

Please answer clearly and concisely. Explain your answers. Unexplained answers will get lower scores or even no credits.

- (1) (45 points) Give a DFA for the following languages, specified by a transition diagram. For each one of them, briefly describe how the DFA works, by stating in simple English (as opposed to regular expressions) what strings stop at every state. The alphabet is  $\Sigma = \{0, 1\}$ .
  - (a)  $L_1 = \{ w \mid w \text{ contains an even number of 0's and no 1's} \}$
  - (b)  $L_2 = \{ w \mid \text{Every odd position of } w \text{ is a 0} \}$ The first symbol of a string is an odd position, so 01 should be accepted.
  - (c)  $L_3 = \{w \mid w \text{ contains the substring 11 an odd number of times}\}$ . Note that 111 contains two occurrences of 11.
- (2) (15 points) Convert the following NFA to a DFA using the method described in class. Specify the DFA by its transition diagram. The alphabet is  $\Sigma = \{0, 1\}$ .



(3) (20 points) If w is a string, call a string x a subsequence of w if x can be obtained from w by removing zero or more symbols from w. For example, bd and c are both subsequences of bcde.


Formally,  $x = x_1 \cdots x_m$  is a subsequence of w if  $w = s_0 x_1 s_1 x_2 \cdots x_m s_m$  for some strings  $s_0, \dots, s_m$ .

Given a language L, define  $L^S = \{x \mid x \text{ is a subsequence of some } w \in L\}$ . That is,  $L^S$  contains all the subsequences of strings in L.

Prove that if L is a regular language, then so is  $L^S$ .

*Hint:* Regular language is defined *recursively*. If the desired result is true for simpler regular languages, can you show that it is also true for more complex regular languages?

(4) (20 points) Consider the following DFA:



- (a) What strings stop at  $q_0$ ? At  $q_1$ ? At  $q_2$ ? At  $q_3$ ? Answer in simple English (and not by regular expressions).
- (b) State an induction hypothesis that will allow you to prove your answer in (a).
- (c) What is the language of the DFA?
