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Exhibition Review:

"Southbound Intellectuals and Their Legacy: Lingnan Literati's Contribution to a Century of Hong Kong Education"

Research Programme for Lingnan Culture of Institute of Chinese Studies and the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) Library jointly presented this exhibition: Southbound Intellectuals and Their Legacy: Lingnan Literati's Contribution to a Century of Hong Kong Education from 30 September 2021 to 8 May 2022.

Southbound intellectuals had had a profound impact on the heritage and evolution of traditional Chinese culture in Hong Kong over the past century since the late Qing and Republican era. These Lingnan literati established schools and other educational institutions for nurturing talents, founded literary societies and poetry gatherings to facilitate literary expression and exchange, and celebrated the humanity and integrity of the traditional ideal Chinese scholar. They also launched newspapers



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and magazines and organised exhibitions to preserve and promote the traditional Chinese culture in Hong Kong. The rich and enduring legacy of the traditional Chinese classics, art, and literature followed the southbound journey of these intellectuals to Hong Kong and flourished in the city.

This exhibition aimed at exploring the Lingnan literati's stories and their contribution to a century of Hong Kong education. It included four sections: the first section introduced the lives of the 20 southern Lingnan literati; the second section traced their footprints in Hong Kong; the third section presented their educational and cultural activities; the fourth exhibition area displayed their rare publications and manuscripts, as well as calligraphy and paintings.

It is hoped that by reviewing the development of traditional Chinese culture education in Hong Kong, the exhibition can inspire the next generation of students to continue to promote the prosperity of Chinese culture and humanistic traditions.

The competition aims to promote international academic research on Lingnan culture, as well as to encourage local and overseas doctoral students and postdoctoral fellows who are aspiring to conduct in-depth research in the field.

Eligibility:

- 1. Eligibility is limited to doctoral students and postdoctoral fellows.
- 2. Submissions must be papers of original research on Lingnan culture, in the areas of literature, history, philosophy, religion, arts, linguistics, anthropology, or other humanities disciplines.
- 3. Submission papers should be either in Chinese or English of no more than 30,000 words. The papers should never have been published.

Prizes:

The competition is sponsored by Bei Shan Tang Foundation. Awards will be presented to the first, second, and third prize-winning entries (with cash prizes at HK\$30,000, HK\$20,000, and HK\$10,000 respectively), and five honorable mentions (HK\$5,000 each). The result will be announced in February 2023.

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

The Eighth Inter-Regional Forum on Dialectal Grammar

The Inter-Regional Forum on Chinese Dialectal Grammar (IRF) was initiated by The Chinese University of Hong Kong and Sun Yat-sen University in 2015 and extended its partnership with Fudan University in 2017, which has become an academic event organised rotationally by these three institutions as a platform intended to foster research on dialectal grammar under a comparative approach, focusing on southeastern Chinese dialects like Yue and Wu dialects, to promote interregional studies, and to strengthen intellectual exchange and dialogue among researchers from different regions.

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


