COURSE DESCRIPTION

An elementary course designed for students who have no knowledge of Chinese language. It aims to familiarize students with the use of basic vocabulary and grammar points. Vocabulary introduced in this course is based on everyday conversations and daily usage. Focus will be on appropriateness in application.

Upon completion of the course with CLCP1123, students will move up to study CLCP1133 and CLCP1153. Students who want to study Putonghua level 2 or above are invited to take the Putonghua placement tests offered by CLC. Students who have completed higher levels of similar Putonghua courses are not allowed to take this course.

GRADING WEIGHTS

This is an intensive course. Registered students must meet for 42 teaching hours. The final grade is based on evaluation of student performance (25%), periodical assessment test (50%) and final examination (25%).

Assignments without the properly signed declaration will not be graded by teachers.

Only the final version of the assignment should be submitted via VeriGuide.

The submission of a piece of work, or a part of a piece of work, for more than one purpose (e.g. to satisfy the requirements in two different courses) without declaration to this effect shall be regarded as having committed undeclared multiple submission. It is common and acceptable to reuse a turn of phrase or a sentence or two from one's own work; but wholesale reuse is problematic. In any case, agreement from the course teacher(s) concerned should be obtained prior to the submission of the piece of work.
