



Course Code & Title:	GERM1001 First Steps in German	
Language of Instruction:	German / English	Units: 1

Course Description
This online self-learning course invites students without prior knowledge of German to explore some basic features of the German language and culture through a virtual journey. Based on texts, audio and video input, and interactive tasks, students will be able to practice both spoken and written German. This course serves as a taster course for students who might consider taking German courses at CUHK in the future.

Learning Outcomes
<p>Upon completion of the course, students are expected to be able to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand basic features of the German language; • understand selected information related to German culture; • identify “international” loanwords (e.g. “kindergarten”) as a helpful means to understand vocabulary; • recognise the relationship between English and German in terms of vocabulary; • apply basic structures to simple everyday situations, e.g. greetings, introducing oneself and others, expressing food preferences and dislikes, and talking about hobbies; • implement independent learning as part of their learning experience.
