

Kayne is the author of *French Syntax* (1975), *Connectedness and Binary Branching* (1984), *The Antisymmetry of Syntax* (1994), *Parameters and Universals* (2000), *Movement and Silence* (2005) and *Comparisons and Contrasts* (2010). He has received a B.A. summa cum laude in mathematics from Columbia University in 1964, a Ph.D in linguistics from M.I.T. in 1969, a Doctorat ès Lettres from the University of Paris VIII in 1976, and honorary doctorates from the University of Leiden in 1995 and from the University of Bucharest in 2011. He has taught at the University of Paris VIII, M.I.T., and the CUNY Graduate Center, and is currently Silver Professor of Linguistics at New York University.
