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## INTRODUCTION

Since its establishment in September 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (hereafter, the Institute or HKIAPS) has been promoting and coordinating inter-disciplinary studies on Hong Kong and neighbouring Asian countries and communities within the Asia-Pacific region. The Institute aims to serve as a bridge between overseas scholars in Asia-Pacific studies and teaching and research staff at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (hereafter, the Chinese University or CUHK).

The Institute supports two major types of research activities: individual projects funded by or affiliated with the Institute, and long-term inter-disciplinary research programmes that constitute the backbone of the activities of the Institute. The latter activities are described at length in the following pages, while the former will be mentioned in particular segments of specific programme reports.

## MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

The past year started with the Institute having to adjust itself to doing without the services of Prof. Lau Siu-kai, the former Associate Director, who took a leave of absence from the University to join the cabinet of Mr Tung Chee-hwa. Mr Tung began his second five-year term leading the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (SAR) with a hand-picked team under a new accountability system. The system, however, was not proving to be an improvement on the previous mode of operation, with the Administration having to deal with one crisis after another. With the advent of the New Year, Hong Kong was soon confronted with the consequences of a new war in the Middle East, where Iraq faced the joint forces led by the United States and the United Kingdom. Much closer to home, Hong Kong fought its own new war, that of the new virus causing severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), which ravaged the economy and disrupted the tempo of life here for several months.

When the SARS episode passed in June, Hong Kong faced another crisis. The proposed speedy enactment of Article 23 of the Basic Law without adequate public consultation, together with considerable pent-up discontent, led to a massive demonstration on July 1, the sixth anniversary date of the founding of the Hong Kong SAR. A political crisis ensued, but since then Hong Kong has seemingly turned the corner and the mood of society, together with the economy, has improved.

Inevitably, the activities of the Institute were disrupted during the spring because of the problem of SARS. Academic visits were called off, meetings cancelled, and it was time for silent but focused work. The year began with the plan to hold a number of public policy forums. By March 2003, three such forums, on the Closer Economic Partnership Arrangement (CEPA), family strategies in the face of economic difficulties, and housing policy had been successfully convened. Other forums had to be postponed or cancelled.

However, work related to the preparation of the books on public housing in Hong Kong, in collaboration with the Hong Kong Housing Authority, did not suffer. In fact, this project was accorded the highest priority in the work schedule of the Institute for the past year, as coordinating the work of a large number of researchers on a large subject was a challenging task. The book, to be published in English and Chinese, by The Chinese University Press, is scheduled to appear in print before 25 December 2003, marking the golden jubilee of the disastrous squatter fire in 1953, which forced the then colonial government into directly providing housing. If anything, the SARS episode allowed all of the authors involved in the project to concentrate their attention on it. Along with the main volume, a companion project has been the preparation of a golden jubilee bibliography

of housing in Hong Kong, to be published as a research tool by the Institute.

During the past year, another book project has engaged my energy and attention, and those of several of my colleagues. It is a book that is aimed at documenting, analysing and accounting for the rapid changes in the western region of China following policy announcements in 1999 and vastly increased resources made available by the central government to address the problem of regional disparity. This book is expected to be published by The Chinese University Press in early 2004.

The past year also saw the Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute further integrated with the work of the Institute. Most of the former Institute's publications and some of its research activities are being undertaken by the staff of the Institute. A full report of the second year of the activities of the Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute may be found in the Shanghai-Hong Kong Annual 2002, published in early 2003. The highlight of the activity of the past year was the successful annual conference held in Kunming in December 2002 on the theme of China's Western Region and the Neighbouring Countries. The conference received local support from Yunnan University, and from scholars from the western region who presented papers. A book arising from the papers that were presented is being prepared for publication.

Despite the disruption from SARS, it has been a very busy and fruitful year from the viewpoint of the work of the functional units of the Institute. The Telephone Survey Research Laboratory has completed a cumulative total of 450 commissioned surveys, including 60 during the past year. Training activities have continued, with a new course organized for mid-level civil servants in the Lands Department and another one for some 30 officials from the Tianjin Municipal Government in October 2002. The latter was the third course in two years that we have organized for Tianjin. In terms of publications, the Institute has published 56 monographs to date. Also, 138 occasional papers have been published, including 11

within the year under review.

Finally, senior members of the Institute have continued to render important services to the government by participating in many committees, as can be seen in the brief biographical sketches found in the report. For instance, I was appointed Chairman of the Pearl River Delta Panel of the Central Policy Unit in February 2003. In recognition of my contributions to public policy, I was awarded the Silver Bauhinia Star this year. This is not just a personal honour, but one shared with my colleagues, who have given me unflagging support over the years. As the HKSAR government is being confronted with nagging teething problems, we stand ready to provide the results of evidence-based research so that, externally, Hong Kong can maintain its competitive edge in the Asia-Pacific region and, internally, maintain a unique and well-honed way of life that we all cherish.

## Profiles of the Senior Staff

Prof. Yeung Yue-man

楊汝萬

With basic training in geography in Hong Kong, Canada and the United States, Prof. Yeung has had a rich and variegated career that has spanned teaching, research, international development and university administration. He had been away from Hong Kong for almost two decades, studying in North America and working in Singapore and Canada before being appointed chair Professor of Geography at this University in 1984. Prof. Yeung has travelled to most countries in the Asia-Pacific region and has worked with many Asian research institutes and researchers. His research interests lie mainly in Asian cities, low-cost housing, and policy studies and design for development, with particular reference to Pacific Asia. He has published numerous books and articles in international learned journals on these subjects. Apart from being the Director of the Institute, Prof. Yeung leads the **Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia Research Programme**. Prof. Yeung plays a very active role in serving the Hong Kong community through memberships in several public bodies providing key urban services, and he participates collaboratively in many regional and global research projects.

Prof. Lau Siu-kai

Prof. Lau Siu-kai graduated from the University of Hong Kong in 1971 with a B.Soc.Sc. degree in sociology and economics, and from the University of Minnesota in 1975 with a Ph.D. in sociology. He joined CUHK in 1975. Prof. Lau's major research interests are comparative political and social development, society and politics in Hong Kong, and political development in traditional and modern China. He tackles both macroscopic and microscopic issues, such as political culture and political behaviour. His favourite approach is the comparative historical method. His publications include *Society and Politics in Hong Kong* (1982) and, with Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, *The Ethos of the Hong*

**Prof. Sung Yun-wing**

Prof. Sung Yun-wing is currently Professor and Chairman of the Economics Department of The Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is Associate Director of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies and also Co-Director of the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme of the same Institute at The Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is Editor of the *Asian Economic Journal*, Book Review Editor of *Pacific Economic Literature*, Corresponding Editor of *Asian-Pacific Economic Literature*, and is a member of the editorial board of *The China Review*, and the Corporate Economists' Advisory Group of the International Chamber of Commerce, Hong Kong, China Business Council. In public service, he is a part-time member of the Central Policy Unit, a member of the Panel on the Pearl River Delta of the Central Policy Unit, the Humanities, Social Sciences & Business Studies Panel of the Research Grants Council of Hong Kong, and the PECC Trade Policy Forum Hong Kong Committee. His research interests include international trade, economic development, the Hong Kong economy and the Chinese economy.

**Prof. Fanny Mui-ching Cheung**

Prof. Fanny M. Cheung, Ph.D. (Minnesota), Director of the Gender Research Centre, established the Gender Research Programme at CUHK in 1985. When she was Dean of the Faculty of Social Science in 1995-1996, she initiated the Gender Studies Programme. An active advocate for women's development in the community and a recognized women's leader in the Asia-Pacific region, she served as the founding chairperson of Hong Kong's Equal Opportunities Commission from 1996-1999. Her research interests in gender issues include gender roles, violence against women, women's health and gender equality. Other research interests in psychology include

personality assessment and cross-cultural psychopathology.

**Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi**

Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Director of the **South China Programme**, is Professor of Government and Public Administration and Chairman of the Department; he is also the Director of CUHK's Universities Service Centre for China Studies. He has co-authored *The Ethos of the Hong Kong Chinese* and co-edited the first two volumes of *China Review* and *China Review 1992*, as well as *China Review 1997*. He has contributed to *The China Quarterly*, *Studies in Comparative Communism*, *Asian Survey*, *Journal of Comparative and Commonwealth Studies* and *Pacific Affairs*.

**Prof. Liu Pak-wai**

Prof. Liu Pak-wai is currently Professor in Economics, Pro-Vice Chancellor of The Chinese University of Hong Kong, and Director of the **Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme** at The Chinese University of Hong Kong. He is also the Research Director of the Hong Kong Centre for Economic Research, a nominator of the Fukuoka Asian Culture Prizes, and a member of the Management Committee of the Hong Kong Institute of Economic and Business Strategy. In public service he serves as the Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Monetary Research, and is a member of Commission on Strategic Development, Council of Advisors on Innovation and Technology, Task Force on Employment, Panel of Arbitrators, Process Review Panel for the Securities and Futures Commission, Skills Upgrading Scheme Steering Committee, Manpower Development Committee, Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislative Council of the HKSAR, Land and Building Advisory Committee, Judging Panel for the Industrialist of the Year Award and the Young Industrialist Awards of Hong Kong, and the Hong Kong Committee on Pacific Economic Cooperation. His research interests cover the

areas of applied theory, labour market and employment, and the Hong Kong economy. Besides a continuing interest in economic theory, Prof. Liu is interested in the empirical aspects of economics.

**Dr. Gary Moon-cheung Shiu**

After graduating from George Mason University with a Ph.D. in economics, Dr. Shiu worked for a non-profit think-tank (Employment Policy Foundation) specializing in labour issues in Washington DC. Upon his return to Hong Kong, he first served as a senior economist for China Everbright Holdings Company Limited, a "Red Chip" conglomerate. He later joined the US Treasury's Asia Representative Office as an economist. He was a Regulatory Affairs Manager with the Hong Kong Telecommunications Authority, the local telecommunications watchdog, before coming to the Institute. He is now the coordinator of the Institute's Documentation Unit. His research interests include new institutional economics, public choice and the economics of transition.

**Prof. Tan Chee-beng**

Prof. Tan Chee-beng obtained his Ph.D. from Cornell University in 1979. He is currently Chairman of the Department of Anthropology at the Chinese University and Director of the **Cultural Relations and Identities in East Asia Research Programme**. He has been particularly interested in the study of Chinese overseas and, in recent years, has also conducted research in mainland China. Prof. Yip Hon-ming (Ph.D., University of California, Los Angeles), Associate Director of the **Gender Research Centre**, has published on gender/women's history, history of the overseas Chinese, modern and contemporary Chinese socio-economic history, and the local history of China and Hong Kong. As a member of the Association for the Advancement of Feminism, Hong Kong Women Christian Council and other community organizations, she considers the coordination of teaching, research and social practice the greatest challenges at present. Taking power in history as her focal point of reflection in recent years, she is interested in exploring the historical contexts of developments and changes in the operation of power

in human society; she is also interested in ways of exposing the historical roots of human manipulation and resistance in daily life. Related issues include marginalization and subordination, and subversion and struggle in the fields of gender, class and ethnicity.

**Prof. Yu Xingzhong**

Prof. Yu Xingzhong obtained his B.A. in English Literature from Lanzhou University in China and L.L.M (Master of Laws) and SJD (Doctor of Juridical Science) at Harvard Law School. He teaches Chinese law and constitutional law at the Department of Government and Public Administration. He assumed the duty of the Director of the Chinese Law Programme since March 2003. He previously served as a Lecturer on law at Harvard Law School (September 1999 – December 1999), a Senior Research Fellow at East Asian Legal Studies, Harvard Law School (1998 – 1999), a Visiting Professor at Beijing University Department of Law (Spring 1998) and an Associate (Chinese Legal Specialist) with Baker & McKenzie Chicago Office (November 1995 – February 1998). He was also a Visiting Scholar at Columbia Law School (1998--- 1990) and a Visiting Fellow at Australian National University (1984 – 1986). His research interest includes social and political theory, cultural studies of law, jurisprudence, constitutional and administrative law, constitutionalism in Hong Kong and China, comparative law, Chinese legal history and PRC law. ### *Objectives*

This inter-disciplinary research programme is designed to facilitate and consolidate diverse research interests in cultural development within and cultural interactions among East Asian countries at the Chinese University of Hong Kong as well as in the broader Hong Kong academic community. Cultural relations among Asia-Pacific countries have gained prominence in the post-Cold War era, as cultural activities carry new political meanings and commodified cultural items are promoted and traded across national and regional boundaries. The research projects focus on a broad array of identities and cultural relations in East Asia, including media and popular culture; youth culture and education; ethnic, national, and pan-Asian identity; cultural tourism; cosmopolitan culture and democratization; and food, cuisine and cultural change.

There are four categories of research activities in the Cultural Relations and Identities Research Programme. They are: tradition, change and identity; culture, identity and nationalism; cultural unity and diversity in Asia, and transnationalism and

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## GENDER RESEARCH CENTRE

The Gender Research Centre (GRC) is the first research unit on gender and women's issues in Hong Kong. Our mission is to promote knowledge in gender research and women's studies and to support action to enhance gender equality and the status of women. As the Centre is interdisciplinary in nature, scholars from Social Science, Humanities, Medicine, Business Administration, and other interdisciplinary fields participated in various research activities. Other faculty and staff of the university may join as members. Non-CUHK members and students may also join as affiliates.

### *Conference and Workshop*

The "Gender and Religion Workshop" held on 2-3 December 2002 was co-sponsored by the Gender Research Centre and the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences of the City University of Hong Kong. The Opening Ceremony, led by Prof. Fanny M. Cheung of the Gender Research Centre, Prof. Rance Lee, Head of Chung Chi College, and Dr. Jonathan Webster, Associate Dean of Humanities and Social Sciences at City University, marked the beginning of the two-day event. Speakers included scholars from Malaysia, Australia, Taiwan, Hong Kong, the Philippines, the U.S. and India. Papers covered gender-related topics on religion, politics, society and female religious specialists. About 100 participants attended the workshop.

Four local "women's salons" were co-sponsored by the GRC in May 2003 as part of the run-up to the East Asia Women's Forum (EAWF):

"Women and Peace", co-organized with Cheung Choi Wan (City Univeristy of Hong Kong) and Fong Chan, on 12 April;

"Women, Religion and Spirituality", co-organized with the

Hong Kong Women's Christian Council, on 26 April;

"Women's Economic Empowerment", co-organized with the HK Federation of Women's Centres on 3 May;

"Feminism and the Women's Movement in Hong Kong", co-organized with the Association for the Advancement of Feminism, on 31 May.

Each salon was attended by between 30-50 participants and lively discussions took place, showing that the subject matter was topical and that such opportunities to exchange views and share good practices are well appreciated.

This year's Annual Gender Role Workshop was combined with the HKIAPS Policy Forum. Originally planned for May 2003, it was postponed to 6 September 2003 due to the outbreak of SARS. The Policy Forum will focus on structural changes and the social needs of families separated because of the economic activities of spouses in mainland China.

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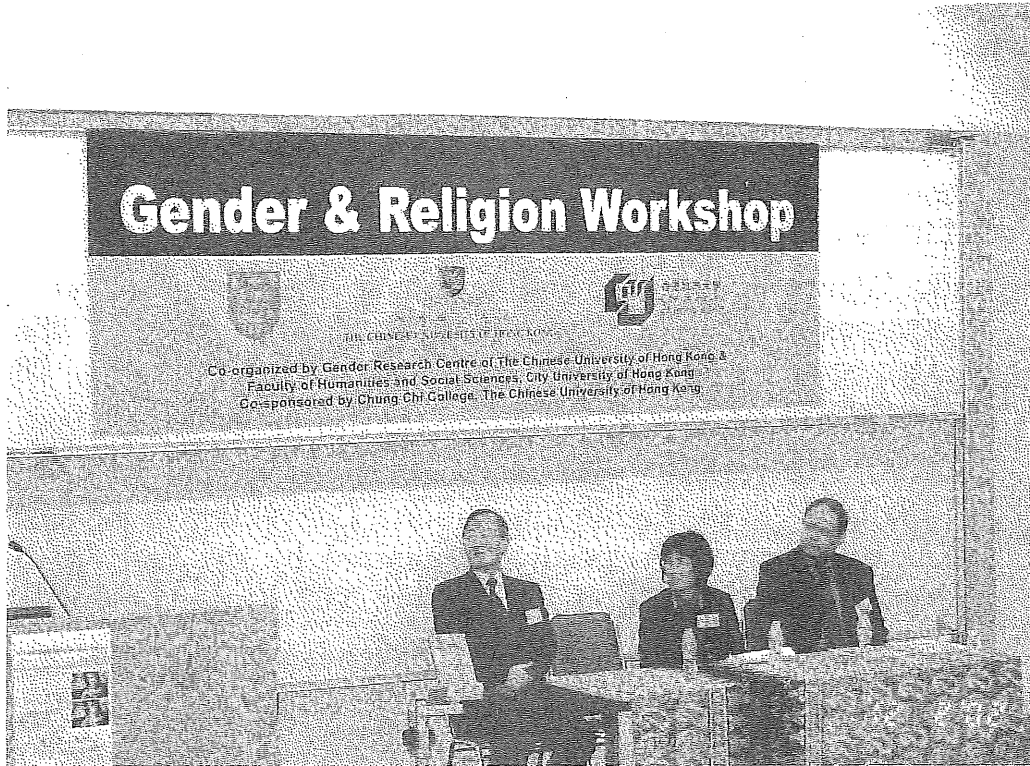

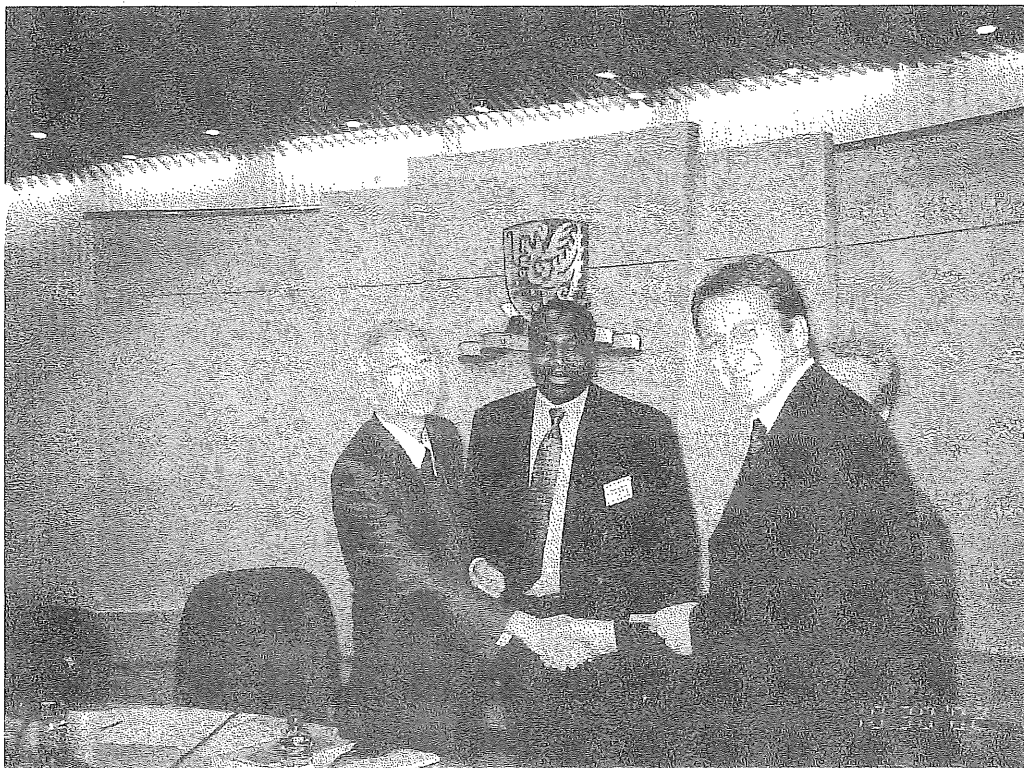

### *Asian Economic Journal*

This is the thirteenth year in which the Osaka International University and our Programme have jointly published the Asian Economic Journal for the East Asian Economic Association. Since 1997, the number of issues published each year has increased from three to four. Prof. Liu Pak-wai served as the Secretary General of the East Asian Economic Association from 1997 to 2002, while Prof. Sung Yun-Wing served as the Managing Editor of the journal from 1997 to 2000. In 2001, Prof. Kwong Kai-Sun took over as the Managing Editor and Prof. Sung Yun-Wing came to serve as the Editor. In 2003, Prof. Chou Win-lin took over as the Managing Editor while Prof. Kwong Kai-Sun assumed the position of Secretary General.

### *Impact*

Prof. Liu Pak-wai is the Research Director of the Hong Kong Centre for Economic Research, nominator of Fukuoka Asian Culture Prizes, and member of the Management Committee of Hong Kong Institute of Economic and Business Strategy. In public service, he serves as the Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Monetary Research, and is a member of the Commission on Strategic Development, Council of Advisors on Innovation and Technology, Task Force on Employment, Panel of Arbitrators, Process Review Panel for the Securities and Futures Commission, Skills Upgrading Scheme Steering Committee, Manpower Development Committee, Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislative Council of the HKSAR, Land and Building Advisory Committee, Judging Panel for the Industrialist of the Year Award and the Young Industrialist Awards of Hong Kong, and the Hong Kong Committee on Pacific Economic Cooperation.

Prof. Sung Yun-wing is the Editor of the *Asian Economic Journal*, Book Review Editor of the *Pacific Economic Review*, Corresponding Editor (Hong Kong) of the *Asian-Pacific Economic*

*Literature*, and a member of the Editorial Board of *The China Review*. He is a member of the Corporate Economists' Advisory Group of the International Chamber of Commerce, Hong Kong, China Business Council. In public service, he is a part-time member of the Central Policy Unit, a member of the Panel on the Pearl River Delta of the Central Policy Unit, the Humanities, Social Sciences and Business Studies Panel of the Research Grants Council of Hong Kong, and the PECC Trade Policy Forum Hong Kong Committee. These professional activities, which are related to the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme (HKAPE), have an impact on the local community as well as the on the Asia-Pacific region. They also help to project the image of the Research Programme.

Asian Economic Journal is devoted to publishing articles on Asian economies. The journal has a wide circulation not only in Asia but also in Europe and North America. Its readership is expected to increase as economists around the world focus their attention on the economic successes and problems of the Asia Pacific region. The Editorial Committee is very broadly based. It includes leading economists from all of the major East and Southeast Asian countries. Because the journal is edited, printed and published at CUHK, it bears the name of CUHK together with the Osaka International University on the front cover as the two institutions that produce the journal. The Secretariat of the East Asian Economic Association is also located at CUHK and uses HKIAPS as its address. The journal and the location of the Secretariat have promoted the image of CUHK in general, and HKAPE and HKIAPS in particular as institutions active in research within the Asia-Pacific region.

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## Political Development of Hong Kong

Programme Directors: Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi (Co-director)  
Prof. Lau Siu-kai (on leave)

### *Objectives*

Political changes in Hong Kong, driven by political reforms; the return of the territory's sovereignty to China in 1997; the mode of governance of the HKSAR government and socio-economic changes, form the core area of study of this programme. A wide range of research topics has been covered and more will be included. At present, the programme concentrates on issues related to popular elections, the relationship between China and Hong Kong, regime-building, institutional changes, policy reforms, political leadership and political conflicts.

### *Research Activities*

Both Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi continue to focus on studying the patterns of political change in Hong Kong, particularly in areas such as political leadership, regime building, political culture, development of political parties and emergent political issues.

Prof. Lau Siu-kai was appointed by the government to head the Central Policy Unit for a three-year term while he is on leave from the University.

Since many commissioned research projects of the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory of the Institute are about local politics, the Programme has provided technical and staff support to the Laboratory and is instrumental in its smooth operation.

The Programme was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the government to conduct a content analysis of the social conflicts reported by the local printed press. A coding system was developed to inventory the conflict events that occurred during the period January 1996 to June 2002. Finally,

3,385 social conflict events were recorded and the final research report was handed to the government in May 2003.

The following research projects are currently being sponsored by the Programme:

“Democratization and Value Change” by Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi and Prof. Lau Siu-kai: This is part of the regional collaborative project “East Asian Democratization and Value Change” involving Mongolia, South Korea, China, Taiwan, the Philippines, Hong Kong and Thailand. A territory-wide household survey was launched in September 2001. More than 800 cases were successfully interviewed during the fieldwork. A progress report was submitted last fall and a manuscript for the chapter on Hong Kong has been completed.

“Political Change and the Civil Servants in Hong Kong” by Prof. Lau Siu-kai: The project is funded by the Chinese University of Hong Kong.

“Political Culture and Political Participation in China, Taiwan and Hong Kong” by Prof. Lau Siu-kai, Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Prof. Andrew Nathan [Columbia University], Prof. Hu Fo [National Taiwan University], Prof. Chu Yun-han [National Taiwan University] and Prof. Shi Tian-jian [Duke University]: The project is funded by, inter alia, the National Science Foundation, the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation and the Luce Foundation. The questionnaire survey that was launched in Hong Kong was partly funded by the Center for Pacific Rim Studies, University of California, Los Angeles. Members of the research team are in the process of writing chapters to be included in a forthcoming book.

### *Data Collection*

The Programme has a collection of research materials on Hong Kong’s political scene. Aside from newspaper clippings, the Programme also collects unpublished research reports from various social and political organizations.

With a focus on local electoral studies, the Programme has built up a comprehensive collection of documents and materials related to elections and electoral campaigns in Hong Kong. The

collection forms a useful database for the study of future elections in Hong Kong.

### *International Exchange*

The Programme is also a partner in a project on the comparative study of political culture and political participation in Hong Kong, Taiwan and China. This cross-cultural study is being coordinated by Prof. Andrew Nathan of Columbia University. Researchers come from Hong Kong, China, Taiwan and the United States. This trilateral project attempts to chart changes in political culture and development in the Greater China region partly on the basis of two major surveys conducted in 1993 and 2001. The Hong Kong team (composed of Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi) was responsible for conducting questionnaire surveys in Hong Kong, which were completed in the summer of 1993 and fall of 2001. Four workshops have already been held in August 1992, March 1993, July 1995 and September 2002 in Honolulu, Los Angeles, Hong Kong and Taipei, respectively.

The research project, "The Legislative Council Elections in 1998", has attracted overseas attention and subsequently been incorporated into a 14-nation collaborative project, "The Comparative National Elections Project (CNEP)", coordinated by Prof. Richard Gunther of Ohio State University. A looser affiliation has also been established with another and larger international research project, "Comparative Study of Electoral Systems (CSES)", coordinated by The Institute of Social Research at the University of Michigan.

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## Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong

Programme Directors: Prof. Lau Siu-kai (on leave)  
Ms. Wan Po-san

### *Objectives*

The Programme focuses on the measurement and study of social development in Hong Kong. Its prime purpose is to build up a set of longitudinal data on the subjective and objective dimensions of social conditions and social change. It is hoped that the availability of these data will facilitate not only analyses of patterns of social change and explorations of social issues and problems but also contribute to the evaluation and formulation of public policy.

### *Conference*

“The Third Conference on Social Stratification Studies in Chinese Societies”

This conference, organized in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong and the Centre for Social Policy Studies of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University, was held on 28-30 November 2002 at the Chinese University. Over a hundred scholars and students from mainland China, Taiwan and Hong Kong participated in the conference and 26 papers were presented. The conference proceedings will be published by the Institute.

### *Research Activities*

Highlights of the main activities during the past year are underlined as follows:

“Social Indicators Survey Series” coordinated by Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Ms. Wan Po-san

The Programme has been conducting a series of biennial territory-wide household surveys since 1988. These periodic surveys aim to measure the scope and extent of significant aspects of social change in Hong Kong by focusing on the perceptions, values, feelings, aspirations and sense of well-being of the Hong Kong people on various important aspects of their daily lives.

The survey “Social and Political Change in a Period of Reform and Readjustment: Indicators of Social Development in Hong Kong 2001” was funded by the Research Grants Council’s Competitive Earmarked Research Grant (HK\$1,505,817) and was conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong and the Centre for Social Policy Studies of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University. It focused on social issues and political problems engendered by Hong Kong’s sudden economic downturn, its long and painful road to economic recovery and the HKSAR government’s various reform initiatives. The CUHK team members included Prof. Lau Siu-kai, Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Prof. Deborah Davis, Prof. Chan Kin-man, Mr. Simon Ng and Ms. Wan Po-san. A general report, entitled *Indicators of Social Development: Hong Kong 2001*, was published by the Institute.

The survey “Crisis and Reintegration: Indicators of Social Development in Hong Kong 2003” is also funded by the Research Grants Council’s Competitive Earmarked Research Grant (HK\$1,554,000) and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong and the Department of Applied Social Sciences of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University. The CUHK team members include Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi and Ms. Wan Po-san.

“A Comparative Study of the Social Image of Taiwan and Hong Kong”

CUHK team: Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Ms. Wan Po-san

Taiwan team: Prof. Chang Ying-hwa, Prof. Chiu Hei-yuan, Prof. Fu Yang-chih, Prof. Michael Hsin-huang Hsiao and Prof. Yi Chin-chun

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica, Taiwan. A telephone survey will be conducted once or twice a year to gauge the perceptions, values and subjective well-being of people in both societies. The core questions of the questionnaire will be kept unchanged as far as possible so as to detect social trends and changes, while questions on special topics will be flexible enough to reflect changes in social conditions.

The third survey, which focused on subjective well-being and socio-political trust, was carried out in December 2002. It was funded by Mr. Richard Liu.

The fourth survey, which focused on SARS, was carried out in May 2003. The CUHK team members included Prof. Rance Lee, Prof. Cheung Yuet-wah, Prof. Stephen Chiu, Prof. Susanne Choi and Ms. Wan Po-san.

“An Inventory of Social Conflicts in Hong Kong: 1996-2002” by Ms. Wan Po-san and Dr. Timothy K. Y. Wong

The project was commissioned by the Central Policy Unit of the HKSAR government. Its aim was to build up a comprehensive database on various kinds of social conflicts occurring between 1 January 1996 and 30 June 2002; to study the origins, dynamics, patterns and trends of these events; and to analyse the modes of conflict management and resolution. The final report was submitted to the Central Policy Unit in May 2003.

“Comparative Studies on Economic Development and Women’s Family Status in Chinese Societies: Hong Kong Study” by Prof. Lau Yuk-king (Principal Investigator), Prof. Joyce Lai-chong Ma and Prof. Chan Ying-keung

The study aims to examine the effects of changing family



structure and female employment on the decision-making power of women and their access to resources in the family. It is part of a comparative research project coordinated by Prof. Yi Chin-chun (Institute of Sociology, Academia Sinica, Taiwan). The Hong Kong survey is jointly funded by Mr. Richard Liu, the Direct Grant Committee of the Chinese University and the Lee Hysan Endowment Fund of the United College.

*"Poverty Studies by Census Data"* by Prof. Wong Chack-kie

This project is funded by Mr. Richard Liu. This is a study of how poverty can be measured by using Hong Kong's census data for 1996 and 2001. Hong Kong does not have an official poverty line. This is one of the few attempts to identify the extent of poverty in Hong Kong. It will examine whether an income-based or an expenditure-based poverty line is a more appropriate measure of poverty for Hong Kong. There are two arguments for the use of the expenditure-based poverty line in the territory. First, Hong Kong people used to have a rate of high savings; hence, an expenditure-based poverty line could disregard the role of savings in poverty. Second, if a poverty line is also used to measure social equality, it may fail to detect the factor of hardship. An expenditure-based approach to measuring poverty avoids this pitfall. The data available will serve as scientific benchmarks for further research in this increasingly important area — not only do the poor include the elderly, widowed and disabled, but also those who are at the lower end of the labour market; i.e., the new working poor.

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## South China

Programme Director: **Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi**

### *Objectives*

The Programme has undergone a number of changes in the past few years. It was created a decade ago to promote academic research in issues of development in post-1949 China. We were particularly interested in the breakdown of old practices and the evolution of new institutions and practices in the economic, social, mass media and political systems. In the beginning, the Programme operated largely as a funding mechanism to give financial support to faculty and research students in their respective studies. While this function continues into the present, more and more emphasis has recently shifted towards the development of in-house projects. The allocation of funding used to be confined to research on the southern region of China. This has now become simply an area of emphasis. The transformation also involves an attempt to build up interdisciplinary teams on cross-cutting research. Starting from last year, the Programme also aspires to establish links with researchers in other parts of Greater China.

### *Research Activities*

#### *"Research Group on Civil Society"*

The two-year old project "Comparative Study of Civil Organizations in Chinese Societies" has been renamed "The Research Group on Civil Society". Members of the Group include Chan Kin-man (SOC) as the convenor, Lui Tai-lok (SOC), Joseph Man Chan (JLM), Wang Shaoguang (GPA), Kuan Hsin-chi (GPA) and Wong Hung (SWK).

In the year, the Group decided to launch a specific project "Social, Economic and Political Impacts of Business

Organizations in Guangdong" with Chan Kin-man as the chief investigator. With funding of HK\$130,000 for a two-year period, the project investigated the development of the chambers of commerce and various trade associations in Guangdong from Qing times to the contemporary period. Sociologists and historians in Zhongshan University and Jinan University were invited to collaborate on the project.

Wang Shaoguang is currently engaged in a study entitled "Associational Revolution in China". The project is funded by the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation for International Scholarly Exchange, Taiwan (NT\$1,336,770) and The Aspen Institute, USA (US\$50,000). Under Prof. Wang's supervision, one M.Phil. and one Ph.D. student are involved in thesis research on the third sector in mainland China.

The Research Group joined forces with the Research Institute for Guangdong Development at Zhongshan University to establish the Research Centre for NGOs in South China in early 2003. The Centre aims to promote comparative studies, cultivate international academic exchanges, and provide training and consulting services to NGOs in this region. Prof. Qiu Haixiong (Zhongshan) and Prof. Chan Kin-man are the co-conveners of the Centre. Immediately after its establishment, the Centre received two research grants. One was a commission by the Asia Foundation to study how the educational needs of the children of rural migrant workers in urban China can be satisfied. An evaluative study will also be conducted following the establishment of a model school according to the Centre's advice. Another grant is from The Partnerships for Community Development, which has commissioned the Centre to study and identify NGOs in Guangdong as their potential partners in providing voluntary services to the poor and needy in the region. The Centre is also engaging in a study funded by the Ministry of Education on "The Impact of Industry Associations on the Development of Industrial Clusters in the Pearl River Delta Area".

*“Political Economy and Regional Disparities”*

Directed by Prof. Tsui Kai-yuen (ECO) as the principal investigator, this project has been completed.

2004 Conference on *“The State of Contemporary China”*

In support of the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Universities Service Centre, the Programme is planning to hold an international conference on *“the State of Contemporary China”*, to be held from January 5-6, 2004. The conference will be devoted to evaluating the state of research and knowledge about contemporary China. More specifically, contributors to the conference are expected to take stock of the substantial knowledge accumulated in research areas that have already achieved a critical mass, with a view to contributing to intellectual syntheses and theoretical integration.

The preparatory work is progressing well. So far, a total of 56 scholars are committed to coming and presenting papers. Two-thirds of them have already submitted abstracts of their papers.

## Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia

Programme Director: Prof. Yeung Yue-man

### *Objectives*

The Programme promotes and facilitates research on economic development and social change in the Asia-Pacific region through studies on urban and regional development. Many books and other publications have appeared to date arising from research projects that have been undertaken. During the past few years, attention has been focused specifically on China's western region in field reconnaissance and research.

The Programme has continued to receive financial support from the Lippo Group, which has generously provided an annual grant to the Programme since 1993. We are grateful to Dr. Stephen Riady and Mr. J. P. Lee, OBE, JP, for their encouragement and support. The Programme has also gained financially through the provision of consultancy services.

### *Conferences and Invited Presentations*

During the past year, the Programme did not organize any conferences or seminars. However, it was indirectly involved in preparations for the conference on "China's Western Development and Its Implications on Neighbouring Countries" held in Yunnan University in Kunming in December 2002. It was held under the auspices of the Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute. A book arising from the papers presented is being prepared for publication.

### *Research Activities*

Three books arising from recent research projects involving the Programme are soon to be published.

The first is entitled *Cities Transformed*, from the work of the Urban Population Dynamics Panel under the auspices of the National Research Council of the United States. The book representing the work of the Panel over the past several years is due to appear at any time now.

The second is on public housing in Hong Kong, in both English and Chinese, which will appear before the end of 2003. It is a collaborative venture between the Institute and the Hong Kong Housing Authority, but the Programme has played the leading role.

The third is on China's western region, which has occupied

our energy and attention the past few years. The book has been completed and is in the process of review. Like the last books, it will be published by The Chinese University Press.

During the past year, the Programme has been involved in a consultancy project on Xinhui as a Logistics Hub. It was undertaken in the background of growing interest in investment and research in the western portion of the Pearl River Delta. Another similar research project, also on Western Pearl River Delta, is being funded by the Central Policy Unit and is due to be completed by early 2004.

#### *Overview*

The 2002-2003 academic year witnessed a relatively quiet period for the Chinese Law Programme (hereafter, Programme). After the departure of the former Director, Prof. K.C. Wong in the summer of 2002, the Programme went into hibernation for several months, during which the only active member associated with the Programme was Mr. Ong Yew-kim, an honorary research fellow at the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (HKIAPS). In March 2003 Prof. Yu Xingzhong was appointed as the Director of the Programme. Having consulted senior academics and administrators who were at some point associated with the Programme as to how the Programme should continue to function, we have envisioned a careful but steadily growing plan for the Programme. The Programme is poised to start anew in the academic year of 2003-2004. Set forth below are the activities undertaken by the Programme in the 2002-2003 academic year.

#### *Conferences*

In collaboration with the Hong Kong Trade Development Council (HKTDC), the Programme continued with its Chinese law seminar series, which is designed to help Hong Kong professionals working in the areas of industry, commerce and trade who are interested in seeking business opportunities in mainland China to better understand Chinese law and related issues. The seminar series has offered topics on Chinese law that may affect Hong Kong individuals and institutions doing business or interacting with parties in mainland China,

including PRC company law, contract law, tax law, customs law, intellectual property law and foreign invested enterprise laws. The latest seminar, held on June 17, 2003 in the training centre of the HKTDC, discussed issues relating to China's entry into the World Trade Organization (WTO) and legal reforms. The seminar was attended by more than 50 participants from all walks of life in Hong Kong. The main speakers included Prof. Wang Weiguo, Dean of the School of Economic Law of the Chinese University of Political Science and Law and Prof. Wang Guiguo of the City University of Hong Kong Law School.

### *Training courses*

As another collaborative project with the HKTDC, training courses on Chinese law continue to attract interested persons in Hong Kong's professional world. The course, covering more than ten subjects on Chinese law, usually runs for two and half months and constitutes part of the curriculum for the Chinese Business Law Certificate programme offered by the HKTDC. In April 2003 the training programme held its first training session of the year. Fifty-five trainees from the fields of law, accounting and other professions and enterprises participated. The instructors were specialists or professors of relevant fields serving in Hong Kong or mainland China.

### *Other activities*

Mr. Ong Yew-kim, an Honorary Research Fellow long associated with the Programme, has been very active in offering opinions on issues relating to Chinese law and as well as Hong Kong law at the invitation of major TV stations. He has spoken on the BBC, CNN, RTHK, TVB and other television and radio stations on numerous occasions, addressing issues of Chinese and Hong Kong law as they affect the daily life of Hong Kong people, especially on the issue of Article 23 of the Basic Law. He has also contributed extensively to newspapers and magazines in the English and Chinese languages. In addition, he speaks



frequently at government meetings, to the Legislative Council and international press club, and at community gatherings and forums.

### *Community Service*

Mr. Ong has also been involved in providing legal assistance to Hong Kong citizens involved in the Chinese legal system. He has acted as a legal adviser to the Hong Kong Association of Community Organizations, assisting individuals who were wronged or mistreated by the legal system or personnel in the mainland in getting justice or compensation. He has also lectured on Chinese law in legal training classes organized by local communities.

### *Remarks*

Thanks to the efforts of the founders and successive directors and staff members, the Programme has over the years established a good reputation and made considerable contributions to the Hong Kong community. China's entry into the WTO and the business opportunities this may bring about has given the Programme great impetus to develop. Such development is in line with the goals of the CUHK and is in the interest of the Hong Kong community. There will be greater demand for knowledge of Chinese law from international and local communities. Having a well-developed Chinese law programme in the CUHK answers to that demand. However, taking into consideration the limited capacity of the Programme and based on past experiences, we are of the view that it is unrealistic for the Programme to experience sudden and dramatic growth. Instead we are choosing to proceed cautiously on the basis of what has already been achieved. In light of that thinking, we will plan for our work for the year 2003-2004.

## FUNCTIONAL SERVICES

### External Liaison

Coordinator: **Dr. Timothy Ka-ying Wong**

Dr. Timothy Ka-ying Wong is responsible for external liaison work of the Institute. This is a duty of a rather regular and routine nature. The overall objective is to publicize the activities of the Institute so that the public and concerned groups or persons can be informed of our work, make use of our research results and take part in our activities. External liaison has three main components:

Publicity about our publications includes preparing and issuing press releases to the media, distributing information sheets and order forms to relevant institutions and individuals, and liaising with our distributors.

Publicity about our conferences and seminars includes preparing and issuing press releases, sending invitations and publicity materials to the media, arranging and facilitating the reporting work of the press, and assisting the organizing committees to handle enquiries and public relations.

Liaison with overseas institutions and individuals includes the handling of enquiries and the exchange of information and publications.

During the last year, over 50 scholars from mainland China and overseas have visited the Institute, 6 seminars, forums or conferences have been held, and 11 occasional papers and 1 research monograph have been published. On the whole, our guests and visiting participants were pleased, and the coverage of our seminar/conference activities by the media was satisfactory. Our publications were also made known and distributed in an effective manner.

## Telephone Survey Research Laboratory

Coordinator: Dr. Timothy Ka-ying Wong

### *The Laboratory*

Established in May 1995, the Laboratory can handle over 30 telephone lines, all connected to the CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) system operated through a main server. It can cope with the demands of large samples under time constraints.

### *Objectives*

- a) To provide a telephone survey laboratory to researchers at the Chinese University who want to use a telephone interview technique to facilitate their research.
- b) To enable the development of new research interests using the telephone interview method.
- c) To collect panel public opinion data of academic and social value.
- d) To serve as a link between the Chinese University and the public by regularly offering the results of survey polls on public issues.

### *Accomplishments*

Over 450 commissioned surveys have been completed since the establishment of the Laboratory (60 surveys in the past year).

Our survey findings have been widely covered by the media, thereby helping to raise the profile of the Institute and the Chinese University.

The Laboratory has attracted an increasing number of researchers from academic circles and the media who want to use telephone surveys as an alternative method of collecting data.

With the improving financial situation, we have designed

and launched our panel surveys for academic research.

We have trained and pooled over 70 experienced interviewers from among CUHK students as well as students from other universities, providing them not only with a good source of income but also with valuable experience in conducting telephone survey research.

We have conducted several seminars for secondary school and technical college students, and introduced them to the methodology and interpretation of opinion polling.

### *Policy*

The Laboratory welcomes the sponsorship or commission of surveys; it is also open to collaboration with interested persons or organizations.

## **Documentation Unit**

Coordinator: **Dr. Gary Moon-cheung Shiu**

In tandem with the relocation of the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies, the Documentation Unit (DU) has a new home as well. The DU is now located in Room 502, Esther Lee Building.

DU holds a vast collection of books, papers, journals and other reference materials on countries in the Asia-Pacific region. Deserving of special mention is our collection of Hong Kong newspaper clippings with broad coverage from the 1950s to August 2000. In addition, the DU carries a large number of unpublished surveys on many different social issues.

From July 2002 to early March of 2003, electronic archiving of our Hong Kong newspaper clippings continued. The archiving program came to a halt in mid-March 2003 because of the outbreak of the SARS epidemic. Student helpers have been asked to stop coming to our unit for precautionary reasons. It is expected that the archiving effort will resume when the new semester starts in September 2003. Thus far, about 85 % of our newspaper clippings dated from the 1950s to the 1970s has been scanned.

From July 2002 to the mid June 2003, altogether 137 users visited the DU. Students continued to be the core group of DU's visitors during the past year. Outside visitors were the second-largest group of users of the DU. With the train station just steps away, the DU should now be more accessible to visitors from outside of the University.

During the past year, the DU received well over 452 items on Hong Kong alone. The Asia-Pacific collection has expanded as well. Over 202 items have been added to our collection. Of these, 149 are books/surveys while periodicals and CD-Roms account for the rest. As of mid June 2003, the DU boasts a collection of 44,600 items of books, periodicals and other reference materials.

HKIAPS publications aim to disseminate and promote research on the social, economic and political development of Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region. It is hoped that the extensive and effective dissemination of our research findings will broaden their intellectual and social impact, and allow more donations to be solicited for applied social science studies.

Scholars both inside and outside the Chinese University are welcome to submit manuscripts for consideration. The manuscripts received are evaluated by the Editorial Committee in collaboration with invited reviewers of relevant specialities. Priority in publication is given to the results of research undertaken by academics affiliated with the Institute and related to the domains of the established strategic research programmes.

Five publication series, namely the Research Monograph Series, Occasional Paper Series, Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute (SHKDI) Research Monograph Series, SHKDI Occasional Paper Series and USC Seminar Series, are regularly produced. The first four series are mostly the results of research undertaken by scholars at the Institute. The USC Seminar Series publishes selected research papers presented at the Universities Service Centre for China Studies seminars. In addition, the Institute publishes the *Asian Economic Journal* for the East Asian Economic Association.

## Others

### *Hong Kong Public Policy Forums*

Generous donations from Pacific Century Cyber Works Limited has made it possible for the Institute to organize three public policy forums during the past year. The main objective in holding the forums is to provide an avenue through which academicians, practitioners, business leaders, government officials and other outside experts can share and exchange their views. The themes of past forums were: (1) 內地與香港更緊密的經貿關係安排; (2) 家庭在經濟不景時期的抗逆能力 and (3) 從穩定樓市措施看房屋政策的銳變. Guests of honour who had been invited to participate included Michael Suen, Secretary of Housing, Planning and Lands and Dr. Eden Woon, CEO of the Hong Kong General Chamber of Commerce, among others. More such forums will be forthcoming when the academic year resumes in September 2003.

### *Training Courses for the Land Department*

During the past year, the Institute helped to organize training courses for mid-level civil servants from the Lands Department. Prof. Zhang Li from the Department of Geography and Resource Management and Prof. Tsao King-kwun from the Department of Government and Public Administration were invited to deliver lectures at the Lands Department on two separate occasions. The topics covered included China's Urban Development Policies and China's Public Administration System. The feedback from the participants was very positive.

### *Training for Tianjin Municipal Government Officials*

Between 15-26 October 2002, the Institute organized a training course on human resources management for officials from the Tianjian municipal government. A total of 30 officials joined in this event. Professors from other universities in Hong Kong

joined those from CUHK to give lectures to the participants over a two-week period. The topics covered ranged from the government's role in Hong Kong's economy to performance appraisals. This was the second time that our Institute had been selected to organize such a training course.
