Young Scholars' Forum in Chinese Studies 2022

The Young Scholars' Forum in Chinese Studies 2022, co-organised by the CCK Asia-Pacific Centre for China Studies and the Institute of Chinese Studies, was held on 8–9 December 2022 at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK).

This year, the forum was conducted in a hybrid mode, in which the discussants and 11 participants attended in person while seven participants were invited to join via Zoom. The new mode drew about 120 people including CUHK colleagues, students, alumni, and the public.

The forum aims to nurture young scholars in Chinese Studies and strengthen their academic networks. With the theme "Chinese Borderlands in Transition: History, Space, and Culture", this

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year's forum invited a total of 18 young scholars to present their research papers. The papers were divided into seven panels scheduled over a period of two days. Topics of interest include but are not restricted to: 1. Emergence of borderland communities and lifestyles; 2. Border-crossing and subsequent cultural activities; 3. Changes in religions and religious practices; 4. Changes in natural and artificial landscapes; 5. Memories and imageries of geographical and cultural boundaries; and 6. Impacts on other geographical regions, cultural spaces, and intellectual domains.



CUHK faculty members including Prof. Lai Chi Tim from the Department of Cultural and Religious Studies, Prof. Lai Ming Chiu from the Department of History, Prof. Li Chen from the Centre for Chinese Studies, Prof. Puk Wing Kin from the Department of History, Prof. Ye Jia from the Office of University General Education, Prof. Yim Chi Hung from the Department of Chinese Language and Literature and Prof. Tsui Lik Hang from the Department of Chinese and History at the City University of Hong Kong, were invited to serve as discussants. The forum, originally scheduled for last year, received 110 applications. 27 applicants were invited though nine withdrew due to the postponement and travel restrictions. The participants came from different regions/countries – seven from mainland China, four from the U.S.A, three from Europe, three from other countries in Asia, and one from Hong Kong – reflecting the forum's effort to enhance international communication in Chinese studies.

- 3. Submission papers should be either in Chinese or English of no more than 30,000 words. The papers should never have been published.

Let's Talk about Street and History: In Search of the Dynamism of Business and Culture in Hong Kong

Dr. Victor Zheng

On 29 September 2022, ICS Luncheon invited Dr. Victor Zheng as the speaker to deliver a talk on the history of streets in Hong Kong.

Dr. Victor Zheng is the Associate Director (Executive) of Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (HKIAPS), CUHK. He is also the Director of Centre for Social and Political Development Studies, and Co-Convenor of Global China Research Programme. His research interests are Chinese family business and inheritance, Hong Kong business culture and history, social indicators and social development, and global China studies.

During the Luncheon, Dr. Zheng introduced five streets in Hong Kong: Hollywood Road, Central-Mid-Levels Escalator and Walkway System, Bonham Strand, Nathan Road, and Waterloo Road. All these streets and roads contain pieces of Hong Kong history, allowing us to explore stories of entrepreneurs, changes in urban planning, and differences of government policies in various periods. Dr. Zheng emphasised that Hong Kong culture and history are not things that can only be found in textbooks; they exist in our daily lives. Streets are valuable resources for us to discover more about Hong Kong.

Actually, What is Chinese Music?

Prof. Frederick Lau

On 13 October 2022, ICS Luncheon invited Prof. Frederick Lau, Chair of the Department of Music, CUHK as the speaker to deliver a talk on Chinese music.

Prof. Lau is an ethnomusicologist, flutist, and conductor whose scholarly interests include a broad range of topics in Chinese, Western, and Asian music and cultures. He has published widely on issues related to music and identity, nationalism, modernisation, politics, globalisation, diaspora, musical hybridity as well as

Western avant-garde music. He has received numerous research grants from agencies such as the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), the Scholarly Communication with the PRC, Freeman Grants, and the German Academic Exchange (D.A.A.D.). He served as the former book review editor of the Yearbook for Traditional Music and is the editor of a book series entitled Music and Performing Arts of Asia and the Pacific, University of Hawaii Press.

During the Luncheon, Prof. Lau stated that many people in Hong Kong label Chinese music as "boring" or "outdated"; they think it is something that can only be found in traditional Chinese opera. In reality, Chinese music comes in various forms as indicators of Chinese culture, reflecting characteristics of the different time period and regions. The answer to the question "what is music" is everchanging. We should not limit ourselves to Western or modern music only, rather, we can try to appreciate Chinese music.

Canton Products and Sino-French Trade in the Qing Dynasty

Dr. Chou Ying-Ching

On 10 November 2022, ICS Luncheon invited Dr. Chou Ying-Ching as the speaker to deliver a talk on Canton Products and Sino-French Trade in the Qing Dynasty.

Dr. Chou is a Postdoctoral Fellow of Art Museum at CUHK. Her research interests are Qing imperial art, the culture of Chinese collections, history of Chinese paintings and the exchange between East Asia and the West in early modern period.

During the Qing dynasty, Guangzhou was designated as the sole trading port with foreign countries. There is an increasing demand for Canton Products, which refer to luxury goods that were produced in Guangzhou. Using looking glass and glass mirrors as an example, Dr. Chou explained that Chinese artists learned and preserved glass-making techniques from Europe. Europeans were amazed to find out that their long-lost art can be found in Guangzhou, and as a result, marchand-merciers such as Compagnie des Indes Orientales massively bought Canton Products and shipped them back to France for bidding. Purchasing Canton Products thus became an unstoppable trend in European countries.

Sino-French Trade in the Qing dynasty is a unique experience. Not only did Chinese artists absorb glass manufacturing methods and painting techniques from Europe, they also localised the products and exported them back to Europe. It is an example of how economic development and cultural reservation can be achieved at the same time.

CCK-APC Visiting Scholar Lecture Series

Two visiting scholars from CUHK-CCK Asia Pacific Centre's Young Scholars Visiting Schemes were invited to deliver lectures to share their insights of their fields with CUHK students and scholars.

The first seminar "On the Stringless String the Sound Lacks a Sound: Tracing the Image of the Stringless *Qin* in Buddhist and Literati Writings During the Song Dynasty (960–1279)" was delivered by Dr. Meimei Zhang from Occidental College on 25 October 2022.

Dr. Zhang is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Comparative Studies in Language and Culture at Occidental College. Her research interests are Premodern Chinese Literature, Music, and Intellectual History during China's Tang-Song Transition Period, specialised in the Chinese musical instrument, *qin*.

During the lecture, Dr Zhang shareed her research of the "stringless *qin*" in Buddhist and literati writings. The symbol of the stringless *qin* is often related to Tao Qian, who would play on a *qin* without strings while he was drunk. A *qin* without any strings cannot make any sound, thus, this action is usually recognised as using music that does not exist as a way to practice the way of Zen, especially the teaching of "Not based on the written word, directly pointing to the human mind" (不立文字,直指人心). Since Song Dynasty heavily emphasised Buddhist teachings, the stringless *qin* as became a symbol among monks and scholars, who treated it as a token of enlightenment, a way to liberate people from burdens.

Dr. Zhang quoted a few examples of Buddhist and literati writings that contain both religious and philosophical discussions, on one's self reflection and improvement, on the remembrance of Tao Qian himself, and ultimately, on pursuing virtue and morals.

The second seminar "No More Miss Nanyang: New Women Monthly and Chinese Women's Writings in Postwar Malaya" was delivered by Dr. Show Ying Xin from Australian National University on 15 November 2022.

Dr. Show is a Lecturer in the Department of Gender, Media and Cultural Studies, School of

Culture, History & Language. Her Research interests include Southeast Asian history and literature, Inter-Asia cultural studies, Chinese and Sinophone literature, Chinese diaspora, translation, and memory.

The lecture focused on Malaya in the period of 1945–1948. During that time, females had low social status. They could not receive proper education and jobs, and most of them were destined to be either housewives or prostitutes for the rest of their lives. Until "Malaya's Spring" took place, people were introduced to concepts of freedom and equality, and at the same time, intellectuals from China brought along their books and thoughts to Malaya. Females started to realise that they can unite and rise up against discrimination and injustice imposed on them by a patriarchal society.

With the help of Chinese scholars, magazines that target female audiences, such as "*New Women* Monthly" were being published. Everyone was striving to be a "new woman", an ideal image of an independent strong woman, with sufficient financial and intellectual assets to stand against male dominance. Unfortunately, the movement came to an early end due to restrictions from the government and disagreement among the feminists. Nevertheless, it was still a milestone for the feminist movement in Malaya.

Public Lecture Series 2022

The speakers gave face-to-face talks, which were also broadcast on Zoom. The Third Southern Institute of Chinese Linguistics

Southern Institute of Chinese Linguistics, initiated by Sun Yat-sen University (SYSU), the CUHK, and University of Macau (UM), is the flagship of the efforts of the Guangdong– Hong Kong–Macao University Alliance for Chinese (GHMUAC) to promote Chinese linguistics and intellectual exchange among colleagues and students of the field based in the Guangdong–Hong Kong–Macao Greater Bay Area (Greater Bay Area).

The Third Southern Institute of Chinese Linguistics, organised by GHMUAC, hosted by Department of Chinese Language and Literature, UM, and co-organised by Department of Chinese Language and Literature, SYSU, and T.T. Ng Chinese Language Research Centre of the Institute of Chinese Studies, CUHK, took place virtually on 10–17 December 2022.

A total of 12 speakers gave talks, including (in alphabetical order): FENG Shengli (Beijing Language and Culture University/CUHK), GUO Xi (Jinan University), HUANG Chu-Ren (Hong Kong Polytechnic University), HUANG Xing (Beijing Normal University, Zhuhai/Chinese Academy of Social Sciences), LIN Huayong (SYSU), PAN Haihua (CUHK), QU Shaobing



(Guangzhou University), SHAO Jingmin (Jinan University), SHI Dingxu (Guangdong University of Foreign Studies), TANG Sze-Wing (CUHK), XU Jie (UM), and ZHANG Yujin (South China Normal University).

Focusing on different aspects of Chinese linguistics, the 12 lectures of the Institute attracted an enrollment of more than five hundred students and colleagues from not only the Greater Bay Area but also worldwide. In addition to the mission of the Institute to mainly open to colleagues and students based in the Greater Bay Area while welcoming those beyond, it also reflects the motto of the Institute: "Precious is to appreciate cultures of others as one appreciates one's own. Through mutual understanding of diversity, the world will be a harmonious and united one."

With its purpose of building up an academic exchange platform of openness and inclusiveness, the Institute will seek to bring more events in various forms and promote the cooperation and exchange in Chinese linguistics within and beyond the Greater Bay Area.



Selected Cantonese Publications by Western Missionaries in China (1828–1927)

by Shin Kataoka and Yin-Ping Cream Lee

The Cantonese people have a tradition of incorporating spoken Cantonese into their literature, but what is less well known is that in the 19th century, Western missionaries compiled Cantonese dictionaries and textbooks in order to help missionaries to master the Cantonese language, and also translated Bibles, hymns, gospel novels, and wrote catechisms and Sunday school textbooks in Cantonese to help Cantonese people to understand Christianity. This book contains a selection of Cantonese works by missionaries during the period from 1828–1927, introducing the authors and their works as well as the linguistic features of Cantonese of the time. In the appendices, the total of 278 Cantonese works by missionaries were listed, which will give the reader an insight into their unique writings.
