocacy Workshop

This year, the Centre launched the Gender Advocacy Workshop for NGO practitioners from Mainland China with the following objectives:

- i) to allow NGO workers to deepen their knowledge on theories of civil society, social innovation and social gender equality;
- ii) to equip NGO workers with both the knowledge and skills in advocacy, covering a wide range of topics including different social gender perspectives, social research method, media relation, and creative action planning; and
- iii) to provide opportunities for NGO workers to learn from actual case practices through field visits to local NGOs in Hong Kong.

The Centre hosted 25 highly qualified fellows who are senior practitioners working in the social gender field. Activities of the seven-day workshop include lectures on introductory theory, three days of interactive practice training, field visits to local NGOs, and experience sharing sessions.

C. Special Week-long Workshops for Policy Researchers and Foundation Leaders

Commissioned by the China Philanthropy Research Institute (CPRI) at the Beijing Normal University – an influential policy research centre promoting the development of indigenous philanthropy in China – CCSS organized two tailor-made week-long visiting programs for distinguished civil society researchers and foundation leaders recruited by CPRI from all over the country. In the Executive Seminar on Policy Research, lectures and seminars were organized to cover topics including policy research methods, policy brief preparation, and practical guides on outreaching for soliciting support from other government units and the society. The Seminar for Foundation Leaders, on the other hand, covered areas including understanding social policy and welfare systems in Hong Kong, and examining approaches to develop strategic partnerships with non-profit and grassroots organizations in service collaborations. Participants had the opportunity to visit local NGOs and learned practical skills on community engagement and fundraising, among other areas. In total more than 30 participants joined the two week-long visiting programs in Hong Kong.

Other Exchange and Student Activities

A. I.CARE NGO Internship in Greater China

To promote the all-round development of CUHK students through civic engagement and active service learning, the Centre in the past two summers has organized an eight-week internship program attaching undergraduate CUHK students to NGOs in Mainland China and Taiwan. The total number of NGOs participated in the program in 2013 has increased from six to nine:

As with the previous year, the internship program was organized with support provided by the student group Youth Civil Society. For 2013, funding support was provided by the C. C. Wu Cultural & Education Foundation and the CUHK Global Internship Programme. The number of students serving as NGO interns has increased from 21 to 26, which was selected out of around 300 applicants. In addition to gaining valuable experience through the NGO attachment, students also had the opportunity to talk to the local people and learn about the social issues faced by the local communities. Students have found the internship program a life-changing experience, helping them better understand social issues under different social and cultural contexts.

B. I.CARE Lecture on Civility and Campus Events

With an aim to strengthen social and civic engagement in our society, our Centre was one of the co-organisers to launch the University Lecture on Civility at CUHK since 2011, inviting scholars, artists and public figures to share their views on civility with staff and students, as well as members of the public.

This year, the guest speakers for the lectures included Ms. Hu Shu-Li, Prof. Kwan Tze Wan, Mr. Leung Wen Tao, Prof. Lo Wei Lin, Dr. K. S. Louie, Mr. Lam Tao Kwan, Mr. Wu Nian Zhen and Mr. Yang Zhao. Prof. Joseph Sung, together with five other doctors and ex-patients suffered from the SARS outbreak in 2003, also spoke in one of the lectures. Since its inception, the University Lectures on Civility have become signature events of CUHK with each lecture attracting more than 500 attendees on average.

Apart from the lecture series, other campus events were also organized this year. Thanks to CUHK alumni donating their book collections, the I.CARE Homecoming Book Festival was organized to promote the culture of reading, while also served as a platform for facilitating the exchange of second hand books. In a week, over 10,000 copies of books were collected, and over 2,000 students visited the book fair just on the opening day.

The CU Hiking Day, on the other hand, provided CU-ers a rare opportunity to step into and explore five landmarks in the CUHK campus, viz. the New Asia College and United College water towers, the rooftop of F.Y.T. Remote Sensing Science Building, the Satellite Remote Sensing Receiving Station and the Vice-Chancellor's Lodge. At the "Hello Future" concert – a rock concert held at the Chung Chi College Chapel – over 1,500 students envisioned and welcomed the future with music.

In all, more than ten thousand people including students, staff, alumni and members of the public participated in the various I.CARE events this year.

Background and Objectives

Under the guidance and support of the Science and Technology Committee (STC) of the Ministry of Housing and Urban Rural Development (MOHURD), PRC, the Center for Housing Innovations (CHI) was established in 1998 at the 301 Conference Room of the Ministry in Beijing under the supports from the leadership of the Chinese University of Hong Kong. The management and development of CHI are advised by the Ministry senior leadership, and are operating on a self-financed basis. Long Before her establishment in 1998, CHI has started her researches since 1993. CHI has assisted the nation in conducting various prominent research projects, for example, the SARS research, housing privatization studies, Green Building Label development, etc. CHI engaged not only in research, but also in connecting professionals to support the developments of mainland China, Hong Kong and Taiwan. Centre for Quality of Life

Objectives

The Centre aims at promoting scholarly research on issues of quality of life in the world in general and Hong Kong in particular through cross-disciplinary research, academic exchange activities, and cross-institutional collaboration. Besides, the Centre is committed to produce knowledge on quality of life that contributes to social service development, policy formulations and promotion of the quality of life of people in Hong Kong.

Research Activities

CUHK QoL Index

During the year, the Centre continued with the longitudinal study of the CUHK Hong Kong Quality of Life Index (QoL Index). Incorporating the effort and expertise of faculty members from different disciplines, the Faculty of Social Science has compiled the QoL Index since 2002. Starting from 2003, the Index is updated and released annually.

The QoL Index is developed to address the following objectives:

1. To measure and monitor the quality of life in Hong Kong in the 21st century;
2. To engage relevant parties in promoting the quality of life in Hong Kong;
3. To provide policy-makers and the community with useful statistics on the quality of life in Hong Kong; and
4. To advocate the quality of life in Hong Kong and draw public attention to the issue of quality of life.

The QoL Index is a composite index. It consists of 21 indicators that are grouped into three subgroups, including Social, Economic and Environmental sub-indexes. Among the 21 indicators, six are compiled by the Centre, based on data

collected by surveys conducted by the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies of the University. These indicators are stress index, general life satisfaction index, press freedom index, press criticism index, government performance index and index of current economic conditions. All other indices are obtained from the government and related institutions.

Based on surveys, the Indices of Consumer Confidence, Consumer Sentiment and Employment Confidence are compiled every quarterly and the results are released on the Centre's website at <http://www.cuhk.edu.hk/ssc/qol/eng/index.html>. The Centre has been requested by organizations such as Bloomberg and Thomson Reuters to provide them with the latest survey results on a continuous basis.

MTR-CUHK Youth QoL Index

Parallel to the CUHK QoL Index, the Centre launched the MTR-CUHK Youth QoL Index Financially supported by a donation of HK\$2.16 million from the MTR Corporation. The project is conducted for 5 years (2012-2017). A telephone survey was conducted in April and May 2013 to collect data on the eight life domains of youth in Hong Kong.

Hong Kong People's Opinion on Housing, Land Supply and Development

A telephone survey was conducted in March and April 2013 to gauge Hong Kong people's opinion on housing, land supply and development.

Objectives

The aims of the Centre are to explore and summarize experiences and lessons from the practice of “one country, two systems”; to generate scientific and applied theories and to formulate relevant policies for the reference of stakeholders from different sectors of society; and to stimulate research on local social and political transformations. Its concrete objectives include:

- ◆ To analyze the structure and special nature of social classes and political groups in Hong Kong;
- ◆ To promote high-quality research on local society, politics, and related policies;
- ◆ To unearth and develop think-tank talent through related research;
- ◆ To provide a platform for rational and evidence-based discussions on local social and political developments; and
- ◆ To disseminate our research findings to interested associations and individuals for reference.

The **Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong Programme**, with Ms WAN Po-san as the Director, is operated under the auspices of the Centre. The focus of the Programme is on measuring and studying social developments in Hong Kong. Its prime purpose is to build up a comprehensive system of social indicators for Hong Kong, i.e., a set of longitudinal data on the subjective and objective dimensions of local social conditions and social changes.

It aims to understand and compare the perceptions, assessments, and orientations of the general public in Hong Kong and Taiwan with respect to the impact of China, and the opportunities and risks of closer integration between Hong Kong/Taiwan and mainland China. Major research topics include competition and conflict over resources (e.g., unfairness, relative deprivation, economic nationalism, etc.), and the advantages and disadvantages of exchanges and integration (e.g., impact on the quality of life, social differentiation, the gap between rich and poor, civil society, etc.). The first telephone survey was conducted simultaneously in Hong Kong and Taiwan in April 2013.

Prof. Yi Chin-Chun

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica. A telephone opinion survey is conducted simultaneously in Hong Kong and Taiwan once or twice a year using a common questionnaire to gauge the perceptions, values, and subjective well-being of the people of both societies. The core questions of the questionnaire are kept unchanged as far as possible to facilitate the detection of social

trends and changes, while questions on special topics are flexible enough to reflect changes in social conditions. The thirteenth survey, which focused on subjective well-being, sociopolitical trust, and social problems, was carried out in December 2011. The sixth conference on the social image of Taiwan and Hong Kong was held on 12-13 April 2013 at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK). A total of 13 presentations were made at the conference.

3. “A Study of the Patterns of Psychotropic Drug Abuse among At-Risk Youth in Hong Kong: Perceptions Associated with Ketamine Use and Their Construction”

coordinated by Dr Lee King-wa, Dr Law Chi-kin, and Dr. Chan Ching-ye

This project is funded by a direct grant from CUHK. The aim is to find answers to the following questions: (1) What are the latest patterns of psychotropic drug abuse among at-risk youth in Hong Kong? (2) Is normalization of drug use taking place in Hong Kong? (3) What are the perceptions of youth towards the use of ketamine in particular? The study involves conducting in-depth interviews with high-risk youths who have been referred to the researchers by community partners, and focus group interviews with front-line social workers and police officers. One journal article was published in January 2013.

4. “A Study on Hong Kong Families”

coordinated by Prof. Stephen W. K. Chiu, Prof. Ting Kwok-fai, and Ms. Wan Po-san

This project was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre for Chinese Family Studies and the Public Policy Research Centre. The aims of this project are to provide a detailed analysis of the data collected by the Thematic Household Survey on Hong Kong Families that was completed by the Census and Statistics Department and the Central Policy Unit in 2009; to propose evidence-based policy suggestions on strengthening family relations and functions, and to draw public attention to and facilitate policy discussions on issues relating to local families. Apart from the three coordinators, the following people also contributed to the edited volume arising from this project: Dr Ip Chung-yan (CUHK), Mr Lee Ka-man (CUHK), Prof. Joyce L. C. Ma (CUHK), Dr Vienne H. Y. Tso (CUHK), Dr Victor W. T. Zheng (CUHK), Prof. Annie H. N. Chan (Lingnan University), and Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Lingnan University).

5. “A Survey on Public Perceptions of Land Supply and Development in Hong Kong”

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Dr. Ip Chung-yan, Prof. Kwong Kai-sun, Dr. Lee Wai-ying, Prof. Ng Kai-hon, Prof. Ng Mee-kam, Prof. Ng Sai-leung, and Prof. Sung Yun-wing

The aim of this project is to study public perceptions of land supply and development in Hong Kong with respect to the following aspects: (1) ways of increasing the supply of land, (2) the level of acceptance on the impact of increasing the supply of land, and (3) the principles used in land development. Views were also collected on the Northeast New Territories New Area Development Plan. A telephone survey was conducted between 25 March and 3 April 2013, three newspaper articles were published, and a press conference was held on 17 June 2013 at CUHK.

6. “An Intergenerational Study on Work Values and Continuous Learning”

by Prof. Winton Au and Ms. Emily Ho

The aim of this project is to gain an understanding of intergenerational differences in work values, their impact on continuous learning, and the relationship between value congruence and the motivation to learn in Hong Kong. A territory-wide telephone opinion survey was conducted in September 2010.

7. “An Investigation into Perceptions of Social Justice across Social Groups”

by Prof. Winton Au and Prof. Tao Lin

This study was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region. The aim of the study is to identify issues that the community perceives as unjust and the reasons for this perception, by identifying the social groups that are experiencing injustice and striving to understand the issues that they are facing, as well as determining why they think that there is injustice in these issues. An attempt will also be made to gauge the opinions of the general public about what the government and society can do to rectify injustice in the long term. A media analysis, a territory-wide telephone opinion survey, and focus group interviews have been conducted.

8. “Chinese Family Business: Continuity and Sustainability”

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng and Prof. Wong Siu-lun

The aim of this project is to study three generations of Shanghai cotton-spinners in Hong Kong to better understand the issue of business continuity and

sustainability. A multidisciplinary approach is being employed to decipher the relationships among entrepreneurship, succession, and transnationalization, with special attention being paid to the issue of continuity and sustainability. The findings are expected to stimulate discussion and facilitate understanding of the following issues: (1) How the Shanghai cotton-spinners perceive business challenges and the measures that they have taken to handle such challenges; (2) How they have mobilized different institutional set-ups to ensure business dynamism, control, and sustainability; (3) The ways in which intergenerational succession affects leadership, corporate governance, and integrated family/business developmental strategies in a global economic hub like Hong Kong.

9. “Chinese Family Business and the Stock Market: A Haiwangang Collaborative and Comparative Study”

by Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng and Prof. Wong Siu-lun

The aim of this project is to examine the development of family businesses and stock markets in three locations in Greater China: Shanghai, Taiwan, and Hong Kong. Of particular interest are the effects of public listings on the transformation of family businesses and the growth of economies through opening markets to private enterprises. In this study, the larger topic of the rise of Chinese capitalism will be considered. A further goal of the project is to explore the formation of a collaborative financial network among the three stock markets to further enhance competitiveness on the global economic stage. This project is funded by the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation for International Scholarly Exchange.

10. “Hong Kong Contemporary History Research Project”

by Prof. Simon X. H. Shen

The aim of this project is to comprehensively and objectively revisit the 1967 Riots in Hong Kong from both local and international perspectives. The plan is to incorporate different points of view by conducting various interviews with those who were involved in the Riots, and reviewing the decision-making agendas and policy considerations at the governmental level by drawing from historical archives. Two books are expected in 2013 and 2014. In one book, a local perspective will be adopted and the primary focus will be on evaluating the importance of the Riots in shaping the sociopolitical development of Hong Kong. In the other, events will be analyzed from an international perspective, centering on the involvement of different countries and the dynamics of the Riots. A conference, entitled “Academic Conference on the 1967 Incident”, was held on 26 May

2012 at CUHK. A paper entitled “1967 Riot and the Cold War” was presented at the conference on “Trans-Pacific China and the Cold War” on 18-19 April 2013 at The University of Texas at Austin.

11. “Public Attitudes towards the 2012 Chief Executive Election”

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Wan Po-san and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The 2007 decision of the Standing Committee of the National People’s Congress that the Chief Executive may be elected by universal suffrage in 2017 represents a critical stage of constitutional development. Although the electoral method has yet to be determined, this decision has elevated the importance of the 2012 election in the eyes of both politicians and the general public. The aim of this project is to identify the public’s policy expectations of the fourth Chief Executive, the voting criteria, and the level of support for potential candidates. Seven territory-wide telephone opinion surveys were conducted from April 2011 to March 2012. Based on the survey data, 16 newspaper articles and one book chapter were published. A paper examining the influence of public opinion on voting behaviour and election campaigns was presented at the conference on “Election Systems and Democratic Governance in Hong Kong and Macao” held by the Ming Chuan University on 18 June 2012 in Taipei. A book is expected to be published in September 2013.

12. “Public Attitudes towards the ‘Occupy Central’ Movement”

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Wan Po-san, and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The aim of this survey is to investigate public perceptions of protest activities and the “Occupy Central” movement in Hong Kong. A territory-wide telephone survey was conducted in May 2013 to study the perceived “radicalness” and effectiveness of different modes of conflict, the positive and negative effects of the movement, and the propensity to join the movement. Six newspaper articles were published.

13. “The Seventh Phase of the Study on the Quality of Life in Macao 2011”

This project was commissioned by the Macao Foundation. The members of the Hong Kong team include Prof. Fanny M. Cheung (team leader), Prof. Wong Siu-lun (team leader), Ms. Wan Po-san (coordinator), Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng (coordinator), Prof. Kenneth W. K. Law (Lingnan University), Prof. Mok Ka-ho (Hong Kong Institute of Education), and Prof. Wong Chack-kie.

A telephone opinion survey on the quality of life was conducted. Policy briefs were prepared on industrial diversification, regional collaboration, democratic development and governance, civic associations and civil society, education, and social security. In-depth interviews and closed-door policy forums focusing on the above topics were held with socioeconomic and political leaders, government officials, and academics. The final report was submitted in June 2012. Members of the research team are in the process of writing chapters to be included in a book to be published in 2013.

14. "Voting Behaviour in the 2011 District Council Election"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Wan Po-san and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The fourth District Council ordinary election was held on 6 November 2011. Starting from the 2012 Legislative Council election, the candidates for the new District Council (Second) Functional Constituency (DCFC) election have been limited to elected District Council members nominated by elected District Council members. The 2011 District Council election was thus regarded as a new battlefield for Legislative Council seats. A total of three territory-wide telephone opinion surveys were conducted before and after the election to study the pattern of voting and non-voting behaviour, the different orientations among the electorate in their choice of candidates, and the impact of the DCFC election method on voting behaviour. Nine newspaper articles were published and a book is expected to be published in 2013.

15. "Voting Behaviour in the 2012 Legislative Council Election"

by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ms. Wan Po-san and Dr. Victor W. T. Zheng

The fifth Legislative Council election of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region was held on 9 September 2012. In accordance with the 2007 decision of the Standing Committee of the National People's Congress, the half-and-half ratio between members returned by functional constituencies and geographical constituencies remained unchanged for the 2012 Legislative Council elections. However, the new DCFC election method was implemented to return five additional seats. The DCFC candidates were elected by all registered voters except those already entitled to vote in other functional constituencies. Based on a consideration of the specific political-institutional context within which the election was held, a total of four territory-wide telephone opinion surveys on political orientations and voting behaviour were conducted before and after the election. Seventeen newspaper articles were published and a book is expected to be published in 2013.

Objectives

Economic competition and cooperation between Hong Kong and other Asia-Pacific countries constitute this Centre's main interest and the thrust of our investigation. Major research topics include the Hong Kong economy and its transformation; government policies; the economic integration of Greater China; and trade, investment, and financial relations between Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region.

Asian Economic Journal and East Asian Economic Association

This is the 23rd year in which our Centre has jointly published the *Asian Economic Journal* for the East Asian Economic Association with our partner in Japan. The ISI has accepted the Journal for coverage, beginning in April/May 2008 with the first 2007 issue. Prof. LIU Pak-wai, SUNG Yun-wing, and KWONG Kai-sun are serving respectively as Vice President, Director, and Secretary General of the Association. Prof. DU Julian has served as Managing Editor of the journal since 2009.

Asian Economic Journal is a journal that is devoted to publishing articles on the Asian economies which is based in the Asian region. The Journal bears the name of CUHK together with The International Centre for the Study of East Asian Development on the front cover as the two institutions which produce the journal. The Secretariat of the East Asian Economic Association is also located at CUHK using HKIAPS as its address. The journal and the location of the Secretariat have promoted the image of CUHK in general, and HKIAPS in particular as institutions active in research within the Asia-Pacific region.

Annual Workshop

Annual workshop 2013

GRC Annual Gender Role Workshop 2013 was held on 1 June at CUHK campus. The topic was "Gender Sensitivity and Education" (性別意識與教育). Many researches have shown that over the years, gender stereotypes appear frequently in Hong Kong education process. To date there is no significant improvement on gender sensitivity in formal or hidden

curriculum - textbook content, extracurricular activities, teacher-student interaction, and school management for example - thus it is difficult for students to fully understand the diversified roles of different genders in the community nowadays.



To raise public awareness on the importance of gender sensitivity in education, policy makers, scholars, teachers, parents and students were invited to discuss and analyze the phenomenon. Dr. Anita Chan from the Institute of Education and Dr. K.K. Chan from the Education Bureau were the keynote speakers. In the forum session, our guest speakers included Professor Esther Ho, Faculty of Education; Ms. Bell Wong, Supervisor of Tung Wah Group of Hospitals Long Love Integrated Family Service Centre; Ms. Jackie Chan, Corporate Communications Officer of Equal Opportunities Commission; Mr. Poon Yu-hin, M.Phil Graduate of Gender and Education; Ms. Pat Lo, secondary school teacher; Ms. Chung Yuen-yi, parent; and Ms. Alison So, MPhil Graduate of Gender and Education. 97 participants joined the workshop. We hope that the coming generations can develop their own talents freely without restrictions from traditional gender stereotypes.

Gender issues are seldom mentioned in the Science field. This public seminar was jointly presented by the British Council and GRC on 20 November 2012. Dr. Maggie Aderin-Pocock, a space scientist from the UK, was invited to share her views and experiences on gender bias in the science fields, the opportunities for women researchers and how to achieve gender parity in the industry. Prof. Li Quan from Department of Physics was invited to be the discussant of the seminar. Many female science students came to share

their experiences.



Perspective” (13 May 2013)

The seminar was jointly presented by the Centre for Rights and Justice, Faculty of Law, CUHK; Human Rights Watch (HRW) and GRC. The theme was “Sex Workers in China: A Rights Perspective”. This seminar brought experts and academics from the fields of gender studies, women’s rights, and law together with representatives from non-governmental organizations to discuss the findings of a new report by Human Rights Watch, “Swept Away: Abuses against Sex Workers in China,” which documents a number of issues faced by women who engage in sex work in mainland China, including police and client violence, a lack of legal remedies, discriminatory practices, coercive HIV testing and infringement to privacy and health rights, as well as obstacles to the operations of sex workers’ organizations. The seminar was held on 13 May 2013 at CUHK Graduate Law Centre, Central.

Public Lecture by Prof. Louise Berglund (5 Nov 2012)

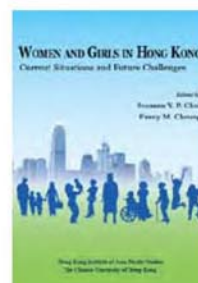

This volume, which includes eleven chapters on the most pressing issues concerning women and girls in Hong Kong, is a joint initiative of the Gender Research Centre (GRC) and the Women’s Foundation (TWF). The chapters address the current status and future challenges of women in areas related to education, labour market participation, poverty,

health, violence against women, family, leadership, media, ethnic minority and migrant women, the girl-child, and institutional mechanisms for gender equality.

The contributors to this edited volume include twenty scholars in the disciplines of law, psychology, sociology, journalism, public health, social work, political science, criminology, education, business studies, anthropology, and demography in Hong Kong's higher education institutes. Together they provide a thorough review of the status of women in the aforementioned areas, delineate the causes of persistent inequalities, compare the situations in Hong Kong with those in other developed countries, and make recommendations on policies to reduce gender inequalities.

Executive Summary

This is the 6th year since the International Relations Research Programme was established in 2008, which was renamed International Affairs Research Centre (IARC) by the University in summer 2012 within the framework of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (HKIAPS). The IARC conducted high-standard research projects, organized or co-organized major scholarly events in 2012-13 on such diverse topics as Sino-Japanese relations, Myanmar and transnational civil society, media piracy in developing countries, peace and development, Russia and East Asia. We have succeeded in obtaining external donations and research funding, while extending partnership relationship on campus, with other universities and research institutions around the world.

Objectives

The IARC aims to strengthen and enhance scholarly understanding of key bilateral, regional, and global issues in the Asia-Pacific and worldwide, while contributing to policy development and public discussion beyond academia.

Founded in 2012 within the framework of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (HKIAPS), IARC is interdisciplinary in nature and brings together academic and professional resources regardless of traditional faculty boundaries. The Centre supports research and related activities, including seminars, conferences, publications, collaborative projects as well as some teaching and exchange activities regarding international affairs broadly defined.

The Centre is established to play a leading role in international relations and globalization research, particularly in the Asia-Pacific region. Besides academic research, it also provides community service and governmental consultation in order to facilitate decision-making and policy-setting, thereby contributing to public interests at large.

For this reason, our faculty members and researchers are committed only to the highest standards as exemplified by the HKIAPS over the years. The Centre, built upon the academic expertise and diversity of the Institute, endeavours to further its research in a wide array of fields related to Hong Kong, China, the Asia-Pacific Region, so as to the world.

Given its international orientation, IARC focuses on global policy studies, including key bilateral relations in the Asia-Pacific, Hong Kong's external relations, nationalism, geopolitics, global media, transnational civil society, and so on. Research in each of these areas is carried forward with

Objectives

The Public Policy Research Centre (PPRC) was established in 2005. The Centre is an interdisciplinary research unit under the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies of The Chinese University of Hong Kong. Working closely with the Social Science Faculty of the University, and also other faculties, centres and institutes at The Chinese University, the PPRC strives to promote public policy research on Hong Kong, the Pearl River Delta and also the Asia-Pacific region in general.

To achieve this mission, the Centre strives to:

- ◆ Undertake basic and applied social science research on significant public policy issues;
- ◆ Provide a platform for supporting and stimulating faculty members to carry out public policy research;
- ◆ Offer a venue for faculty members interested in public policy research to exchange ideas and findings;
- ◆ Disseminate widely the findings to the general public and scholarly community and raise public awareness of policy issues;
- ◆ Act as a bridge between the University and the wider community in the understanding and deliberation of policy issues.

In recent years, the Centre recognizes the importance of raising the awareness and knowledge of the younger generation on policy issues. Therefore, the Centre seeks to work closely with various sectors of the wider community, including but not limited to secondary schools and post-secondary education institutions, to research in youth transitions. The Centre expects to bring social scientific policy research to bear on relevant policy making processes.

Research Activities

1. “Re-Industrializing Chinese Movie Value Chain: State, Market, Culture, and Regional Integration since China’s Economic Reform”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator), Prof. Gary Gereffi (Duke University, co-investigator) and Mr. Victor Kei-wah Shin (Ph.D candidate, University of Cambridge, co-investigator)

This is a 36-month (September 2012 to December 2015) project funded by the General Research Fund of the Research Grants Council, Hong Kong. It seeks to evaluate four conventional explanations for the revitalization of the Chinese film industry that emphasize respectively the effects of the market, the state and its action, the reception of cultural products by the audience, and the presence of regional networks.

2. “The Impact of Socioeconomic Backgrounds on the Academic Achievement of Senior Secondary School Students: The Case of NSS Liberal Studies”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator), Prof. Kim Doo-hwan (co-investigator) and Prof. Tsang Wing-kwong (co-investigator)

This is a 40-month (September 2009 to December 2012) project funded by the Public Policy Research Grant of the Research Grants Council, Hong Kong. It examines the extent to which socioeconomic backgrounds of senior secondary students have impacts on their academic achievement, using the Liberal Studies of the New Secondary School Curriculum as a critical case. The questionnaire fieldwork was completed in March 2012. Collecting data on academic performance (in-school and public examination results) of students is now in process. The project is expected to finish data analysis and report write-up by the end of 2013.

3. “Patriotic Cultural Organizations in Postwar Hong Kong: Case Studies in Sports, Literature and Music”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator), and Prof. Lui Tai-lok (co-investigator)

This is a 18-month (May 2012 to October 2013) project funded by the South China Programme of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, CUHK. The project is part of a larger project devoted to studying the history of left-wing organizations in Hong Kong collaborated by Professors Stephen Wing-kai Chiu, Tai-lok Lui of Sociology at the University of Hong Kong, and Sai-sing Yung of Chinese Studies at the National University of Singapore. The larger project consists of eight sub-projects covering left-wing activities in sports, films, drama, literature, trade unions, education, music and the 1967 riots. An inception seminar was organized by PPRC in May 2012 for researchers of the larger project to present and share their background understanding of the research questions.

4. “Social Control, Strain and Couple Dynamics Affecting Gender Disparities in Gambling: A Study of Married Couples in Hong Kong.”

by Prof. Nicole Wai-ting Cheung (principal investigator)

This is a 30-month (2011-2013) project funded by the General Research Fund of the Research Grants Council, Hong Kong. It compares the pattern and level of gambling among males and females of married couples in Hong Kong, and examines the contribution of various social mechanisms of social control, strain and marital interaction to gender differences in gambling within a couple context.

5. “Transitioning to Post-secondary Education or Work? A Two-Wave Panel Study of Effects of Career Orientation, Parental Alignment and Social Strain on Hong Kong’s Senior High School Students”

by Nicole Wai-ting Cheung (principal investigator)

This project is funded by Public Policy Research Fund, Research Grants Council of Hong Kong, and the Central Policy Unit, Hong Kong SAR Government. This is a three-year project from October 2012 to September 2015. The baseline school survey commenced in Spring 2013 and is expected to complete in August 2013.

6. “A Study on Mainland Students’ Adjustment in Hong Kong”

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator)

This project was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit (CPU), Hong Kong SAR Government. The study aims at investigating how well Mainland students adjust to lives in Hong Kong campus, how to better integrate them both on campus and in Hong Kong society, and how to retain them in Hong Kong after they

graduate from universities. Data collection (mainly in-depth interviews) is completed, and the final report is in process.

7. A Study on “Hong Kong Families” (in Chinese 《家在香港》撰寫計劃)

by Prof. Stephen Wing-kai Chiu (principal investigator)

This project has primarily used the survey data from the Thematic Household Survey on families and employment conducted between December 2008 to January 2011 by the Census and Statistics Department, Hong Kong SAR Government. Apart from the 3 co-investigators, 6 others scholars from CUHK, the University of Hong Kong, Hong Kong Polytechnic University, and Lingnan University will also contribute to the edited volume of this project. Draft chapters are under review now.

8. “Consultancy on the Tracking Study for Kwun Tong Town Centre Project”

by Prof. Wong Hung (principal investigator)

This project is commissioned by the Hong Kong Urban Renewal Authority (URA). This on-going project provides expert evaluation of the social impacts of the urban renewal project in Kwun Tong Town Centre by the Hong Kong Urban Renewal Authority. The first phase report was completed in March 2010. The second phase follow-up questionnaire survey and final report were completed in January 2012.

URA has also commissioned a related research for the Kwun Tong project. The focus is on the impacts of the renewal project on the business operators inside the affected area. The first phase report was completed in June 2011. The second phase follow-up questionnaire survey is completed and the final report is already drafted and under review.

The Conference on “Sino-Japanese Relations 2012 Examined” was jointly organized with International Affairs Research Centre, Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies on 7 December 2012.

A Public Policy Distinguished Lecture was jointly organized with MSSc Programme in Public Policy, Faculty of Social Science on 8 October 2012. The lecture speaker was Prof. James Perry, Distinguished Professor and Chancellor’s Professor of Public and Environmental Affairs, Indiana University Bloomington.

The Director made a presentation in the “Taiwan-Hong Kong Sociology and Social Image Conference”, organized by

Centre for Social and Political Development Studies, Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies on 13 April 2013. The topic was "Youth Attitudes towards Social and Public Policies in Hong Kong: Class, Generations and Social Changes" (co-presented with Mr. Li Hang, PhD Candidate of Department of Sociology, CUHK.)

Knowledge Transfer

Professional Development Programme – "Curriculum Planning and Teaching for Independent Enquiry Study (IES)" for New Senior Secondary Liberal Studies.

The project is commissioned by the Education Bureau of the Hong Kong SAR Government. It consists of two key components: (1) training workshops for in-service secondary school teachers, and (2) on-site school-based consultancy services for curriculum planning. Both components focus on the curriculum planning and teaching for Independent Enquiry Study (IES) in the syllabus of New Senior Secondary Liberal Studies. During the report period, 9 sessions of workshops were conducted and about 200 secondary school teachers attended. Until July 2013, the Programme had offered 22 schools on-site consultancy, with a total of 143 direct contact hours with teachers, and additional 13 hours for preparatory work and meetings.

Objectives

The research programme is focused on urban and regional development in the Asia-Pacific region especially China. This programme has undertaken research on world cities, globalization, Chinese urbanization and urban and regional development in China covering Pearl River Delta (PRD), Pan-PRD, Guangdong, Shanghai, Fujian and western region. Ongoing research focuses on two themes. **Theme 1: Urban and regional development in Hong Kong and Pan-PRD** will examine the inter-city relations between Hong Kong and Shenzhen, Hong Kong-Shenzhen metropolis in the context of PRD and Pan-PRD, as well as dramatic urban, socio-economic and environmental transformations in PRD and Pan-PRD region. **Theme 2: Population change and urbanization in China** will examine inter-city and inter-provincial migration, urbanization and urban development in China. The research programme was officially renamed as the Research Centre for Urban and Regional Development on 1 March 2013.

RESEARCH PROGRAMMES

Chinese Law Programme

Director: *Prof. XI Chao*

Description

The Chinese Law Programme, through a wide range of academic activities, aspires to become an academically reputed research programme on Chinese law and legal institutions in the Asia Pacific region, serving as an intellectual platform for understanding and exchange of knowledge of Chinese law and legal institutions. Its research activities focus on the interface between the legal system in China and its wider social, economic and political contexts, with special interest in interdisciplinary approaches to law.

Conferences

Graduate Conference on “Law and Institutions in China’s Economic and Societal Transition: Between Tradition and Modernity”

This conference was co-organized by the Chinese Law Programme of HKIAPS and the Faculty of Law of Jilin University (吉林大学), one of the most prestigious Mainland law schools. It was held on 6 November 2012 at CUHK.



The conference brought together academics and postgraduate research students from Mainland and Hong Kong in law and social science disciplines, addressing four pressing issues in China’s ongoing legal reform programme, including criminal justice reforms, judicial reforms, land law reforms, and regulation of NGOs. The conference was featured by its interdisciplinary approach to law, with many of its presented papers placing Chinese law in the broader socio-economic and political contexts in which it operates and evolves.

Public Lectures and Seminars

1. “Avoiding the Middle-Income Trap: Law and Development in Middle-Income Countries - Lessons for China”

by Prof. Randall Peerenboom (Professor of Law at La Trobe University Australia and associate fellow of the Oxford University Center for Socio-Legal Studies), on 5 December 2012.



In 1960, there were 101 middle-income countries (MICs). By 2008, only thirteen had become high-income countries. Why do so many MICs fail to develop after a promising start, becoming mired in “the middle-income trap?” Will China be one of them? Professor Peerenboom’s lecture addresses, inter alia: (1) is “middle-income country” an analytically useful category? (2) is there a middle-income trap, are there various traps, or is it a myth? (3) what if anything do successful MICs share? (4) why have East Asian states been so successful, and does the recent success of Central and Eastern European states provide an alternative model? (5) what is the relationship between politics, or political-economy, and development in MICs? (6) how have MICs been influenced by and adapted to the new international economic order? (7) what approaches are available to MICs to address pressing socio-economic issues? (8) have international development agencies adjusted their strategies and programming for promoting rule of law and good governance in MICs? And finally, (9) what lessons are there for China if it is to avoid the dreaded middle-income trap?

2. “Whither the Re-Education through Labor System? And the Path of China’s Legal Reforms”

by Professor Yang Jianshun (Director of the Institute of Comparative Administrative Law, Director of the Institute of Japanese Law, Renmin University School of Law; Deputy President, China Society of Administrative Law), 1 February 2013

Re-education through labor system (勞教制度), or RTL, has been in existence in China for more than half a century, and its constitutionality and legality have been at the centre of academic and policy controversies and debates in the last decade. RTL has recently been placed under the spotlight with the Central Politics and Law Commission’s announcement that if endorsed by the National People’s Congress RTL could be suspended from operation by the end of 2013. Is this the beginning of the end of RTL? Should RTL be abolished at all? What do RTL reforms tell us about the nature of the PRC legal system? More broadly, whither Chinese legal reforms? Based on his recent work on RTL published at the People’s Forum, Professor Yang’s lecture sheds light on these important and open questions.



3. “Judiciary and Economic Development: The Role of Commercial Adjudication in China”

by Judge Lei Jiping (Presiding Judge of the Second Civil Division, Supreme People’s Court of the People’s Republic of China), on 4 February 2013

It is a widely held view that the judiciary is a pivotal factor in a country’s economic development. Comparative studies have shown that effective judiciaries are correlated with increased access to credit, higher level of investment, more rapid growth of firms and, more broadly, stronger economic performance in both developed and developing economies. What is the role of the judiciary in China’s spectacular economic development in the last three decades? Building on his profound, close to two decades experience as a commercial judge at the Supreme People’s Court, Judge

Lei’s lecture sheds light on the intricate and complex interactions between the court’s adjudication of commercial disputes and economic development in the context of China’s economic miracle.

The goal of this study is to undertake a multi-scale spatial-temporal analysis of crime in Hong Kong to examine criminological and sociological theories about social development and crime. In addition, we will construct a crime information service platform (CISP-HK) for police agencies in Hong Kong based on our analysis models.

7. “Time-Series Analysis of Female Crime Trends in Taiwan, 1961-2008: Examining the Effects of Development on Female Criminal Involvement”

Objectives

The objective of the Programme is to foster and support academic research on China by providing grants. Through the dissemination of research findings, the Programme helps to provide useful references for the formulation of public policies.

Regionally, the grants now cover studies on Hong Kong, mainland China, and the area's interrelated development with Macao, Taiwan, and other parts of the world. Individual research, interdisciplinary collaboration, and research partnerships across and outside of the Asia-Pacific region are also equally considered.

The Programme is not limited to funding projects of any particular disciplines or topics, innovative research with relevance to China is all welcome. The current research areas supported include:

1. development of the mainland China-Hong Kong nexus;
2. interrelations among state-building efforts, culture, and local society;
3. institutional evolution and transformation;
4. growth and disparities in regional development; and
5. external relations.

Management Committee

Members of the Executive Committee include Professors CHAN Kin-man (Department of Sociology), LI Lianjiang (Department of Government and Public Administration), MA Kit-wai, Eric (School of Journalism and Communication), SHEN Jianfa (Department of Geography and Resource Management), and TSUI Kai-yuen (Department of Economics).

Research Activities

In March 2011, a longitudinal programme was set up to develop a series of comprehensive and multi-dimensional dataset on the culture of Hong Kong over a span of 6 years from 2011 to 2017. This programme has 4 theme-correlated projects and will hold a series of biennial symposium to disseminate the research findings.

1. "A Comparative Study on the Work Experience and Life Adjustment of Migrant Workers in the Eastern and Southern Coastal Areas of Mainland China"

Conducted by Prof. To Siu-ming (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Fang Wei (School of Politics and Public Administration, Zhejiang University of Technology, China), Prof. Tam Hau-lin Cherry (Applied Social Studies, City University of Hong Kong), and Prof. Ngai Sek-yum, Steven (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$122,440

was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to investigate and compare the work experiences and life adjustment of migrant workers living in the eastern coastal areas and southern coastal areas of mainland China. It addresses issues like the way migrant workers perceive their work experience and work adjustment in the host society; similarities or differences between the work experiences and life adjustment of migrant workers living in the eastern coastal areas and those living in the southern coastal areas; and the implications of migrant workers' work experience and life adjustments for policy formulation, social service development, and future research directions.

2. "Do Population Control Policies Improve Child Education? Evidence from China's One-Child Policy"

Conducted by Prof. Zhang Hongliang (Department of Economics) as principal investigator, with Prof. Zhang Junsen (Department of Economics) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to bring new empirical evidences to advance the understanding of the quantity-quality trade-off in general and the effect of population control policies on children's human capital investment in particular. It attempts to be the first study to exploit the regional differences in the fertility gaps between mothers of different ages at first birth caused by the differences in the strictness of local fertility control to identify the exogenous variations in family size. By exploring China's unique social experiment of the One-Child Policy, results from this project will be highly relevant for policymakers to evaluate the effects of existing family planning policies as well as construct effective future ones.

3. "Motivational Experience for Securing a Job: A Study of Unemployed Youth in Hong Kong and Mainland China"

Conducted by Prof. Ngai Sek-yum, Steven (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Cheung Chau-kiu, Jacky (Applied Social Studies, City University of Hong Kong) and Prof. To Siu-ming (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$142,800 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims to verify the impacts and identify concrete experiences leading to self-actualization. It is rely on opened-ended interviews and structured questionnaire surveys to elicit needed information. The information will clarify experiential factors that motivate unemployed youth to get jobs. This project would contribute empirical and concrete evidence viable for policy and service implementation.

4. "The Consequences of Migration to Children: A Quantitative Case Study with Comparison Groups at Origins and Destinations"

Conducted by Prof. Tong Yuying (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Piotrowski Martin (Department of Sociology, University of Oklahoma) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$145,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims at employ a quantitative case study to assess the impacts of parental labour migration on well-being of their children in contemporary china, drawing on a research design that would enable us to address the two longstanding obstacles mentioned above to yield a reliable answer to the central question. It will examine how social context factors, such as family, community and school, enhance or moderate the pathway of parental migration on children well-being.

5. "The Historical and Social Context of Crime Boom (1960-1985) in Hong Kong"

Conducted by Prof. Chiu Wing-kai, Stephen (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Prof. Lee King-wa (Department of Sociology) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$64,600 was awarded in 2012.

This project aims at identify the societal and political mechanisms or processes that triggered such a violent episode within our defined period of study (1960-1985). It looks into the social context to which serious crimes especially homicide incidents took place, and explores the political dynamics and their relation to the issue of crime at the time. It would identify how triad societies adapted as the colonial state increased its penetration effort to the local Chinese community and whether this resulted in changing nature of violence. At least, this project will review the latest criminology literatures to provide an up-to-date theoretical explanation of the phenomenon concerned.

6. "The Patterns and Impacts of Elder Care Arrangements in Shanghai and Hong Kong: Convergence and Divergence"

Conducted by Prof. Zhang Jiaan (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator. HK\$149,500 was rewarded in 2013.

This project aims at describe and compare the current patterns of elder care arrangements in Shanghai and Hong Kong, and examines explanatory mechanisms for differential patterns of elder care arrangements between and within two societies. It evaluates the linkage between differential patterns of elder care arrangement and elders' life satisfaction between and within Hong Kong and Shanghai. This study will join the debate about differential patterns of elder care by providing new evidence from one of the most rapidly aging societies, and enrich the literature on the mechanism for differential patterns of elder care arrangements by examining a comprehensive model that takes into account individual, interpersonal and societal influence on elder care arrangements. The

findings from, the project will also extend knowledge of the linkage between elder care patterns and elders' life satisfaction in Chinese societies. The study will also have significant social work and policy implications.

Ongoing Projects

Nine projects funded by the Programme are on-going. They are:

1. "Constructing the Chinese Model of Social Work in the Social Work Knowledge Transfer Process between Hong Kong and Shenzhen?"

Conducted by Prof Leung Tse-fong, Terry (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Instructor Tan Hau-lin Cherry (Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$180,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project identifies the dilemma and struggle the Shenzhen social workers and Hong Kong supervisors have in complying with social work practice codes in the social and political context in China, to explicate how they justify and reason for the social-moral order of social work in China, and the rationalities and underlying values supporting their construction. The study gets a better understanding of the extent that liberalist tenets in western model of social work influence the new breed of social workers in China.

2. "Rebuilding Post-Disaster Community from Inside out: Action Research on a Asset-Based Social Recovery Project in Beichuan"

Conducted by Prof. Wong Hung (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Huang Yunong (Social Work Department Research Center, Southwestern University of Finance and Economics, Sichuan China) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$190,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project conducts an experimental asset-based social recovery project in Beichuan of Sichuan to rebuild social capital from inside out and preserve and revitalize cultural and natural assets of the post-disaster community, and examines the impacts of the "Asset-Based Community Development" model on the livelihood of the residents in Beichuan. The model serves as a demonstration model which included systematically reviewed knowledge, grounded practical experience and critical professional reflection, to other post-disaster projects in China and other developing countries.

3. "From Doing Good for Fun to Doing Good Professionally: Exploring the Professionalization Process of Grassroots Philanthropic Organizations in Southeast China"

Conducted by Prof. Zhou Huiquan (Department of Social Work) as principal investigator, with Prof. Xu Ying

(Department of Social Work) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$100,000 was rewarded in 2012.

This project studies a snowball sample of southeast China GPOs (Jiangsu, Shanghai, Zhejiang, Fujian and Guangdong) involved in promoting compulsory education in rural China. The findings of the study make significant contributions to the field of non-profit studies in China. It identifies areas needing policy changes, share with the organizations that are struggling to professionalize in order to improve the service quality provided by these organizations.

4. "Miss Etiquette: Hyper-femininities and Nation Making in Guangzhou"

Conducted by Prof. Wu Ka-ming (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project examines the phenomenon of and the discourse on the Miss Etiquettes, specifically in one of the major Chinese national events, the Guangzhou Asia Games in 2010, and to study how the Chinese society in the southern negotiates with the official state construction of the national subject in the era of a rising China. Findings help to contribute significantly to the existing scholarship on gender, nation-building, state-society relations, cultural identity and performance.

5. "Political Attitude of Hong Kong People and Governance of Hong Kong: A Comparison with Other Asian Regions through the Asian Barometer Survey"

Conducted by Prof. Ma Ngok (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator, with Prof. Wong Hok-wui (Department of Government and Public Administration), Prof. Lam Wai-man (Department of Politics and Public Administration, HKU), and Prof. Chan Kin-man (Department of Sociology) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$68,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project studies the change in political values longitudinally in Hong Kong, in particular the relationship between regime evaluation and democratic values, in order to bring every meaningful comparison with cross-national data in other Asian polities. Findings shed important light on the relationship between the "democratic deficit" and the current governance problems of Hong Kong, and how to develop democratic values that are beneficial to the political transition to full democracy and the subsequent democratic consolidation of the regime.

6. "The Development of Major Mainland Cities and Its Implications to Hong Kong under the 12th FYP of China"

Conducted by Prof. Shen Jianfa (Department of Geography and Resource Management) as principal investigator, with Prof. Sung Yun-wing (Department of Economics), Prof. Xu Jiang (Department of Geography and Resource Management) and Prof. Wang Guixin (Research Center for Urban and Regional Development, Fudan University) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$180,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project assesses the effectiveness of FYP in major Chinese cities and how the state-led planning system fits into Hong Kong's planning and policy making, to examine the development, strategy and policies of four leading mainland cities (Shanghai, Nanjing, Guangzhou and Shenzhen), and to reveal the mechanism of the formulation of urban strategies and the process of intercity competition. Findings contribute to academic debates and conceptualization of three interrelated issues, namely the role of state planning in economic development in socialist China, the relation between state and market in capitalist Hong Kong, and inter-city competition and urban competitiveness.

7. "The Mingei Movement: A History of Social Awareness is Environment and Energy Issues in the Folk Pottery Industry in Hong Kong and Japan"

Conducted by Prof. Lim Tai-wei (Department of Japanese Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$50,000 was awarded in 2012.

This project studies how East Asian societies like Hong Kong and Japan transformed themselves into advanced post-modern, post-industrial societies with their rejection of modernization values, to draw parallels and contrast with traditional notions and nuances of the idea of 'nature', 'environment' and 'development' in these two societies, to construct a history of a social movement that combined notions of environmentalism, aesthetics and ideas about production of the folk pottery industries in Hong Kong and Japan.

8. "西方宗教傳入華南鄉村社會研究：以天主教為例證"

Conducted by Dr. Patrick Taveirne (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator, with Dr. Ha Keloon (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$78,000 was awarded in 2012.

本研究在學術與社會發展方面均極具意義。透過天主教進入中國鄉村所引發的“涵化作用”(Acculturation)，瞭解天主教信仰在底層社會的發展處境，探尋族群或地域的文化個性，促進東西方文明進一步交流與對話，從研究天主教與中國鄉村傳統文化的關係中，有助推動今天的中國天主教會和諧發展，亦有著現實指導的意義。

Completed Projects

Four projects funded by the Programme were completed in

the report period.

1. "Chinese NGOs as Incubators of Democratic Culture?"

Conducted by Prof. Anthony J. Spires (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator. HK\$90,000 was awarded in 2010.

This project studied the internal organizational culture of China's emergent non-governmental organizations (NGOs) by drawing on comparative case studies in two different types of NGOs – professionalized groups mainly run by paid staff and volunteer-based social service delivery NGOs. The study elucidated the links between organizational culture and organizational structure, so as to shed light on the role of NGOs to help foster a democratic organizational culture in an authoritarian state.

2. "Health Inequality and Noncognitive Human Capital: A Comparative Study of Adults in the Pearl River Delta, Hong Kong, and Taiwan"

Conducted by Prof. Tam Hong-wing, Tony (Department of Sociology) as principal investigator, with Research Fellow Chang Ly-yun (Institute of Sociology, Academia Sinica, Taiwan) to serve as co-investigator. HK\$140,000 was awarded in 2010.

This project assessed and compared the role of noncognitive human capital (especially self-discipline, dependability, consistent performance) in explaining health inequality in the Pearl River Delta (PRD), HK, and Taiwan, so that social intervention can be designed to shape the formation of noncognitive human capital from early childhood to adulthood.

3. "Local Knowledge of Environmental Change and Risk: A Comparative Study in Guangdong and Guangxi"

Conducted by Prof. Wu Fengshi (Department of Government and Public Administration) as principal investigator, with Research Fellow Fang Xiang (International Center for China Health and Sustainable Development, Peking University) to serve as co-investigators. HK\$57,800 was awarded in 2010.

This project explored both individual farmers' and rural communities' collective awareness of environmental degradation and health impacts, and compared the causes of variation in different communities, so as to shed light on whether there is cultural specific, bottom-up and self-grown understanding on the issues. Sample surveys were conducted in 4 communities, 2 from Guangdong (Dapu & Gaopu in Meizhou County) & Guangxi (Gongcheng Tao Autonomous County & Guilin City) respectively, with diverging economic development & institutional history of environmental governance but similar changes in environmental pollution.

4. "Transplantation of Model Plays in Cantonese Operas, 1969 to 1975"

Conducted by Prof. Pang Lai-kwan (Department of Cultural and Religious Studies) as principal investigator. HK\$130,000 was awarded in 2011.

This project studied the aesthetic & ideological factors involved in these transplantation projects, and analysed the negotiations taken place that might reveal a different angle to understand cultural production during the Cultural Revolution. Findings helped to fill up a clear scholarly gap in Cantonese Opera study, where very little has been written about this period.

Archive on Folk History in China

Since 2006, there has been an annual allocation from the Programme towards the building of an archive and a website (<http://mjsh.usc.cuhk.edu.hk>) on the folk history of the people of China. The project is overseen by the Universities Service Centre for China Studies at CUHK. A three-year progress report was submitted to the Programme in June 2012.

The archive is a depository for memoirs and non-fiction writings by common citizens in mainland China. The website is a window through which the collection can be made accessible to the general public and memoir-writers, and to arouse the interest of the public in writing about their personal experiences with China's changing society.

Established in May 1995, the Laboratory now can handle 56 telephone lines, all connected to the CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) system operated through a main server. It can cope with the demands of large samples under time constraint.

Objectives

1. To provide a telephone survey laboratory to researchers at the Chinese University who want to use a telephone interview technique to facilitate their research.
2. To enable the development of new research interests using the telephone interview method.
3. To collect panel public opinion data of academic and social value.
4. To serve as a link between the Chinese University and the public by regularly offering results of survey polls on public issues.

Accomplishments

Over 1,070 commissioned surveys have been completed since the establishment of the Laboratory (about 60 surveys in the past year). Our survey findings have been widely covered by the media, thereby helping to raise the profile of the Institute and the Chinese University.

The Laboratory has attracted an increasing number of researchers from academic circles and the media who want to use telephone survey as an alternative method of data collection.

With the improving financial situation, we have designed and launched our panel surveys for academic research.

Now the Laboratory has 60 interviewing stations and we have trained and pooled over 200 experienced interviewers from amongst CUHK students as well as students from other universities, providing them with not only a good source of income but also the valuable experience of conducting telephone survey research.

Policy

The Laboratory welcomes the sponsorship or commission of surveys; it is also open to collaboration with interested persons or organizations.

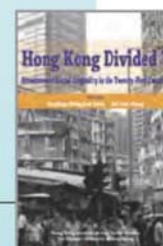
