This course discusses some central problems in metaphysics and reflects on the nature of metaphysics. Topics include: persistence, necessity, identity, essence, modality, counterfactuals, causation, properties, grounding and higher-order approach to metaphysics.

To ensure that the essay marking is fair to all who hand in the coursework on time, please be informed of the following regulation on midterm/final essay late submission:

If the essay is submitted after the given deadlines, there will be a 20% deduction of the grade (for the particular essay only, not for the total grade of the whole class) every single day.

For instance, if the midterm essay is submitted sometime on 10 Mar, then one will get only 80% of the marked grade; if the final essay is submitted sometime on 13 May, then only 60% of the marked grade. Therefore, if four days pass after the deadline and I still haven't received the essay, one will get zilch for their essay grade.
