My thesis in 100 words: Muyuan Luo

My thesis investigates the nature of sexual migration with a tempo-spatial framework. Based on life history interviews and participant observations, it examines how the Chinese intranational migrant gay men's motives, pathways and post-migratory incorporations are influenced by their sexualities, and how the intersection of migration and sexuality is structured in the interconnectedness between the multiple temporalities

and spatialities in China. It opens up possibilities to theorize sexual migration from a Southern perspective with the case of China, wherein individualization remains in-process, heteronormative traditions are still pervasive, and the state acts powerfully in intervening the internal migrants' daily lives.
