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INTRODUCTION

Since its establishment in September 1990, the Hong Kong Institute of Asia-Pacific Studies (hereafter, the Institute or HKIAPS) has been promoting and coordinating inter-disciplinary studies on Hong Kong and neighbouring Asian countries and communities within the Asia-Pacific region. The Institute aims to serve as a bridge between overseas scholars in Asia-Pacific studies and teaching and research staff at The Chinese University of Hong Kong (hereafter, the Chinese University or CUHK).

The Institute supports two major types of research activities: individual projects funded by or affiliated with the Institute, and long-term inter-disciplinary research programmes that constitute the backbone of the activities of the Institute. The latter activities are described at length in the following pages, while the former will be mentioned in particular segments of specific programme reports.

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

With this annual report, the Institute has completed its independent existence for 14 years. This is an important milestone, because the Institute was established seven years prior to the handover and it has now been another seven years since that historic date. During this period, the Institute has grown with Hong Kong and shared with the community its moods of joyful upswings and helpless depressions. In the run-up to the handover in 1997, the Institute played its role by producing research highlighting Hong Kong's position in the Asia-Pacific region. Since 1997, the question of how Hong Kong can succeed and further prosper as Asia's world city under the formula of "one country, two systems" has been a focus of our research activity. In all, we have produced a stream of evidence-based research publications that have created an impact both locally and internationally. Equally, we have contributed to the process of policy formulation in Hong Kong in various ways, especially through the participation of our colleagues in government policy committees and through our telephone surveys.

At this time last year, Hong Kong was still smarting from the economic and social wounds inflicted upon the territory by the SARS outbreak. It was a time of healing and recovery, which, thankfully, was steady and sturdy. By the end of 2003, the economic recovery had progressed substantially, with property and stock prices having made impressive gains. The rapidity of the recovery was due, to a large extent, to favourable policies emanating from the central government. More specifically, after months of negotiations, the Mainland and Hong Kong Closer Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA) was introduced in late June 2003, and solo travel to Hong Kong was progressively extended to residents of an increasing number of Chinese cities. Both have had the effect of bringing immediate economic gains to Hong Kong by enlivening the retail sector and introducing a new cycle of opportunities.

The latest policy measures that have had a positive effect on

Hong Kong are the Pan-Pearl River Delta agreements signed between nine provinces, led by Guangdong, and Hong Kong and Macau on 3 June 2004. They are another avenue by which Hong Kong can seek further integration and collaborative development with a much larger region of China than that in its immediate vicinity.

The Institute is pleased to be able to contribute to this rapidly evolving policy environment. In the past 18 months, Sung Yun-wing and I have participated in the work of the Pearl River Delta Panel under the Central Policy Unit. I was appointed the Chairman of the Panel. We have also completed two consultancy studies as part of the work of the Panel, on the cooperative development of Hong Kong and the Western Pearl River Delta, and the economic costs and benefits of integration. I also spoke as a representative of the Hong Kong academic community at the Pan-Pearl River Delta summit in Macau on 2 July 2004. My colleagues and I are ready to contribute more to the obvious demand for data and research on Hong Kong and its relationship to this larger region, as the substance of the recent policy formulations begins to unfold.

During the past year, the Institute has published several important books. First, arising from the Institute's collaboration with the Hong Kong Housing Authority, two books, in English and Chinese, were published by The Chinese University Press in December 2003. They appeared immediately prior to the anniversary ceremony held on 23 December 2003 in Shek Kip Mei, marking the 50th anniversary of the disastrous squatter fire that ravaged the area in 1953. The book, *Fifty Years of Public Housing in Hong Kong*, was passed out to guests of the event. A related research tool, *Housing in Hong Kong: A Golden Jubilee Bibliography*, was also published by the Institute. Another book, representing several years of hard work, *Developing China's West*, was published in April 2004, also by The Chinese University Press. It is the first comprehensive volume to tackle the issue of developing the sprawling western region of China in response to major policy announcements on the issue in 1999.

On the training front, a workshop for over 30 officials from the Tianjin Municipal Government, which had been delayed by

SARS, was held on campus in April 2004. It was the fourth course in the three years that we have been organizing this series of training workshops for Tianjin officials.

The Institute's telephone surveys have continued to contribute to the policy environment in Hong Kong. In the period under report, 59 commissioned surveys were conducted, with over 500 such surveys having been undertaken since the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory was established in May 1995.

In terms of publications, the past year has been a very productive year for the Institute. Four books or monographs were published, for a cumulative total of 60 since 1990. Another 10 occasional papers were published, out of a cumulative total of 148.

I would take this opportunity to welcome the new Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Lawrence Lau, who took up office earlier this month. Prof. Lau is a world-renowned economist, whose particular expertise is on the Asia-Pacific region. With his advice and wise counsel, the Institute can scale new heights of achievement. We also anticipate his sustained support, intellectual and material, such as we have enjoyed all these years from his predecessors.

Profiles of the Senior Staff

Prof. Yeung Yue-man 楊汝萬

With basic training in geography in Hong Kong, Canada and the United States, Prof. Yeung has had a rich and varied career that has spanned teaching, research, international development and university administration. He had been away from Hong Kong for almost two decades, studying in North America and working in Singapore and Canada, before being appointed Chair Professor of Geography at this University in 1984. Prof. Yeung has travelled to most countries in the Asia-Pacific region and has worked with many Asian research institutes and researchers. His research interests lie mainly in Asian cities, low-cost housing and policy studies and design for development, with particular reference to Pacific Asia. He has published numerous books and articles in international learned journals on these subjects. Apart from being the Director of the Institute, Prof. Yeung leads the Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia Research Programme. Prof. Yeung plays a very active role in serving the Hong Kong community through memberships in several public bodies providing key urban services, and he participates collaboratively in many regional and global research projects.

Prof. Sung Yun-wing 宋恩榮

Prof. Sung is Professor and Chairman of the Department of Economics. He is the Associate Director of the Institute and also Co-director of the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme. He is Editor of the *Asian Economic Journal*, Book Review Editor of the *Pacific Economic Review*, Corresponding Editor (Hong Kong) of the *Asian-Pacific Economic Literature*, and a member of the Editorial Board of *The China Review*. He is a member of the Corporate Economists' Advisory Group of the International Chamber of Commerce, Hong Kong, China Business Council, and a member of the Social Sciences Advisory Board of Lingnan University. In public service, he is a part-time member of the Central Policy Unit, and a member of

the Pearl River Delta Panel under the Central Policy Unit. He is a member of the Hong Kong Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation (HKCPEC), and is also HKCPEC's Representative to the International Advisory Groups of the PECC Trade Forum. His research interests include international trade, economic development, the Hong Kong economy and the Chinese economy.

Prof. Fanny M. Cheung 張妙清

Prof. Cheung, PhD (Minnesota), Director of the Gender Research Centre, established the Gender Research Programme at CUHK in 1985. When she was Dean of the Faculty of Social Science in 1995-1996, she initiated the Gender Studies Programme. An active advocate for women's development in the community and a recognized women's leader in the Asia-Pacific region, she served as the founding chairperson of Hong Kong's Equal Opportunities Commission from 1996-1999. Her research interests in gender issues include gender roles, violence against women, women's health and gender equality. Other research interests in psychology include personality assessment and cross-cultural psychopathology.

Dr Matthew Ming-tak Chew 趙明德

Dr Chew received his PhD in sociology from Princeton University. He has taught at the University of Hong Kong, the City University of Hong Kong and the Chinese University. His research interests include cultural sociology, cultural policy, globalization and consumption in China. He has contributed to several journals, including *Positions* and *Cultural Studies*. He is presently the coordinator of the Institute's Documentation Unit.

Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi 關信基

Prof. Kuan, Director of the South China Programme, is Professor of Government and Public Administration and the Chairman of the Department. He is also the Director of CUHK's Universities Service Centre for China Studies. He has co-authored *The Ethos*

of the *Hong Kong Chinese* and co-edited the first two volumes of *China Review* and *China Review 1992*, as well as *China Review 1997*. He has contributed to *The China Quarterly*, *Studies in Comparative Communism*, *Asian Survey*, *Journal of Comparative and Commonwealth Studies* and *Pacific Affairs*.

Prof. Lau Siu-kai 劉兆佳

Prof. Lau graduated from the University of Hong Kong in 1971 with a BSocSc degree in sociology and economics, and from the University of Minnesota in 1975 with a PhD in sociology. He joined CUHK in 1975. His major research interests are comparative political and social development, society and politics in Hong Kong, and political development in traditional and modern China. He tackles both macroscopic and microscopic issues, such as political culture and political behaviour. His favourite approach is the comparative historical method. His publications include *Society and Politics in Hong Kong* (1982) and, with Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, *The Ethos of the Hong Kong Chinese* (1988).

Prof. Liu Pak-wai 廖柏偉

Prof. Liu is Professor of Economics, Pro-Vice Chancellor of the Chinese University, and Director of the Hong Kong and Asia-Pacific Economies Research Programme. He is also a nominator of the Fukuoka Asian Culture Prizes, and is a member of the English Schools Foundation, the Management Committee of the Hong Kong Institute of Economic and Business Strategy, and the Judging Panel for The Industrialist of the Year Award and The Young Industrialist Awards of Hong Kong. In public service, he serves as Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Monetary Research, and is a member of the following bodies: Council of Advisors on Innovation and Technology, Task Force on Employment, Panel of Arbitrators, Process Review Panel for the Securities and Futures Commission, Skills Upgrading Scheme Steering Committee, Manpower Development Committee, Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislative Council of the HKSAR,

Land and Building Advisory Committee, and the Hong Kong Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation. His research interests cover the areas of applied theory, labour market and employment, and the Hong Kong economy. Besides a continuing interest in economic theory, he is interested in the empirical aspects of economics.

Prof. Tan Chee-beng 陳志明

Prof. Tan obtained his PhD from Cornell University in 1979. He is Chairman of the Department of Anthropology and the Director of the Cultural Relations and Identities in East Asia Research Programme. His research interests include cultural change and identity, ethnicity and ethnic relations, and indigenous peoples and development. He has been particularly interested in the study of Chinese overseas and, in recent years, has also conducted research in mainland China. He has published extensively on these subjects, as well as on Chinese popular religion.

Ms Wan Po-san 尹寶珊

Ms Wan received her BSSc and MPhil in sociology from CUHK. She is experienced in conducting sample surveys and in research in the field of Hong Kong studies. Her major research interests are the status of women and the state of the environment. Other interests include gender issues, the quality of life, social problems, and patterns of social change in Hong Kong. She is responsible for the Institute's publications and is Co-director of the Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong Research Programme.

Dr Timothy Ka-ying Wong 王家英

Dr Wong received his PhD in sociology at the University of Manitoba, Canada. He is a Research Officer and coordinator of the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory of the Institute. His major research interests include cross-Taiwan-Strait relations and social and political development in Taiwan and Hong Kong.

He has published a number of books and book chapters and has contributed to such academic journals as *Nations and Nationalism*, *Journal of Contemporary China*, *Asian Perspective*, *Journal of East Asian Affairs*, *Social Development Issues*, *Democratization*, *Social Policy and Society*, *International Journal of Social Welfare* and *Issues and Studies*.

Prof. Yip Hon-ming 葉漢明

Prof. Yip (PhD, University of California, Los Angeles), Associate Director of the Gender Research Centre, has published on gender/women's history, the history of the overseas Chinese, modern and contemporary Chinese socio-economic history, and the local history of China and Hong Kong. As a member of the Association for the Advancement of Feminism, the Hong Kong Women Christian Council and other community organizations, she considers the coordination of teaching, research and social practice her greatest challenges at present. Taking power in history as her focal point of reflection in recent years, she is interested in exploring the historical contexts of developments and changes in the operation of power in human society. She is also interested in ways of exposing the historical roots of human manipulation and resistance in daily life. Related issues include marginalization and subordination, and subversion and struggle in the fields of gender, class and ethnicity.

Prof. Yu Xingzhong 於興中

Prof. Yu obtained a BA in English Literature from Lanzhou University in China, and an LLM (Master of Laws) and SJD (Doctor of Juridical Science) from the Harvard Law School. He teaches Chinese law and constitutional law at the Department of Government and Public Administration. He has been the Director of the Chinese Law Programme since March 2003. He has previously served as a Lecturer on law at the Harvard Law School (September-December 1999), a Senior Research Fellow in East Asian Legal Studies, Harvard Law School (1998-1999), a

Visiting Professor at Beijing University's Department of Law (Spring 1998) and as an Associate (Chinese Legal Specialist) with the Chicago office of Baker & McKenzie (November 1995-February 1998). He was also a Visiting Scholar at Columbia Law School (1988-1990) and a Visiting Fellow at the Australian National University (1984-1986). His research interests include social and political theory, cultural studies of law, jurisprudence, constitutional and administrative law, constitutionalism in Hong Kong and China, comparative law, Chinese legal history, and PRC law. He has contributed to various journals and book projects.

Objectives

This inter-disciplinary research programme is designed to facilitate and consolidate diverse research interests in cultural development within and cultural interactions among East Asian countries at the Chinese University as well as in the broader Hong Kong academic community. The issue of cultural relations among Asia-Pacific countries has gained prominence in the post-Cold War era, as cultural activities carry new political meanings and commodified cultural items are promoted and traded across national and regional boundaries. The research projects focus on a broad array of identities and cultural relations in East Asia, including media and popular culture; youth culture and education; ethnic, national and pan-Asian identity; cultural tourism; cosmopolitan culture and democratization; and food, cuisine and cultural change.

There are four categories of research activities in the Programme. They are: tradition, change and identity; cultural

identity and nationalism; cultural unity and diversity in Asia; and transnationalism and global culture. During the past year, the members of the Programme were active participants in international conferences and published in journals and books.

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Gender Research Centre

Founded in 1985 as the Gender Research Programme, the Programme was renamed the Gender Research Centre (GRC) in 2000. As the first research unit on gender and women's issues in Hong Kong, our mission is to promote knowledge in gender research and women's studies and to support action to enhance gender equality and the status of women. As the Centre is interdisciplinary in nature, scholars from Social Science, Humanities, Education, Medicine, Business Administration and other interdisciplinary fields participate in various research activities. Other faculty and staff of the Chinese University may join as members. Non-CUHK members and students may also join as affiliates.

Conference and Workshop

An international conference entitled "Globalisation and Gender: The Implications of Global Economic Restructuring for Women in China and Southeast Asia" was held on 27-29 November 2003. The Conference was co-sponsored by CUHK as part of its 40th Anniversary Celebration, and by Chung Chi College (CUHK), the Canadian International Development Agency, the Ford Foundation China, the Global Fund for Women (USA), and The Asian Institute, the United Board for Christian Higher Education in Asia. Speakers included researchers and practitioners from Canada, mainland China, Hong Kong, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Taiwan and Thailand. Prof. Ambrose King, the Vice-Chancellor of CUHK, opened the conference. Papers were presented in six sessions covering various gender-related topics on understanding globalization: women in processes of change in China and Southeast Asia; globalization and women's health in China and Southeast Asia; women organizing for empowerment in the context of globalization;

working women in China and Southeast Asia; religious and cultural transformations: women addressing fragmentation and conflict; the new patriarchies: women in changing gender roles and family relations; and a roundtable discussion on *The Way Forward: Syntheses and Lessons for Gender-responsive Policies*. About 100 participants attended the conference.

The 2003 Annual Gender Role Workshop “Policy Forum and Annual Gender Role Training Workshop,” originally scheduled for May 2003, was postponed to 6 September 2003 due to the outbreak of SARS. It was organized in collaboration with the Policy Forum of the HKIAPS. It focused on structural changes and the social needs of separated families due to the economic activities of spouses in mainland China. There were about 70 participants in this event.

The 2004 Annual Gender Role Workshop was held on 29 May 2004. The theme for this year was “Women and Political Participation,” in which we aimed to explore the current state of

the political participation of women in Hong Kong, including the obstacles and opportunities women are facing. Around 50 participants, including academics, students, members of women's groups, providers of services for women, and practitioners in the field of politics engaged in active discussions.

Asian Economic Journal

This is the 14th year in which the Osaka International University and the Programme have jointly published the *Asian Economic Journal* for the East Asian Economic Association. Since 1997, the number of issues published each year has increased from three to four. Prof. Liu Pak-wai served as the Secretary General of the East Asian Economic Association from 1997 to 2002, while Prof. Sung Yun-wing served as the Managing Editor of the journal from 1997 to 2000. In 2001, Prof. Kwong Kai-sun took over as Managing Editor and Prof. Sung Yun-wing served as Editor. In 2003, Prof. Chou Win-lin took over as Managing Editor, while Prof. Kwong Kai-sun served as Secretary General.

Impact

Prof. Liu Pak-wai is a nominator of the Fukuoka Asian Culture Prizes. He is a member of the English Schools Foundation, the Management Committee of the Hong Kong Institute of Economic and Business Strategy, and the Judging Panel for The Industrialist of the Year Award and The Young Industrialist Awards of Hong Kong. In public service, he serves as Director of the Hong Kong Institute for Monetary Research, and is a member of the Council of Advisors on Innovation and Technology, the Task Force on Employment, the Panel of Arbitrators, the Process Review Panel for the Securities and

Futures Commission, the Skills Upgrading Scheme Steering Committee, the Manpower Development Committee, the Independent Commission on Remuneration for Members of the Executive Council and the Legislative Council of the HKSAR, the Land and Building Advisory Committee, and the Hong Kong Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation.

Prof. Sung Yun-wing is Editor of the *Asian Economic Journal*, Book Review Editor of the *Pacific Economic Review*, Corresponding Editor (Hong Kong) of the *Asian-Pacific Economic Literature*, and a member of the Editorial Board of *The China Review*. He is a member of the Corporate Economists' Advisory Group of the International Chamber of Commerce, Hong Kong, China Business Council, and a member of the Social Sciences Advisory Board of Lingnan University. In public service, he is a part-time member of the Central Policy Unit, and a member of the Pearl River Delta Panel under the Central Policy Unit. He is a member of the Hong Kong Committee for Pacific Economic Cooperation (HKCPEC), and is also HKCPEC's Representative to the International Advisory Groups of the PECC Trade Forum. These professional activities, which are related to the Programme, have an impact on the local community as well as on the Asia-Pacific region. They also help to project the image of the Programme.

The *Asian Economic Journal* is a journal based in the Asian region that is devoted to publishing articles on Asian economies. The journal has a wide circulation not only in Asia but also in Europe and North America. Its readership is expected to increase as economists around the world focus their attention on the economic successes and problems of the Asia-Pacific region. The Editorial Committee is very broad-based. It includes leading economists from all of the major East and Southeast Asian countries. Because the journal is edited, printed and published at CUHK, it bears the name of CUHK, together with Osaka International University, on the front cover as the two institutions that produce the journal. The Secretariat of the East Asian Economic Association is also located at CUHK and uses the HKIAPS as its address. The journal and the location of the Secretariat have promoted the image of CUHK in general, and

the Programme and HKIAPS in particular, as institutions active in research within the Asia-Pacific region.

Political Development of Hong Kong

Objectives

The main objective of the Programme is to study political changes in Hong Kong and their underlying factors. Its current focus is on issues of leadership, political culture, popular elections, institutional reforms leading to more accountability and democracy, policy reforms, and last but not least, the relationship between mainland China and Hong Kong. With new members joining the Programme, there is potential to widen the range of research topics to be covered in the years to come.

Research Activities

Both Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi continue to focus on studying the patterns of political change in Hong Kong, particularly in areas such as the relationship between political leadership and governmental reforms, the connections between cultural and value changes on the one hand and, on the other, the democratic transition, social learning and the development of elections and political parties as respected institutions.

Prof. Ma Ngok and Prof. Lam Wai-man have joined the Programme as new members. Preparations have been made to launch a collaborative research project on the 2004 elections of the Legislative Council and two funding proposals have been written to compete for RGC Competitive Earmarked Research Grant.

Since many of the commissioned research projects of the Telephone Survey Research Laboratory of the Institute are about local politics, the Programme has provided technical and staff support to the Laboratory and is instrumental in its smooth operation.

The District Council elections were held in last November and the Legislative Council elections will be launched this fall. The Programme continues to collect documents and materials related to these elections, particularly data on the elections. A data book will be published after the Legislative Council elections have been held.

The political ecology of Hong Kong has undergone profound changes since the July 1 rallies of 2003. To keep track of political and social developments, the Programme has composed a chronology that covers important day-to-day events.

The Programme is currently sponsoring the following research projects:

“Democratization and Value Change” by Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi and Prof. Lau Siu-kai

This is part of the regional collaborative project “East Asian Democratization and Value Change” involving mainland China, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Mongolia, the Philippines, South Korea and Thailand. A territory-wide household survey was launched in September 2001. More than 800 cases were successfully interviewed during the fieldwork. A progressive report was submitted in 2002 and a manuscript for the chapter on Hong Kong with the title “Noises and Interruptions: The Road to Democracy” has been completed by Prof. Lam Wai-man and Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi.

“Political Culture and Political Participation in China, Taiwan and Hong Kong” by Prof. Lau Siu-kai, Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Prof. Andrew Nathan (Columbia University, coordinator), Prof. Hu Fo (National Taiwan University), Prof. Chu Yun-han (National Taiwan University) and Prof. Shi Tian-jian (Duke University)

This cross-cultural study is funded by, inter alia, the

National Science Foundation, the Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation and the Luce Foundation. The questionnaire survey launched in Hong Kong was partly funded by the Center for Pacific Rim Studies, University of California, Los Angeles. The project attempts to chart the changes in the political culture and development in the greater China area, partly on the basis of two major surveys conducted in 1993 and 2001, respectively. The Hong Kong team was responsible for carrying out questionnaire surveys in Hong Kong, which were completed in the summer of 1993 and the fall of 2001. Members of the research team are in the process of writing the ten chapters to be included in a forthcoming book with the tentative title *Political Participation in Three Chinese Societies*. This trilateral project has formed the core of a new Asian Barometer Project that includes nine nations and Hong Kong as a non-nation member.

"The Legislative Council Elections in 1998" by Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi and Prof. Lau Siu-kai

The project has attracted attention overseas and subsequently been incorporated into a 14-nation collaborative project, "The Comparative National Elections Project (CNEP)," coordinated by Prof. Richard Gunther of the Ohio State University. A looser affiliation has also been established with another and larger international research project, "Comparative Study of Electoral Systems (CSES)," coordinated by the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan.

Data Collection

The Programme continues to collect first-hand research materials on Hong Kong's political scene. Aside from newspaper clippings, the Programme also collects unpublished research reports from various social and political organizations.

The Programme has built up a comprehensive collection of documents and materials related to elections and electoral campaigns in Hong Kong. The collection forms a useful database for the study of future elections in Hong Kong.

Social Indicators and Social Development of Hong Kong

Programme Directors: **Prof. Lau Siu-kai** (on leave)
Ms Wan Po-san

Objectives

The Programme focuses on measuring and studying social developments in Hong Kong. Its prime purpose is to build up a set of longitudinal data on the subjective and objective dimensions of social conditions and social change. It is hoped that the availability of such data will facilitate not only the analyses of patterns of social change and explorations of social issues and problems, but also contribute to the evaluation and formulation of public policies.

Research Activities

Highlights of the main activities during the past year are underlined as follows:

“Social Indicators Survey Series” coordinated by Prof. Lau Siu-kai and Ms Wan Po-san

The Programme has been conducting a series of biennial territory-wide household surveys since 1988. These periodic surveys aim to measure the scope and extent of significant aspects of social change in Hong Kong by focusing on the perceptions, values, feelings, aspirations and sense of well-being of the Hong Kong people on various important aspects of their daily lives.

The survey “Crisis and Reintegration: Indicators of Social Development in Hong Kong 2003” is funded by the RGC Competitive Earmarked Research Grant (\$1,554,000) and is being conducted in collaboration with the Centre of Asian Studies of the University of Hong Kong and the Department of

Applied Social Sciences of the Hong Kong Polytechnic University. The CUHK team members include Prof. Cheung Yuet-wah, Prof. Stephen W. K. Chiu, Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi, Prof. Lau Siu-kai, Prof. Rance P. L. Lee, Prof. Lui Tai-lok and Ms Wan Po-san.

"A Comparative Study of the Social Image of Taiwan and Hong Kong"

This project is being conducted in collaboration with the Institute of Sociology of the Academia Sinica, Taiwan. A telephone survey will be conducted once or twice a year to gauge the perceptions, values and subjective well-being of people in both societies. The core questions of the questionnaire will be kept unchanged as far as possible so as to detect social trends and changes, while questions on special topics will be flexible enough to reflect changes in social conditions.

The fifth survey, focusing on subjective well-being and socio-political trust, was carried out in December 2003. The Hong Kong survey was funded by Mr Richard Liu.

"Comparative Studies on Economic Development and the Status of Women in the Family in Chinese Societies: A Hong Kong Study" by Prof. Lau Yuk-king (Principal Investigator), Prof. Joyce Lai-chong Ma and Prof. Chan Ying-keung

The study aims to examine the effects of changes in the structure of the family and in female employment on the decision-making power of women and their access to resources in the family. It is part of a comparative research project coordinated by Prof. Yi Chin-chun (Institute of Sociology, Academia Sinica, Taiwan). The Hong Kong survey is funded by the Direct Grant for Research, the Lee Hysan Endowment Fund of United College and Mr Richard Liu.

Programme Director: **Prof. Kuan Hsin-chi**

Objectives

The aim of the Programme is to promote academic research in issues of development in China in the reform era. We continue to focus on the breakdown of old practices and the evolution of new institutions and behaviour in the economic, social, mass media and political systems. South China remains the area of emphasis, although other areas should not be neglected. Apart from inter-disciplinary cooperation, the Programme welcomes research collaboration with our counterparts in the mainland, especially Guangdong.

Conference

International Conference on The State of Contemporary China

In collaboration with the Universities Service Centre for China Studies, the Programme held the conference on 5-6 January 2004. The conference was devoted to evaluating the state of research and knowledge about contemporary China. More specifically, contributions to the conference were expected to take stock of the substantive knowledge accumulated in research areas that have already achieved a critical mass, with a view to contributing to intellectual syntheses and theoretical integration.

The conference turned out to be the largest social science global meeting on contemporary China. A total of 56 top, local and overseas scholars from various fields presented papers grouped under the following 13 thematic panels: Political Development, China in Transition, Rule of Law, Family and Society, Cross-Straits Relations, Economy, Rural Economy, Regional Development, Labour, The Great Proletarian Cultural Revolution, Science, Rural Politics and Society, and China and the World.

Both the plenary and the panel sessions were well attended. The publication of a selected number of revised papers as a special issue of *The China Journal* is underway. Another monograph with more contributions is in the drawing board.

Research Activities

There are two major kinds of research activities: those undertaken by individual scholars with respect to projects funded by the Programme's faculty grant, and activities by the Research Group on Civil Society formed three years ago.

During the reporting period, Prof. Qiu Haixiong (Sun Yat-sen University) and Prof. Chan Kin-man were the conveners of the Centre. More than ten scholars from Guangzhou, Xiamen, Hong Kong and Taiwan were invited to serve as research fellows. A research workshop was held in the summer in Guangzhou to prepare for a book to be published in connection with the above-mentioned project on business organizations. The Centre has also received grants from other sources to support the following research projects:

Urban and Regional Development in Pacific Asia

Objectives

The Programme promotes and facilitates research on economic development and social change in the Asia-Pacific region through studies on urban and regional development. Many books and other publications have appeared arising from research projects that have been undertaken or commissioned in recent years.

During the past year, the Programme has had an exceptionally productive year in terms of publications. To the credit of the Director, six books have been published, including two books, in English and Chinese, on fifty years of public housing in Hong Kong. Another landmark study focuses on China's western region, culminating three years of hard work. All of these books were published by The Chinese University Press.

The Programme also completed a commissioned study, *Hong Kong and the Western Pearl River Delta: Cooperative Development from a Cross-boundary Perspective*, for the Central Policy Unit. This report was very well received in Hong Kong and widely reported in the local media. Asia TV even followed up by running two special episodes in late July 2004 introducing Jiangmen, in its programme on the western Pearl River Delta.

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AFFILIATED PROGRAMME

Chinese Law

Programme Director: Prof. Yu Xingzhong

Objectives

With China's resumption of sovereignty over Hong Kong on 1 July 1997 and the increasing economic and cultural exchanges, epitomized in the CEPA arrangement, between Hong Kong and the mainland ever since, there is an urgent need for a better understanding of the Chinese legal system and its interaction with the common law in Hong Kong. Accordingly, the current work of the Chinese Law Programme focuses on issues relating to the interface between the legal system of Hong Kong and that of the mainland.

Training Courses

In collaboration with the Hong Kong Trade Development Council (HKTDC), the Programme continues with its training courses on Chinese law, which have attracted interested persons in Hong Kong's professional world. The courses, covering more than ten subjects on Chinese law, usually run for two-and-a-half months and constitute part of the curriculum for the Chinese Business Law Certificate Programme offered by the HKTDC. The instructors are specialists or professors in relevant fields serving in Hong Kong or the mainland.

Community Service

Mr Ong Yew-kim, an Honorary Research Fellow long associated with the Programme, has been very active in offering opinions on matters relating to Chinese law and the issues pertinent to Chinese as well as Hong Kong laws at the invitation of major television and radio stations. He has spoken on the BBC, CNN, RTHK, TVB and other television and radio stations on numerous occasions, addressing issues of Chinese and Hong Kong law as

they affect the daily lives of Hong Kong people, especially the issue of legislation on Article 23 of the Basic Law and the interpretation of provisions in the Basic Law on the election of the Chief Executive and the Legislative Council. He has also been involved in providing legal assistance to Hong Kong citizens involved in the Chinese legal system. He has acted as a legal adviser to the Society for Community Organization, helping individuals who have been wronged or mistreated by the legal system or personnel of the mainland to obtain justice or compensation. He has also served as a lecturer on Chinese law for legal training classes organized by local communities.

FUNCTIONAL SERVICES

Documentation Unit

Coordinator: **Dr Matthew Ming-tak Chew**

The Documentation Unit (DU) holds a vast collection of books, papers, journals and other reference materials on countries in the Asia-Pacific region. Deserving of special mention is our collection of Hong Kong newspaper clippings with broad coverage from the 1950s to August 2000. In addition, the DU carries a large number of unpublished surveys on many different social issues. With the train station just steps away, the DU is very accessible to visitors from outside the University.

From July 2003 to mid-June 2004, 56 users visited the DU. Visitors from outside the University constituted the core group of users of the DU during the past year. Students were the second-largest group of users.

During the past year, the DU received over 321 items on Hong Kong alone. The Asia-Pacific collection has expanded as well. Over 226 items have been added to our collection. Four hundred and sixty-nine out of the 547 new items are books/surveys, while periodicals and CD-ROMs account for the rest. As of mid-June 2004, the DU boasts a collection of 47,381 items of books, periodicals and other reference materials.

External Liaison

Coordinator: **Dr Timothy Ka-ying Wong**

Dr Wong is responsible for the external liaison work of the Institute. This is a duty of a rather regular and routine nature. The overall objective is to publicize the activities of the Institute so that the public and concerned groups or persons can be informed of our work, make use of our research results and take part in our activities. External liaison has three main components:

Publicizing our publications includes preparing and issuing press releases to the media, distributing information sheets and order forms to relevant institutions and individuals, and liaising with our distributors.

Publicizing our conferences and seminars includes preparing and issuing press releases, sending invitations and publicity materials to the media, arranging and facilitating the reporting work of the press, and helping the organizing committees handle enquiries and public relations.

Liaising with overseas institutions and individuals includes handling enquiries and exchanging information and publications.

During the last year, over 50 scholars from the mainland and overseas have visited the Institute, 3 seminars or conferences have been held, and 10 occasional papers and 4 research monographs have been published. On the whole, our guests and visiting participants were pleased, and the coverage of our seminar/conference activities by the media was satisfactory. Our publications were also made known and distributed in an effective manner.

Publications

The aim behind the publications of the HKIAPS is to disseminate and promote research on social, economic and political developments in Hong Kong and the Asia-Pacific region. It is hoped that the extensive and effective dissemination of our research findings will broaden their intellectual and social impact, and allow more donations to be solicited for studies in the applied social sciences.

Scholars both inside and outside the Chinese University are welcome to submit manuscripts for consideration. The manuscripts received are evaluated by the Editorial Committee in collaboration with invited reviewers of relevant specialities. Priority in publication is given to the results of research undertaken by academics affiliated with the Institute and related to the domains of the established strategic research programmes.

Five publication series, namely the Research Monograph Series, Occasional Paper Series, the Shanghai-Hong Kong Development Institute (SHKDI) Research Monograph Series, the SHKDI Occasional Paper Series and the USC Seminar Series, are regularly produced. The first four series are mostly the results of research undertaken by scholars at the Institute. The USC Seminar Series publishes selected research papers presented at the seminars of the Universities Service Centre for China Studies. In addition, the Institute publishes the *Asian Economic Journal* for the East Asian Economic Association.

Telephone Survey Research Laboratory

Coordinator: Dr Timothy Ka-ying Wong

The Laboratory

Established in May 1995, the Laboratory can handle over 30 telephone lines, all connected to the CATI (Computer Assisted Telephone Interview) system operated through a main server. It can cope with the demands of large samples under time constraints.

Objectives

- To provide a telephone survey laboratory to researchers at the Chinese University who want to use telephone interviews to facilitate their research.
- To enable the development of new research interests using the telephone interview method.
- To collect panel public opinion data of academic and social value.
- To serve as a link between the Chinese University and the public by regularly offering results of survey polls on public issues.

Accomplishments

Over 500 commissioned surveys have been completed since the establishment of the Laboratory (59 surveys in the past year).

The findings of our surveys have been widely covered by the media, thereby helping to raise the profile of the Institute and the Chinese University.

The Laboratory has attracted an increasing number of researchers from academic circles and the media who want to use telephone surveys as an alternative method of collecting data.

With our improving financial situation, we have designed and launched panel surveys for academic research.

We have trained and pooled over 70 experienced interviewers from amongst CUHK students as well as students from other universities, providing them not only with a good source of income but also with valuable experience in conducting telephone surveys.

We have conducted several seminars for students from secondary schools and technical colleges, introducing them to the methodology and interpretation of opinion polling.

Policy

The Laboratory welcomes the sponsorship or commission of surveys; it is also open to collaboration with interested persons or organizations.
