- All applicants shall have obtained a Bachelor's degree from a recognized university, normally with honours not lower than Second Class;
- English language proficiency:
- A pass in HKALE or
- Achieve level 4 or above in the HKDSE; or
- A degree obtained from a university in HK or a degree programme of which the medium of instruction was English; or
- Achieved certain scores of one of the following TOEFL, IELTS, GMAT*

Graduation



Students are required:

- * to complete and pass 24 units of courses offered by this Programme with at least 3 units selected from the core course list
- * to achieve a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0
- if a student fails a course, he/she must enroll in an additional 3-unit course and receive a passing grade in order to complete the degree. A supplementary course fee is applied

Duration of study (part-time mode)

❖ Normative study period: 2 years

❖ Maximum study period: 4 years

Tuition fee

- * HK\$121,000 to be settled in 4 installments per semester
- ❖ Year 1 (HK\$60,500 for 2 Terms)
- * Year 2 (HK\$60,500 for 2 Terms)
- **Students are expected to complete the Programme in two years**
- Any course/s taken beyond this two-year period will be charged on a per course basis (HK\$15,126 per course)

CEF (continuing education fund)

- The Programme has been included in the list of reimbursable courses under the Continuing Education Fund
- **CEF** reimbursable courses commenced on or after 1 August 2022:
 - The maximum entitlement for new applicants is HK\$25,000
 - For applicants who have opened CEF accounts before 1 August 2022, they are eligible for claiming the additional HK\$5,000 subsidy and the unused balance (if any) of the original subsidy HK\$20,000

Reimbursement conditions*:

- Achieved at least D grade for each course
- Achieved at least 70% face-to-face attendance for all the classes enrolled within the study period

Application deadlines

- > Priority round: 1 Dec 2022
- Final round: 31 Mar 2023

*Subject to availability, applications after deadline will be considered.


