Course Code & Title:	ITAL1000- Italian I	
Language of Instruction: English	Units: 3	

### Course Description

As the first in a series of six language courses, this course invites students without prior knowledge of Italian to explore the basic features of the Italian language. Supported by audiovisual aids, students will receive intensive practice in spoken and written Italian through interactive class work, homework and online exercises. They will become familiar with the basic concepts of Italian grammar and learn how to interact in some simple everyday situations.

### Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course the students will be able to have a correct pronunciation of the language, as well as getting familiar with its different features. They will be able to have a basic conversation and oral understanding about various everyday situations such as introducing oneself and others, greeting, asking and giving information, etc. The same skills will be developed for the written language (reading and writing); The course will also transmit to the learners a good knowledge of the Italian culture and a basic knowledge of the country and its lifestyle.
