Course overview (as shown on CUSIS)

The course aims at an in-depth study of selected works of ancient Western philosophers such as Presocratics, Plato, Aristotle, and Hellenistic philosophers. Offerings with different subtitles can be taken up for credit, up to a maximum of two times.

Advisory to Majors: to be taken in year 2 or above.

Learning outcomes (as shown on CUSIS)

- 1. Acquire knowledge of the selected topics of the course.
- 2. Have a solid grasp of the philosophical issues of the selected topics of the course.
- 3. Demonstrate familiarity with the primary/secondary source texts.
- 4. Be able to articulate and defend a philosophical thesis of their own.

Topics

The course focuses on the centrality of love and friendship in ancient thought, particularly by reference to Plato's *Symposium* and Aristotle's *Nicomachean Ethics*. The former approaches the theme of *eros* in its broadest significance, above all in its existential as well as philosophical implications. The latter offers an unprecedented and unparalleled meditation on the communal conditions of singularity and on the experience of friendship understood as both a bond between individuals and a possible (as yet unexplored) mode of political coexistence. In both cases, what is at stake is an intensification of life, a heightened potentiality for being and acting.

Lectures, discussion, in-class interactive activities.
